

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

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Commodore's Letter

elcome back to those who have been away. Those who stuck it out through the summer enjoyed weather good for sailing, boating, cruiser and dinghy racing and the odd trip to Po Toi. Only one No.

The Club is looking in good order, in particular the playground and carpark areas after revamping.

On the racing side, revised sailing instructions will soon be issued in time for the 2013-14 Waglan Series, which starts on 6 October. Changes include restoration of Division B with its shorter courses. Some of the new and amended courses include a new Tai Tam Club mark and reduced shipping course crossings. The successful joint dinghy racing with RHKYC is continuing, with Autumn Series racing on Saturdays, and Winter, Spring and Summer series on Sundays.

We celebrate Sunseeker's 10th year of sponsorship of the Opening Regatta on the 7th and 8th of September. The growth of both dinghy racing and skiff and day-cat racing and their different speeds this year have been recognised through the creation of a third course location, with only the cruisers now racing south of the shipping channel.

A few events on the water to look out for in September and October:

- the revival of Cruisers vs. Dinghies Challenge on 1 September,
- ABC's defence of its title in its regular gamefishing tournament with the Mandarin SFC in September, and
- the annual ABC Fiesta flotilla on Sunday, 20 October 2013. This is a fun Commodore



day event that is open to all vessels that float and can reach Po Toi Island.

We have recently been made aware that insurance companies could and will now fight any claim for incidents at sea if a collision report has not been filed within 24 hours with Hong Kong Marine Department. Section 57 of the Merchant Shipping (Local Vessels) Ordinance – CAP 548, which states as follows:

Owners, agents or coxswains of vessels to report any incident to Marine Department within 24 hours that involves any one of the following occurrences:

- (a) a local vessel is involved in a collision with another vessel, a port facility or other property;
- (b) a local vessel sinks or becomes stranded or disabled;
- (c) a person is killed or seriously injured on board a local vessel as a result of an accident;
- (d) an explosion or fire occurs on board a local vessel;
- (e) damage is caused by a local vessel to a sections for a full set of the declaration and

port facility or other property; or (f) a person, cargo or equipment is lost

overboard from a local vessel
From the Club's perspective and
requirements, only incidents that happen
during a race for which a claim might or
will be made will need a report from us.
But boat owners themselves have the
duty to make such reports within the 24hour window, whether or not they shall
file a claim. Insurance companies in Hong
Kong have begun to require a copy of the
Marine Department accident report form
when assessing a claim, therefore, please

Flag Officer's Report

trust that you have all had a good summer and look forward to autumn's cooler weather. I would like to take the opportunity to update you on a number of issues and events.

The Club's General and House committees are in the process of overhauling our club rules and regulations for updated bye-laws this autumn. For now I would like to remind members about some Club rules that have been breached repeatedly this summer, on the use of mobile phones in the Club and helpers. Some members have answered their phone in the restaurants and others have brought domestic helpers to assist with children.

We recently updated our rules on communication devices with requests that members use a phone only in areas of the Club next to where Club landlines are, or in hallways and the car park. Domestic helpers are allowed in the Club as guests, but are not permitted to perform any support activities without prior permission from the General Manager.

General guidelines from our bye-laws follow:

- (i) No private or domestic staff may enter any part of the Club premises at any time without the consent of the General Committee who may delegate the granting of such consent to the General Manager.
- (ii) Carers for disabled members or their

- children may be permitted to enter Club premises to care for such persons.
- (iii) Parents are responsible for their children therefore, private staff are not supposed to be brought to the Club to look after children.
- (iv) Private staff may be allowed to drop off children taking a course with the Club and wait for them at a designated area assigned by the management on the day. Progress has been made with the IT system, which will be up and running in

the New Year. May I remind members to complete the questionnaire that the Club sent out asking for updates of your personal details – if you have not done this, you may collect a questionnaire from the office. Benefits of the overhaul of our IT system that members will see include e-invoices and more detailed access to your account online.

The Galley coffee shop menu now will be refreshed on a regular basis. Already we have had some very positive comments. If dishes you like have come off the menu, you will be glad to know the next new menu will be launched in October. We are also looking to extend the range of events on Middle Island. The south Indian curry buffet and the ABC seafood barbecue were well-attended. The next event not to be missed is the Mid-Autumn Festival evening with mooncakes, under the open sky if weather permits it, on 19 September.



We are fortunate to have a photograph exhibition on the corridor to the Four Peaks restaurant. These photos were taken and framed by a local photographer, Mike Abbott. If you have ideas about events or shows at the Club, please feel free to contact me or other General Committee members or staff.

