

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COMMODORE'S LETTER

he third day of the Lunar New Year (Wednesday 25th) saw the Club back to business after the new year break, and also The Galley reopen with a Bi-san ceremony. The Galley now has a more spacious and uncluttered layout.

SailCom's confidence in holding a J/80 Frostbite Series, comprising four race days in successive Saturdays in the cooler month of January, was rewarded with strong turnouts. The Islands race to Po Toi was particularly popular.

Dinghy racing fared well in 2011. Our joint racing with RHKYC was re-instituted in the Autumn Series, also held on Saturdays. Of the 49 different entrants in Division A — Open and 20 in Division B — Optimists, the competitors were reasonably evenly spread between both clubs. The Dinghy Spring and Summer Series will be held on Sundays, with the former having already started in January, followed by a break and resuming on 18th March.

At time of writing a healthy 19 boats

competed in the 28th 4 Peaks Race under dry and warmish conditions with wind varying from Force 4 to light. The race was enjoyable and logistically challenging. Thanks to the organising team, the many volunteers on peaks, in safety boats and the control room who ensure the smooth and safe running of this important event. Sharp-eyed sailors on recce spotted dolphins east of Lamma.

In the light of this build-up of sailing participation and variety, the General Committee will look at how better to approach sponsorship for club events, to help raise our profile as well as gain support for our developing sailors.

On a different note, ABC completed a "hat trick" of victories in the annual cricket match against RHKYC held after the new year at Sandy Bay. Splendid day, complete with curry and drinks, and a 109 run margin!

March 3 & 4 - Interschool Sailing Festival

This annual event, held off Middle island, is organized by RHKYC with the support of ABC. Up to 20 school teams compete in a team-racing round-robin format over two days. March 10, 11 & 18 - Laser 2000 Course

An ideal next step after a beginner's course, or perfect for those who may not have sailed a dinghy for some time and want a quick refresher. Day one is mainly revision, including rigging and safety issues; day two focuses on the Gennaker and day three introduces dinghy racing – participants are entered into the scheduled ABC Dinghy Races.

March 17 & 18 - Hong Kong 29er Nationals

This is the first ever Hong Kong National Championships for this exciting two person high-performance dinghy. Hosted off Middle Island by ABC, expect spectacular sailing from Hong Kong's leading dinghy sailors.

April 5, 6 & 7 - Laser I Course

Our three day, introductory course on sailing the single-handed Laser I. A great boat, and challenging to sail well, this course will introduce all three rig sizes, boat set up, handling and racing. A highly recommended (and often requested) course so don't miss out!

J/80 SAILING AT ABC GAINS A FIRM FOOTHOLD

It's very encouraging to see the efforts of the past year really start to pay off. We now have almost a dozen members qualified to hire our club J/80s and the boats are being used more and more. Well done to our own Ah Kee, now a qualified Keelboat Instructor, who will be spearheading an increased number of keelboat activities in 2012.

J/80 Keelboat Competent Crew Courses

Course 1: March 24, 25 & 31 Course 2: May 1, 5 & 6
The J/80 is a versatile 26-foot keelboat with a recently

established class of over 20 boats in Hong Kong. The Competent Crew Course will teach fundamental keelboat seamanship skills, and is an ideal first step into 'big boat' sailing for those holding an HKSF Level 2 dinghy certificate, or having similar basic sailing skills. If you have attended a Competent Crew Course before, it's also a great way simply to get more experience and logged-sea miles! Date: Sunday, 15 January 2012. Start: 11:00hrs, Deepwater Bay

Conditions: NE 6kts mean wind, 300 yards visibility due to

heavy fog, and a flowing tide of 1.5m.

These were the conditions just before the start of Waglan 6, it felt like the start of a long, hard day and indeed it proved to be.

Right after the start, under a sudden promising 12kts of wind, all boats rounded the windward mark on Deepwater Bay with *Jailbreaker* closing the leg. The fog was clearing and the wind seemed to be picking up when suddenly the entire fleet ran into a huge wind hole just off Chung Hom Kok and stalled there for half an hour:

Eventually the fleet escaped Deepwater Bay and found reasonable wind until the first mark at Chesterman Buoy. Sadly, the fog came back with a vengeance and visibility dropped to 300 yards in places. By 13:00, I was out looking for the fleet and

planning to shorten the race at Castle Rock, the last mark before the finish. Unfortunately I got there too late as *Red Eye*, the fastest boat on the day, had just rounded it and I had no choice but to let the race carry on.

