


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COMMODORE'S LETTER

embers holding moorings and hardstanding places will shortly be receiving a new Allocated Mooring / Space Agreement to replace their present mooring or hardstanding agreements. The new agreements are updates on the previous and clarify requirements for insurance, liabilities and obligations in these times of higher demand for moorings and spaces. You will be asked to sign up for the new agreements which will supersede the previous versions which will be withdrawn. Generally the moorings and spaces will be transferred in the new agreements, and subsequently new bye-laws will spell out clearer rules for allocations in changes of holders.

In these days of ever evolving electronic phones, pads, kindles and tablets, bye-laws covering usage of electronic devices can quickly become inadequate and outdated. The relevant bye-law has therefore been reviewed and revised to cover all current types of mobile phones and electronic devices with the intent to maintain the tranquility of the members' areas. It allows usage of pads, tablets and devices in certain areas in silent mode only, and indicates where mobile telephones may be operated i.e. in

club rooms with fixed line telephones, car parks and in the boat store area of Middle Island beyond the barrier gate.

Aberdeen Boat Club proudly hosted the first ever Hong Kong 29er Class Championships on behalf of the 29er Association, initially planned for 17 & 18 March 2012. Regrettably, due to low winds, only one race was completed on the 17th (won by ABC's Peter Simpson with crew Louis Bond-Smith) with insufficient breeze for any other races. The Association decided to run additional races to allow completion of the minimum of four, on 14 & 15 April 2012. However, the wind gods were not with us on either day and the championships were not completed. No doubt the Association will try to secure a windier calendar slot for the next event!

While our 29er and Optimist training squads prepare for their bigger events later in the year, the next cruiser event of note in ABC's calendar is the Classic Yacht Rally being held on the second weekend of May, a two day event with, this year, overnighting at Middle island. While other details appear elsewhere in *Horizons*, spectators and competitors can look forward to a fine fleet of classic, vintage and antique craft, with a fair proportion of the crewmembers



falling into the latter categories!

Other events in May include the annual sportfishing challenge between the Mandarin Sportfishing Club and ABC on the 5th, and the Annual Prize Giving for cruisers and dinghies alike, on 19th May 2012. Meanwhile, the serious racers are preparing for the traditional Summer Series, competing for the Farr Cup and Tamarisk Plate over A to B courses, finishing at various island restaurants from Po Toi to Cheung Chau.

FLAG OFFICER'S REPORT

Dear Members.

It is my great pleasure once again to give you a snapshot of the Club's financial position. In these trying economic times it is important to be kept up to date with the Club's current status and future plans, as they pertain to its finances.

The ABC does not exist in a vacuum; it is part of the greater Hong Kong economy which is, itself, part of a global economy. In times like these both private and commercial investors alike are looking for a secure investment. Gold, for example, is traditionally regarded as safe, and it has proven to be so in these turbulent economic times.

At its core the ABC is part of the leisure industry. This sector is still growing reasonably steadily here, and is generally experiencing less turmoil than others. Hong Kong, as a whole, seriously lacks fully equipped and developed, outdoor recreational venues and the Middle Island Development Project (MIDP) is precisely the type of project that will add value to both the Club, and to Hong Kong.

Now, from the macro to the micro, let us talk about the Club and its finances.


While the club generates revenue in excess of its operating requirements, its

cash reserves do not permit immediate funding of large projects such as those on Middle Island. The MIDP is a big project for our Club which requires a major capital investment, and the development of alternative revenue generating mechanisms. It is, above all, an investment in the future – the future of the Club and ultimately the future of Hong Kong. The long term benefits to members will repay the current investment manifold.

This project will rejuvenate our club and give our members a beautiful additional venue. A couple of weeks ago the South China Morning Post ran an article on the chronic shortage of recreational berths in Hong Kong. By all estimates the new marina in Middle Island will be full even before completion.