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





he Summer Series' second race opened with an average-to-poor start but we were up with leading boats until a bad call by the skipper over the salvage barge-exclusion zone. Smart sailors went to windward. Dummy went to leeward. *May 13*, our J/80 competition, leads us round Castle Rock by five minutes ... a lifetime.

That's when the fun really began.

Kite set up for a port hoist. Well, that's a mistake. Now we want to go off on starboard ... wondering how come we didn't notice everyone going off on starboard ... wait ... maybe not a

mistake. Two box ships headed in for Kwai Tsing. By heading up white sail reaching on the 'wrong' gybe we are better placed ...

Skipper calls the gybe hoist. Crew fluffs the hoist. Skipper yells ... then gybes back to clear the wrap ... gybes back again. Crew utterly bemused, stagger round cockpit, and mast ... purple kite sheets tangling like angry, thin snakes, green, gold and black cloth flapping and wrapping like surrealist can of Carlsberg ... I wish and ... No! Have to gybe back again. Those darned yellow marker buoys round the wreck-lifting barge are here again. Will we ever escape them?

But slip neatly past the stern of Hamburg Süd Santa Ines where May 13 has been broaching madly trying to get upwind enough to do the same. Meantime the rest of the fleet are way over the horizon ... or seems like ... Calamansi, on our heels for the first half of Summer Race 1, certainly is. She's almost at the ABC buoy, or so it seems ... we think ... dismay ... despondency ... silent skipper ... what's wrong??? Focussed. Right angles. Max VMG.

Eyes on the horizon to port. Line squall approaching. Thickening up in patches. Mate, imagining 25 knots+, starts drilling new crew on drop just in case. But ... no! Great wind. Whee ... 10.6 knots.

Need to get ready for next gybe. Tutor new crew on gybe! "Watch the luff," goes the cry. "Look for where we're going ... not at the horizon!"

We all looked. For the ABC buoy. Where is it? Boats ahead of us spanned out over an arc of 60 degrees. They're all looking ... then up pops that other J/80 we've been closing. Where has he been? Catch him on starboard and ... not far from ABC buoy now, surely? Skipper aims for middle of the spread-out pack.

"They put it in the wrong place ... it's drifted ... nobody can find it," mutters the skipper.

Then up it pops tucked closer to Un Kok than usual ... and we've nearly rounded the next ship at anchor and headed off to Cheung Chau.

Close J/80 encounters ensue. How come we picked up half a mile?

Crew watching the luff after all ... and skipper watching crew ... teamwork.

And then the leg across Foul Bay, kite strapped in tight, heading far too high for speed, trying to keep upwind of that pesky J/80 leading by a boat length or two under our lee bow!

"Aha," says skipper to himself, spotting the tideline and back eddy under Wong Chuk Kok. "I'll get him here ... if he doesn't spot it too." He didn't ... stood out into the tide. We roared downwind running square ... almost by the lee ... rocks gnashing close to port. A hundred metres to go. Gybe out. Brilliant crew with quick, slick work. Gybe back ... another bit of ace crew work. Final dash for the line. Over ... wah! Two-hundred metres ... and a 20-second deficit turns into a lead of two minutes. Tides matter.

Summer Series Race number 3, held on Sunday, 7
July. The weather for the start promised a beautiful day with clear sunny skies and a steady breeze of 10-12 knots coming from the south-west. ABC Race Officer Eileen Sze selected course 31, which would see the fleet race over to the island of Cheung Chau. The course offered up a new venue for lunch, and a suitable anchorage within Cheung Chau's typhoon shelter for the prevailing wind.

As the fleet left on a combined start, it was a quiet affair with a light breeze providing a gentle fetch to the first mark

of Chesterman. The larger boats, with their tall rigs, made the most of what wind was available and soon stretched the lead to Chesterman.

Steve Manning's *Walawala 2* led the charge across the channel to find the ABC mark before the fleet could ease off and head towards Cheung Chau Rock.

Although rather shy, it was just possible for some boats to hold their reaching kites and a-sails, and soon the fleet spread out across the long leg to the island. Once rounding the rock, it was a short beat up the south-east side of the island, where the race officer had laid the finish line.