Of the 18 boats that took the start, only eight finished the race due to bad weather conditions and the many wind holes encountered along the course.

The prize giving took place in the Four Peaks Restaurant for the first time, due to the unexpectedly big turn out and the closure of other outlets. *Kei Lun* took first place in both IRC and HKPN. *Elektra* and *Yacht O* took second and third place respectively in IRC, while *Yacht O* and *Red Eye* took second and third in the HKPN Division.

It should be noted that four J/80's entered the race but only one finished it, namely FG3 who, in this humble RO's opinion, should receive a prize for perseverance for completing this race.

Date: Sunday 12 February 2012. Start: II:00hrs, Deepwater Bay.

Course: 8 (start Deepwater Bay, Chesterman buoy rounding port, ABC mark South of Lamma passing port, Cheung Chau rock rounding starboard, ABC mark passing starboard, Chesterman buoy rounding starboard then finish).

Conditions: N-NE wind 10kts, a steady flowing tide 1.2m high

until 12:30, with 50 to 80cm waves.

We arrived on Sunday at the usual starting spot in Deepwater Bay with a nice steady wind of 10 to 12kts blowing from the North East. As usual the course selection was the result of a concerted discussion with experienced sailors prior to the race, and was vetted by one of our prominent committee members. After setting the windward mark the flags for course number 8 were raised.

15 yachts joined this race, pretty much all the usual suspects plus two newly acquired yachts who came along to 'stretch their sails' for the first time. They were Cata Kam Loong, Jacques Malle's old Kam Loong with a new name and new owner, and Bleu de toi, a little Archambault surprise bought just the day before by Gegg Daffner and Philip Jeffrey.

Just before the start the wind shifted to full Northerly, putting the windward mark totally out of place. It was swiftly removed, changing the profile of the race from an up-wind start to a reaching start. Before clearing Chung Hung Kok the fleet had already split into two packs which more or less matched the two divisions. This split remained for the whole race, to the disadvantage of the smaller boats that reached Cheung Chau at ebb tide and fell into a hole, denying them any chance to lift the silverware. After rounding Chesterman buoy to port the fleet had two options, one to the South and one more Westerly with the latter proving to be a better, steadier path.

On that particular leg, The Farr Side displayed a super goosewing on the way to Cheung Chau, I'm not entirely sure if it was intentional or due to a problem with the 'blue target' spinnaker usually on show, but it was definitely a good move as she managed to catch up with the faster boats using this technique.

In light of the discrepancy in boat performance, and therefore the big gap between the first and the last yacht, the race was shortened at Chesterman buoy on the way back to the finish. This allowed the maximum number of yachts to finish the race within the allocated time.

In the end the J/80 winner was FG3, the HKPN Winner was Diamond Queen, and the IRC Winner was Elektra. H





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ABC FROSTBITE SERIES RACE REPORT

This January, ABC introduced a new race series to the Hong Kong calendar specifically aimed at the J/80 fleet, of which ABC now has four boats. The racing was run out of Middle Island, the home base for most of the fleet, and was run over the last four Saturdays in January. The J/80 fleet is use to sailing windward/leeward courses, and while this was catered for within the series we also introduced some different race formats to mix things up and add variety.

Races I-3, Saturday 7th January

The first day of racing in the series stuck to the traditional format of standard windward/leeward courses. However, the fleet was encouraged to swap crews for the day so that they had the opportunity to see how things were done on other boats. With the date being close to the Christmas holidays there was never going to be a large entry, however four boats braved the cold weather and enjoyed a good day's sailing with *J Chi* throwing down an early gauntlet, securing three bullets.

Races 4-6, Saturday 14th January

The second day of racing saw the fleet grow to six boats with several challengers vying with *J Chi* for line honours. Race four went to the Class Secretary Dan Tulberg in *Hakawati* with *Tigrina* coming second, however *J Chi* soon regained control of the series winning the next two races, albeit only by seconds, from *Hakawati*. As with all the races, prize giving was held back at Middle Island where hot mulled wine revived sailor's spirits that might have been flagging due to the cold weather.