Again, this is a major investment with a long-term time span to completion. The project is progressing, albeit slowly at this the planning and application stage. However, I can assure club members that the financing is sound. John Berry, our Commodore, and all the committee members are deeply committed to seeing the Middle Island project to completion, and so am I.

BENETEAU SEA TRIALS

very year, for a full week, Beneteau organizes press trials of the new boats introduced into the Beneteau power and sailboat ranges. This year's sea trials took place in La Ciotat, France.

At this media event every effort is made to meet the requirements of the attending marine journalists, with a dozen boats available to test in pleasant surroundings, speedboats made available for taking photo shoots as well as the presence of Beneteau personnel, particularly those in charge of developing the boats, to answer technical questions and discuss features.

This year nine boats were available to test: four sailing yachts and five motor boats. The most popular of the motorboats, with the largest number of trials, was the Barracuda 9 which was tested by journalists from 48 magazines. On the whole, 57 magazines from all over the world, including specialized members of the European, Chinese, Russian, and Australian maritime press came to test these new boats. "Already these markets contribute approximately 40 percent of the company's turnover;" said Bryan Jones, President of Fairline Boats Asia.


The Targa 38, despite its compact size, offers more accommodation and practical features than nearly any other sports

cruiser in its class. The swept-back radar arch gives the flowing lines of the Targa 38 a sharp finish, while the long, panoramic hull windows add to its distinctive, streamlined look. An extended bathing platform on the rear makes boarding easy with or without tender, and the aft deck boasts plenty of seating. Downstairs, the saloon is light and airy with a central entertainment panel and galley kitchen. Two sleeping cabins are positioned fore and aft of the saloon, and the master cabin features an en-suite bathroom.

The Squadron 58 has been designed to maximise the use of light and open space. A three-stage sliding patio door connects the cockpit to the saloon, whilst high level lockers have been relocated and storage units integrated into the saloon sofa.

The full-beam master stateroom features panoramic hull windows, full size wardrobes and a state-of-the-art bathroom layout. Newly designed mid-level lockers in the starboard guest cabin are twice as wide as previous models.

FEADSHIP LAUNCHES M.Y. HAMPSHIRE II

eadship has launched the 78.50m custom motoryacht

Hampshire II, for an experienced Feadship owner with a great love of action and sports. From the foredeck ball court to the 25-metre high crow's mast, this latest addition to the Feadship fleet is a yacht built for adventure.

During the launch Feadship director Dick van Lent paid tribute to the owner of *Hampshire II*. "It has been a pleasure and a privilege to create such a unique vessel for such a passionate sailor. As an experienced Feadship owner, he really appreciates the qualities of a Feadship and the fun of being closely involved in the design and construction process."

"This is exactly the sort of client we love to work with, and Hampshire II is exactly the kind of superyacht that Feadship owners deserve. She is built around every conceivable sporting activity while also offering exceptional facilities for those who like to take things a little easier. Many of his friends and family were involved in the various milestones of the build, and now they are all set to reap the rewards."

In the hours leading up to the launch ceremony various teams representing the owner's guests and personnel from the yard played football on the foredeck. The yacht's helicopter landing platform, finished in teak, can be transformed into a playing field for basketball, tennis, baseball, badminton and of course football. A giant net is placed around

the deck to ensure continuity of the games.

Hampshire II also features a 'beach club' with two platforms that open up either side of the yacht, in addition to the swim platform at the transom with its hydraulic swim ladder. On the sundeck a crow's nest atop the mast is reached by a two-person elevator and offers panoramic views high above the water. For the truly adventurous, a zip wire is connected to the mast to which one can attach a rope sling and slide from the crow's nest down to the water.

While the exterior profile is modern, *Hampshire II's* interior is a classic affair. Highlights include a typical English style bar on the bridge deck in place of the traditional lounge.

The engine room has a passageway through the middle with full height glass walls. Only three colours are used in this area – Ferrari red, white and black which, combined with lots of stainless steel and the clever use of spotlights, make the engine room look fantastic. The same can be said of the wheelhouse with its glass-covered dashboard and touchscreen controls.