Dramatic turn of weather

Once finished, it was a quick motor into the typhoon shelter of Cheung Chau where quite a few vacant government buoys were available for the fleet to moor up against. Ferried in by sampans and the ABC support boats, the crews made their way to the New Baccarat Seafood Restaurant for a traditional seafood lunch. Virtually taking over the restaurant, various crews were enjoying the fayre on offer, when the weather took a sudden and dramatic turn for the worse. The heavens opened and the wind picked up to the point where most people began to wonder if there was a mini-typhoon on the way. Most boats' crews huddled down under the plastic curtains

lowered by the restaurant staff, but *The Farr Side* and *Jelignite* crews, determined to stick it out, stayed on their outside table sheltered by a few strategically placed notice boards. As the weather deteriorated, it was a fairly unanimous decision that the comfort of the restaurant was the best place to be and another round of drinks was ordered, whilst the results of the day's racing were read out to the delight of the boats crews who had won their classes.

The weather did eventually abate and the restaurant soon emptied as boats and their crews made a quick dash back to Aberdeen. All agreed it was an entertaining day's sailing and a novel change to head to Cheung Chau. Race results follow.

Calling All Dinghy Sailors!

ver the 26-27 October weekend, the Hebe Haven Yacht Club will host its annual 24-hour dinghy race to benefit local charities. The ABC has been closely involved for over 10 years, and definitely will enter teams again this year.

For those unfamiliar with the race, each boat is raced by a team of sailors on a roster over the 24-hour race period (from 2 pm on Saturday to 2 pm on Sunday). Team points are awarded for "laps" completed on a course set in the harbour off Hebe Haven Yacht Club; the team with the most points wins. The course is patrolled for the entire time by safety boats, so don't worry about sailing at night. In fact, it's magic!

ABC will enter four teams, each to sail one of the following boats: a Wayfarer, a Laser 2000, an RS Feva and a Laser Pico. Anyone with a Level 2 Certificate may sign up for this fun and worthwhile event. The Laser 2000 team is an adult-only team; the RS Feva and Laser Pico teams are juniors. (The Wayfarer team is invitation only – and will be looking to take first place this year!) A responsible adult must accompany young sailors whilst at Hebe Haven.

Fine family outing: Supporters and teammates can cheer from the dockside with its terrific view of the race, the basis of a great family weekend. ABC members can sign for food and drink at Hebe Haven, and entertainment will include games stalls (and our own Kevin Lewis as the DJ and MC!).

The 2012 event raised \$1 million for local charities. This year's chosen charities are The Children's Cancer Foundation, Enlighten – Action for Epilepsy, Ideal – The Intellectually Disabled Education and Advocacy League, Sailability Hong Kong and TREATS.

Junk needed for ABC team: In the past we have benefitted from the weekend loan of a junk, which makes a huge difference to the comfort and spirits of the sailors. We would be very grateful if a member could lend a junk this year as a home base.

The ABC's Louis Bond-Smith and RHKYC's Campbell Manzoni teamed up this summer as Hong Kong's entry into the RS500 Worlds at Gottskar in Sweden. Hong Kong (and more specifically the ABC) has entered the RS500 Worlds three times, and this year the team once again did us proud, finishing fifth overall (out of a fleet of 35) and gaining a bullet in the final race of the Championships.

ith only about four organisational e-mails and a couple of months of waiting, Team HKG regrouped in Gottskar, Sweden. We rocked up, the wind was blowing 20 knots, the weather was stunning, the people were ridiculously friendly, and even the sea was warm.

Next thing we know, we were handed a brand-new RS500 still in its plastic bag. We weren't really sure what we had done to get such a sweet deal and were seriously keen to get on the water.

With one day of training on the water – having not sailed for a half-year and having sailed together very rarely – and Campbell almost never having sailed the 500 before, we felt we got going pretty well.

With 35 boats entered, we said we'd be happy with a finish in the top-half of the Worlds fleet. We did well in the first race to get a 13th and our results only improved after that with only top 10s.

We had a massive range of conditions, winds light and strong, both flat water and big waves, with some heavy conditions making for some awesome downwind sailing. The fleet was great, on the water and off – loads of singing between races on the day of non-stop rain, fantastic off-thewater socials, and brilliant racing.

And what better way to end the week than by finishing in first place in the last race, bringing us to fifth place overall? A big thanks to the whole team who ran the event in Gottskar and all the sailors for making the event awesome!



ABC Competitor Report



IODA Optimist World Championships

2013 at Italy's Lake Garda By Mike Wright

n July, the ABC's Matthew Wright joined four other young sailors from the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club and the Hong Kong Sea School to compete at the International Optimist Dinghy Association (IODA) Optimist World Championships 2013, held at Lake Garda, Italy. Some 260 sailors from 60 countries took part.

The competition over eight days comprised individual fleet racing and a team-racing event. The Hong Kong team was led by Richard Knight of RHKYC. Matthew, at 12 years of age the team's youngest, gained his first experience of a truly international competition.