Race 7, Saturday 21st January

The third day of racing for the series was designed as an Islands style course. With a slightly earlier start time of 11:00 a course

was selected from our standard Summer Series courses that would ensure the fleet finished at Po Toi where a class lunch was planned at the popular Ming Kee restaurant. For this race, boats had the chance to race either fully crewed or 'double-handed'. The course took boats out to Chesterman, back to Tai Tam Bay and then out to Po Toi via Castle Rock. With the wind reaching in excess of 20kts the fleet enjoyed an exhilarating sail out to Po Toi, with some interesting broaches along the way as crews got to grips with the large asymmetric sails. Victory went to Rob Tanner's new boat named *Epekwit'k* with *Hakawati* in second and *JeNa PaBe* (a Waglan Series regular) coming in third. ABC club members Elaine and Stephen just missed the top three with a respectable fourth in their boat *FG3*. A good lunch was had at Po Toi and an informal race back to the clubhouse was arranged. Some boats just can't cruise!

Races 8-12, Saturday 28th January

The final race day of the series took the format of 'Drag Racing' which is a series of short races that included a windward mark, leeward gate (giving boats the option of a starboard or port rounding) and then a beat back up to the finish boat mid way between the marks. This style of racing typically allows crews to practice multiple starts and to hone their kite hoist and drop techniques within the pressure of a short, tight race. As expected, racing was extremely competitive and at very close quarters. With races lasting no more than 20 minutes, boats were finishing within seconds of each other with everything to play for on the last beat. Overall victory went to *Hakawati*, with *Epekwit'k* second and *Jelignite* in third place. Prize giving was again held at Middle Island with ABC getting great feedback on their inaugural series for the J/80 fleet.

o start with, a few words on sailing management for the non-initiated. The two scoring systems we use for most of our cruiser races use a similar format. Results are calculated using the IRC, a system of handicapping racing sailboats managed by the Royal Ocean Racing Club (RORC), in the United Kingdom. The rating calculation is done by measuring the boat; her length, weight, draft, sail area, etc. The result of this measurement, and the application of a 'secret formula', gives each boat her Time Corrector ratio.

The other handicap system used by our Club is the Hong Kong Pin Number, also known as the HKPN, managed by a section of the Cruiser Owner Association. This system is based on the Royal Yachting Association's Portsmouth Yardstick System (PYS). There is no measurement of boats this time but an accepted boat and crew performance calculated again by computer which gives a performance number (PN) for each yacht. This rating changes as the performance and results of the boat and its crew changes.

While still on this rating system, a mark of appreciation must be given to the HKPN committee for their splendid work on adjusting our local ratings after each race that every club runs. With such a busy Hong Kong sailing calendar, the amount of hours spent doing this work is colossal and requires dedication and passion for the sport.

After a race, each boat's elapsed time (the time she has taken to complete the course) is multiplied by her IRC or HKPN rating, which gives her corrected time. The boat with the shortest corrected time is the winner of the race.

Now that the uncertainty over result calculations has been resolved, let's look at our Club's premier competition scoreboard for the first half of the series.

The Waglan Series is composed of 10 races, of which only two can be disgarded for the overall results. Over the course of the whole series two other 'competitions within the competition' are running, called the mini series. After the first five races are completed the first mini series results are calculated. The same applies to the second mini series of the Waglan series.

Only one race can be disgarded for these mini series. The principle is very simple; a boat finishing first on a race scores I point, the second 2 points and so on. If a boat does not finish the race her score will be the number of boats participating in this race plus one. For example, on a race of I5 yachts if one boat cannot complete the race or retires her score will be I6. After five races a mini series result is calculated by adding all the five scores and removing the worst score.

The first Mini Series last year was taken by Redeye in HKPN with Yacht O and The Farr Side as first and second runner up, while Elektra led the IRC followed by Red Eye and Yacht O, but this year it looks like the competition has new leaders with Yacht O, Crystal and Kei Lun for the HKPN and Elektra, Kei Lun and Red Eye in IRC.

Kei Lun seems to be bringing a serious challenge for the usual top racer, but remember last year Chota Scye came from bottom to top and won the series overall. Nothing is over until the last race, and the more races you do the more chances you have to take the big title.