Like everything else on this vessel, state-of-the-art technologies have been combined with traditional craftsmanship and in doing so, Feadship has set a new standard for owners who enjoy using their superyacht to the maximum.

Beneteau First Series yachts have been sweeping races around the world in what looks like being the marque's best competitive year yet.

In Australia, the First 40 *Just Cruisin* skippered by Commodore Tony Carter won all classes in the regatta for the 50th anniversary of the Royal Perth Yacht Club. Over a distance of 235 nautical miles between Perth and Cape Naturalist and in varying wind conditions, they dominated over a top class line-up. Not

only did the First 40 win all IRC classes, but it also won in the YAH category and was given the title of overall winner.

Meanwhile Cyril Baillie on his First 40 Sayan Madraco, used to being placed up front in the Mediterranean, won the Semaine Internationale de Marseille (International Week) in IRC 2 after a great and yet uncertain battle with the runner-up. It is the 2nd victory in the magnificent harbour of Marseille for Sayan Madraco in 15 days.

The First 35, No First No Fun, and its

skipper Gianluca Canale won in all ORC classes during the winter championship of West Liguria and the team did it again with a very fine victory in IRC and ORC, during international week at Alassio.

These initial results are a sign of a very good season to come for Gianluca Canale, who has won many victories in the past on the various models of the First range.

ACHAMBAULT RESULTS

Over the Easter weekend some 80 Archambault sailboats competed at La Trinité sur Mer for Spi Ouest France, this season's first big championship on the Atlantic French Coast. Present were 44 Grand Surprises, 12 M34's, 10 A35's, six A31's, four Surprises, three A40RC's and a single Suspens, a fine representation of the Achambault fleet.

From this fleet Achambault took four

podium finishes. An A35 named Ame Hasle skipped by F.Y Escoffier won in IRC2, while the A31 Batistyl led by C. Legloahec took third place in IRC3. In IRC4B, the surprise came from the Surprises with two of their number taking the first two spots on the winners' platform. First was a boat called Chercheur d'Eponge skippered by H. Drieu, and second was Souezhadenn, helmed by E. Lebeau.

It was also a good weekend for the company at Marseille during the traditional SNIM, with four more podium finishes: In IRCB the A40RC *Glen Ellen le Marseillais*, finished second, while the A35 *Prime Time* won in IRCC. In the IRC4 division an A31, *Jeanne* took the winner's place, while *Solenn* took the third.

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2012 LASER 2000 SAILING PROGRAMME

BC runs regular Laser 2000 dinghy courses as a next step for those who have completed a beginner's sailing course, or as a refresher to try and encourage people back into dinghy sailing who may not have been on the water for a while. Here we present two reviews of the recent course held in April. Check our website for dates and availability of upcoming courses.

"Having spent my first five-plus years sailing in keelboats, I felt I needed some formal instruction on handling smaller vessels, especially since they are prone to capsize. After three full days of instruction there have been many interesting surprises and revelations. While the points of sail are the same, the inherent instability of the boats mean the two main manoeuvres, tacking and gybing, are far more challenging. From handling the tiller extension, to timing crew and helm transitions, a high degree of agility and dexterity are required.

Spanning three days in back to back weekends, we experienced weather ranging from mid winter cold (at least by HK standards) to near summer heat, gloomy overcast and rain to sparkling sunshine and bright blue sky. In spite of persistently light winds, we managed to find spots of 'pressure' and cover a lot of material including hove-to, man overboard, rigging and using a gennaker, and fully recovering a capsized boat. Because the material is fairly extensive and the time is short, the atmosphere is fairly intense and the pace is brisk. Kevin, our seasoned and energetic instructor, keeps the mood fun and upbeat, which helps foster an atmosphere of teamwork and collegiality.