Arriving several days before the start, the team practiced races and joined the opening ceremony with a procession of all teams through the old town of Riva del Garda. The team experienced their first "Ora," the famous wind that most days springs up from the south and occasionally tops 20 knots. The lake was often full of boats and windsurfers, and during one practice race, the Optimist fleet was interrupted by a racing fleet of Melges, most determined not to give way!

Hong Kong's first Worlds team-racing win

The actual regatta was even more competitive than expected. Racing was in four fleets of about 60 boats, with two races a day. Getting a good clear start and holding a lane throughout was crucial, with any error or penalty resulting in many places lost. Halfway through the regatta, there was a break for the team-racing. Hong Kong lost against Chile but won the next race, against Japan, providing Hong Kong with its first teamracing win at any world championship. However, Hong Kong was eliminated from the competition after falling to Finland.

When fleet racing resumed, winds were shifty and less steady. Matthew had some good starts and first beats, but it was hard to hold on throughout a race. By the end of the regatta, the top-placed Hong Kong boat was Calum Gregor in 93rd. Singapore showed continued dominance at this level with first place overall in the fleet, team-racing and girls' categories. Matthew takes the IODA 2013 Worlds as a great learning experience, and looks forward to more opportunities in the future to continue his sailing career at ABC. H







une 2013 saw the fourth Macau International Dinghy Regatta, and this year the ABC sent its biggest team yet, 17 sailors with around 20 parents and supporters making the trip for one of the most fun dinghy events of the year.

As in past years, the Macau regatta is aimed at intermediate-level sailors and is positioned as a family event, with parents and friends from all three Hong Kong clubs making the trip and having a great "weekend away."

Nearly 40 rooms were booked in the Westin Hotel on Hac Sa Beach, with a total of 70 sailors competing in divisions for Toppers, Picos, Fevas, Laser 1s and Laser Stratos.

As in previous years, the ABC supported the event by shipping Club Picos and a small club safety boat over to Macau, joined this year by HHYC and RHKYC who also sent dinghies.

Geelong Sales once again kindly sponsored the ABC team, offsetting nearly all of the costs incurred by the Club – huge thanks on behalf of the Club go to Ian Skeggs!

Wonderful clear skies and a fresh breeze on the Friday setup day were replaced by a T3 signal on Saturday morning as tropical storm Rumbia passed to the south.

After a delay to wait for the lowering of the signal, all competitors took to the water from the AVM sailing centre (Associação de Vela de Macau) at noon on Saturday.

The first race was started in windy conditions with building waves. As the tide went out, the swell increased with waves of 3m or more, and 16 - 20 knots of wind making conditions exciting and very challenging.

In fact these were some of the largest waves many of our younger sailors had encountered, and with multiple capsizes and waves increasing further.

The race committee wisely decided to curtail racing for the day. Competitors returned to the beach ready and eager for the evening's barbecue at the Miramar Restaurant.







Near-perfect conditions

Sunday saw almost perfect-sailing conditions with a good 10 knots of building breeze and a reduced but still exciting swell. To ensure the successful completion of a total of five races (allowing one discard), lunch was brought out to competitors on the water and the Sunday windward-leeward racing was both competitive and close. Prizegiving followed later on Sunday afternoon.

Special congratulations must go to ABC sailors Kyler Nunan and Harriette Edmonds who finished second in the Topaz Division; Madeleine Walker and Ralph Summers, and Ryan and Cedric Wong, who finished third and fourth in Pico respectively; and Oliver Wong and Julian Chawla fourth in the Feva division.

Overall, a superb weekend; without a doubt one of the most fun events in the dinghy sailing year. The Macau sailors, led by Eric Crowter and Dennis Bordais have done a great job to improve and expand the event and it was a huge success. The 2014 date is already set – 21 and 22 June – mark it now in your diary as a weekend not to be missed!





the summer Mediterranean.

I was bound to a rendezvous at the small marina there with ABC friends made in the early '80s, Melita and Ben Corbeek. Their Peterson 36, Cariño, had moored alongside our Yamaha 30, the first Fiddler's Green, in the Aberdeen Typhoon Shelter. They learned to sail with the ABC and raced against us around Beaufort Island, Fury Rocks, Po Toi ... Now, 30 years later, I was on my way for a sail with Melita and Ben ... and Cariño.

flood of memories ...