If anyone is not familiar with our racing scene and is interested in seeing these boats in action, or learning about race management, I would be more than happy to take you on board the Committee Boat on a Sunday and share with you the excitement of being a Race Officer.

he Aberdeen Boat Club 4Peaks Race is one of the toughest events on Hong Kong's sporting calendar. Eighty challenging sea miles, four rugged peaks for a total of 2,422m ascent, and the winter weather all combine to make this race a world renowned extreme sports challenge.

This year the defending champion was *Wicked*, skippered by Tristan Stewart. Hot contenders, *Red Kite II* (Olivier Descamps), *Whiskey Jack* (Nick Southward) and *Blackjack* (Glenn Smith), were out to snatch the top prize as the fleet got away at 11:00 on Saturday, 4 February, in a brisk breeze from the start in Tai Tam Bay. Dark horse *Circus* (Angus Harris), new to the race and well out in the lead as the yachts passed Cape d'Aguilar, was another to watch.

But *Blackjack* was already on the way to winning as they reached Ma On Shan. They had a killer app. Unseen by the others, they launched a kayak and runners Daniel Brown and Pierre Arnaud Lemagnan streaked ashore while the leading boats struggled with almost no wind. Even flying spinnakers to within metres of their chosen landing points could not get *Wicked* or *Red Kite*'s runners ashore fast enough to regain the lead.

Through the long, testing hours ahead, the wind dropped as Violet Hill and Lantau Peak were ticked off the list. Still *Blackjack* held on to its lead. Then, just south of Cheung Chau at 03:00 on Sunday morning, they parked up for 50 minutes. No wind.

Red Kite II reeled them in and hit the beach for Lamma Island's Mt Stenhouse just 10-15 minutes behind them. Wicked was just five minutes away. At the finish, one and a half intense hours later, Blackjack's once seemingly unassailable 53 minute

lead was down to just seven and they had just missed a clean sweep of the three top prizes. The premier IRC Handicap prize was snatched by *Red Kite II. Blackjack* took line honours and the HK Performance Handicap prizes. *Wicked* took 3rd place, cementing a three year record of a top three place.

In the B Division for the smaller, slower and older boats, 49 year old *Koala* had to retire when rough seas opened some of the seams between the planks of her hull. That left a battle between relative newcomer *Banter* (Rob Sallons) and seasoned campaigner and long term champion *Rhapsody* (Jack Ng Wing Hung). *Banter* took an early lead and held onto it through Violet Hill, Mt Stenhouse and Peak 300 at Hok Tsui to the finish. It wasn't enough to hold off *Rhapsody* on handicap, so the little Sonata 8 took the B Division trophy – back on a winning streak after last year's retirement following gear failure.

Herman Wong, first-time Four Peaks skipper of *Fuzzy Duck* dealt with many problems, including hitting a rock, but finished the race at 17:50, the last boat home. For this he wins the Fiddlers Folly Flask, given by Race Officer, Stephen Davies in 1986. Herman said, "It seemed impossible for us to finish in time, then we heard we could keep going till 19:00. That was the greatest news. All the clouds above us cleared."

The prize giving party, held at ABC on Friday 10 February, was well attended and enjoyed by all. The usual banter and race stories were, as expected, peppered with challenges for next year's race. And so, with grudge matches set and the beginnings of race tactics starting to take shape, preparations for the next ABC 4Peaks Race started anew.

DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE UPDATE

Further to the Commodore's letter in the Jan/Feb issue of Horizons and the club's commitment to keep members informed, the following progress has been made in relation to the Middle Island redevelopment project. As mentioned the club is now deep in a period of consultations, documentation and planning.

A "Government Task Group" has been set up to do the following:

- Commence dialogue with the District Lands Officer and review provisional plans for the Middle Island redevelopment.
- Investigate the recruitment of 3rd party team members to assist with all required Government submissions and documentation
- Update the Development Committee and General Committee on progress, issues and revised time lines.

As the club moves along with the process, the Development Committee will post findings for members in

Horizons, by email and on the club website. More detailed designs will follow on from Government feedback, Committee feedback and Member feedback.

In the short term the Development Committee is looking at modest functional enhancements to the changing rooms and lavatories situated on Middle Island to assist with the current level of usage. This is likely to take place after Easter, and an update will be included in the next issue of Horizons.

Finally, the Development Committee welcomes comments from all members and volunteers. Please feel free to let us know in your email your particular interests and your ability to volunteer to help us improve Middle Island.



At this time of year we tend to think that