Middle Island is a great place to bring all of the sailing

elements together. Sheltered and secluded, it feels remote from Hong Kong's bustle and is an easy place to launch in challenging weather. It is also ideally positioned for accessing Repulse Bay, Stanley, Lamma and Po Toi Islands as well as less sheltered waterways when looking for fresher breezes. The Club's facilities have provided a pleasant retreat for lunch and at the end of the day where you can warm up with a coffee or hot chocolate or relax with a beer while taking in the backdrop of Deep Water Bay, moored yachts and the various ferry, kayak and dinghy activity. It was a great experience and I'd recommend the course to others!" (Jim Veneau)

"It's been a blast! The two main points I've taken from the course being how confidence can increase the fun you have while sailing, and how having fun while you learn increases your confidence!

The first day saw the group getting to know each other and the instructors Kevin and Jade, together with Assistant Instructor Louis. The majority of the group had recently finished the level I and 2 dinghy certificates, and had done little sailing since the beginner's course. First up was some revision on the basics, then a great introduction from Kevin on rigging a 2000. Once rigged we hit the water, and although the wind was a little inconsistent there were some great periods of fast smooth sailing with a nice opportunity to get the cobwebs out in light winds.

The afternoon session saw a little more theory, with the focus being on improving sailing habits, remembering the 'five essentials' and reviewing our morning session. Getting out in the

afternoon was a mini disaster as unfortunately the light winds become no winds and we spent the afternoon chasing whatever breeze there was. At least there was the opportunity to reflect on life and get to know your crew member while bobbing about on the water...

Day two was the start of something brilliant. Firstly, the rigging practice from yesterday came in very handy and confidence levels with the 2000 were on the rise already. Kevin and Jade then introduced the 3rd 'gennaker' sail to the group, together with plenty of handy tips for rigging and sailing before we went out. We then all rigged our own boats with the gennaker with a minimum of fuss. Once ready, it was time to put the theory to practice, with all boats heading to Deep Water Bay and preparing for our first hoist of the gennaker.

The winds were still on the light side, but far more consistent, and there was a nice downwind breeze blowing from Deep Water Beach straight out past MI. In our boat, Edwin on the helm positioned us in the hoist zone, and with a couple of long draws on the line we were away! Gennaker raised, speed increasing – and we actually looked like we knew what we were doing! Well up until the first gybe...

With a couple of gybes under our belt, things just became pure fun. Slight adjustments on the helm from Edwin, trim on the gennaker with changes in pressure. Tips from Kevin and Jade on the water helped us understand why we were having so much fun. Staying downwind, we managed to get round the back of MI, past Repulse Bay zigzagging around like a bunch of angry bees! Lots of smiles at lunch as all the crews had a great time hitting some speed on the water with the third sail.

After lunch there was some practical revision of the morning's sail before finishing off the day with some safety drills – righting

an inverted 2000 can be a challenge. Under the careful guidance of Kevin and Jade we all learned some nifty hints to make it a whole lot easier and more effective.

Day three and the final day of the course started off with a change in instructors, with Jade making way for the return of Marcus to the ABC team. Welcome back Marcus, it was great to have your experience with us. Unfortunately, there was very little wind on the water. So after rigging the boats and the final instruction of the course, we hit the water and made our way out to Deep Water Bay. Upwind in the light breeze was slow going indeed, but even in the super light conditions, once the gennaker was hoisted everyone was smiling again.

Afternoon sailing on the final day was a tad surreal, with us making use of the channel out the front of the MI clubhouse as our final training area as there simply wasn't any wind anywhere else! It was a great show to see us all sailing downwind past ABC, blue gennakers flying! The final part of the course, once the boats were de-rigged and put away, involved a pictorial review of the course from paparazzi Kevin. There were lots of shots, some memorable and some less so, to reflect on as a group.

So I'm sitting here in my office, and I can't wait to get out again on the water. The course has been a great way to build on my beginner's course, and really come to terms with the boat. I'm much more confident, and let's face it, getting out on the water and having fun is what it is all about! Massive thanks to the instructors Kevin, Jade, Marcus and Louis. I highly recommend the 2000 course, great instructors, great boats and great classmates. See you all on the water!" (Alex Foster)