I was in the yard where Fiddler's Green II had been depoxed, where Elaine and I had painted the hull green in 1998. There was our old berth before the long return voyage to Southeast Asia and Singapore in 1999-2001. I could see Cap Béar and the entrance to Port Vendres just down the coast. We'd arrived there in Fiddler's in October 1993, 27,000 miles out from Hong Kong via Australia, New Zealand, the Pacific Islands, the Indian Ocean and the Red Sea.

Then further into the past, our departure from Middle Island in January 1990. The club boat - the Invicta that's still doing sterling work - was dressed overall. John Makin, the thengeneral manager, and Ah Kee fired the gun to start our 40,000 mile odyssey ...

... but there was D

Ben Corbeek. Older to be sure. But always the bronzed Ben we knew so well of 30 years ago, as if there'd been no years in-between.

The warmth of years of friendship washed between us and we began talking about the boats around us ... Port Argelès ... how things have changed ... as if there'd been no interval since last we'd met at the marina in 1999 and today.

Which brings us to

Cariño and her effervescent chief mate, Melita Coorbeek. There was Melita's smiling face at the main hatch, as ever, in warm welcome. It may have been eight years since last we'd sailed together. It felt like a week or two.

The Med beckoned. The back end of the night breeze off the mountains was blowing down the trots, inhibiting Cariño's



natural prop walk to starboard. No worries for Team *Cariño*. They had hacked for short-handed exits in any conditions. Without a glitch the heavy, 1980's cruiser was on her way.

Then we all remembered the day after Fiddler's Green arrived from Ampuria Brava (another ABC connection – but that's for another time). A vicious sou'easterly autumn gale had demolished the outer seawall closing the marina for a month or so. Sometimes you're lucky ...

Once clear of the marina Ben nipped forward and got the main up (I hope I'm as limber when I'm 80). Back in the cockpit Melita got the genny out. It was around 1300. The first breaths of the regular-as-clockwork daily sea breeze of Le Grand Bleu (the Great Blue) were making from the east.

"Will you take the helm, Stephen?" asked Ben. Close-hauled, *Cariño* settled into her comfortable lope and we headed SSE for the horizon.

La Côte Vermeille (the Vermilion Coast) slipped by to starboard. Behind it the chain of the Pyrénées receded into the blue distance, where the sacred mountain of the Catalans, Le Canigou, towered over the plain. Past the ancient Catalan port of Collioure and its medieval castle, home for many years to Patrick O'Brien of "Aubrey and Maturin" fame. Past ancient Portus Veneris (Port Vendres). Past Cap Béar, its massive hilltop fort, lighthouse and semaphore ... and on into the blue.

"The breeze will work round towards sou'sou'east. Maybe 15-20 knots by around four. By six it'll be gone," Ben said, with all the sea wisdom of a nigh-on quarter-century sailing this coast.

Ben had had *Cariño* freighted back from Hong Kong to a neighbouring farmer's field, where Melita and he lived in the Netherlands, while he worked out his time as a senior executive at Philips, the big Dutch multinational.

Elaine and I had visited *Cariño* there amongst the sheep and cows ("Can you make Cowes Week?" "No, but I can make their eyes water.") Ben, ever the engineer, explained the improvements on the Peterson he was making ... completely revising the profile of both keel and rudder ... in a field, 100 km from the sea.

(But then, what's new. As soon as *Cariño* had arrived in Hong Kong, Ben had taken her to a small boatyard in Tai Shue Wan, where Ocean Park's western entrance now is. Over a weekend he had removed the engine. Closed and faired the saildrive opening in the hull. Moved the engine beds. Created a new opening for the saildrive. And reinstalled the engine. Over a weekend)

Ben had retired in the late '80s and he and Melita had bought a house in nearby Montesquieu des Albères. They brought *Cariño* to Port Argelès. Ben went sailing everyday he could for nearly 20 years. He and Melita moved back to Holland about five years ago. Now they come to Port Argelès for a month or two every summer, live aboard and day-sail with the occasional cruise further afield. That's a lot of sailing.

Bang on Ben's prediction, the wind worked around and freshened, though only to around 15 knots. We were maybe 14 miles out in perfect sailing conditions. Bliss.

Hong Kong – Vietnam, October 2013

The Hong Kong to Vietnam Race is back for 2013, and promises to be an epic. Joining in on the longest Category One offshore race in Asia, sailors will take on the might of the South China Sea as they traverse the 656-mile biennial route to Nga Trang on the south-eastern coast of Vietnam.

Sailors can anticipate daunting rolling waves as they dash their way through to the finish line. This race is a "no-brainer" for sailors who thrive on long downhill excursions. Penghu, Taiwan, June 2014

It may still be more than 10 months away, but you should definitely start training for this one right now!
