

t's certainly been a busy year afloat to date, for cruisers, dinghies and marine support craft. Much of this is recounted in the report for the AGM, available as of 25 November, covering events up to the start of the Waglan Series.

So to avoid repetition ... what, instead, is brewing? Well, starting with dinghies:

The annual Southside Regatta will be hosted by the ABC over the weekend of 6 – 7 December. This is one of the dinghy highlights of the calendar, with an excellent chance of great wind and always a lot of entries.

Our Optimist and 29er squads will head to Australia over Christmas and New Year to take part in the Australian Optimist and 29er Championships. These are keenly anticipated as qualifying races for HKSF nominations.

The dinghy subcommittee is now reviewing the storage of members' boats, kayaks, etc., at Middle Island. It's rather sad that there are a few craft there that appear to have been abandoned, or at least never used.

Members are very welcome to apply for hardstanding space at Middle Island but, once approved, we do request that you use your boat regularly – it needs love and attention!

Cruisers are in the thick of the Waglan races, with good attendance so far, in line


with the growth in levels of support all this year.

By the time you read this, Waglan 3 will have been completed and ABC's newest event, the Round Island Autumn Beach BBQ on 29 November, we hope, will have generated many enthusiastic requests for a repeat next year. As with all such initiatives, members' responses and comments are very much encouraged.

Following Waglans 4 and 5 in mid-December, we have another new event, this time from COA, a four-club, fourleg race (more a rally) with a joint finish pursuit, and a party finish on Saturday 13 December. Then, a revival of the ABC's Christmas Pursuit fun race to a restaurant on Sunday, 21 December. Watch for news.

Meanwhile preparations for the annual ABC special Four Peaks Race over the weekend of 31 January are in hand. The call is going out to last year's corps of helpers, and via this letter to any/all other members, especially those new to the Club who would like to help out in any way to enjoy a unique event and ABC fellowship. In support of all this activity much effort has been put in by staff to upgrade and re-engine our support craft, to good effect. And at last I am able to report



that the Club has committed to a new Committee and general support boat to be built by Cheoy Lee. Delivery is expected by June 2015 for this standard 13.7m launch powered by a 500 HP Caterpillar engine.

Given the arrival of this new vessel (a first for ABC) and the rejuvenation of the other support craft, a new name, theme and colour scheme would be refreshingly fitting. To this end the GM will support a competition with prizes for the best suggestions SailCom receives, with a top prize for the ultimate selection. So kids of all ages, creativity caps on!

And so to Christmas with best wishes to all members for the season and in particular, the sailing season.



ABC Member Wins "La Route du Rhum"







The race: Created in 1978 by Michel Etevenon, the Route du Rhum is an epic journey of over 3,500 nautical miles across the furious Atlantic Ocean for a fleet of over 100 mono- and multihulls, from 39 ft to the planet's largest super-fast racing machine. Held every four years, the route runs from Brittany's Saint-Malo to Guadeloupe's Pointe-à-Pitre in the Caribbean.

The ABC members: In 2007, we made honorary ABC members of two illustrious world class sailors visiting Hong Kong, Lady Ellen MacArthur who won the Route du Rhum in 2002, and Loick Perron, the thin one here, who raced it six times in 1986, 1982, 1990, 1994, 2002 and 2014. We can proudly announce that Mr. Perron won this year's race, in fact breaking the 2006 race record by 2 hours, 1 minute. He did 4,199 nautical miles in 7 days, 15 hours, and 8 minutes at an average speed of 23 knots. Kudos.

f the current Waglan Series can produce the favourable winds that greeted the Ladies Helm on Sunday, 19
October, we will have many happy sailors at the end of the series.

Six boats made the start for a memorable day's sailing, in strong and sometimes gusty winds. There was no need for a windward mark, and it was straight off the start line into an east-northeasterly breeze.

The forecast was for Force 5 winds, occasionally at Force 6. Well, it was actually Force 6-7 south of Stanley Bay and during the approach to Castle Rock, and a steady Force 6 for much of the race.

The RO set an interesting course (number 27 in the SSI), sending the fleet south of Castle Rock, to provide a beat through the Beaufort Channel and up to Fury Rock.

Then it was foot down for the kite run to the (somewhat elusive) Tai Tam Club mark. A gibe 'round back to Castle Rock, too shy for full kites, until the rock was rounded, then kites up again for the run home past Chesterman buoy.

A very close finish, with all but one boat home within 13 minutes of each other, over 2 hours and 40 minutes, helped by the ebb on the way out and flood on the way back (well done, RO!).

Choppy seas

Lots of fun on the way with the ladies whipping their crews into line and flexing rapidly growing biceps as they wrestled their helms against the choppy seas and strong breeze. Fun, too, watching other boats broaching wildly, but then they too said they had observed the same on the author's boat!





Redeye found a novel way to sail and save money by dispensing with the mainsail on the beat, and still managed line honours under the jib and occasional gennaker. That called for a special prize from the back of the cupboard for "racing spirit."

Overall winners were *FG3* in IRC and *The Farr Side* in HKPN, with respective helms of Elaine Morgan and Natalie Berry. But it was a close-run thing, and so each lady received a prize of a facial cream and a sailing brooch; and each boat a bottle of wine. Bribes, you might say, to encourage others!

2014 Hebe Haven 24-hour Charity Race ABC Sailors Team Adventure with Fundraising

t was a beautiful morning on 1 November, the first day of the 2014 24-Hour Charity Dinghy Race at Hebe Haven Yacht Club. The sun was shining and the sails and flags were flapping in a breeze of around 10 knots. A buzz of excitement was in the

air, with people rushing around and getting their boats ready for the 2 pm start.

Many teams and schools from all over Hong Kong had entered, along with a team from Macau.

For readers new to the event, the Hebe Haven 24-Hour Charity Dinghy Race is an annual event where different teams sail as many laps as they can manage over a 24-hour period of a simple square-shaped course. For every lap we complete, we raise more money for local charities. The per-lap sponsorship money goes to charities, which this year were the Children's Cancer Foundation, Treats, Enlighten, Ideal and Sailability.

The ABC entered two teams - the Wayfarers and Laser 2000s. First to sail were sailors Scarlett Lorin and Madeleine Walker in the Laser 2000 class. In the Wayfarer class, we had Matthew Wright, who normally sails on the ABC High Performance squad, and

Malo Kennish, who normally sails with the Optimist squad.

Apart from a couple of bumps from other boats, the two ABC boats got away smoothly at the start line. For the first two hours the ABC Laser 2000 team with Scarlett Lorin and Madeleine Walker held second position overall. Unfortunately, as the afternoon progressed, they lost this place, dropping to 21st overall.

With this race, there is always a lot of waiting around for shifts and boats. and thankfully we ABC sailors were able to base ourselves on a junk that was moored up at the end of the furthermost pontoon. We enjoyed great views of the course and a gentle breeze that kept us nice and cool. We spent most of our spare time here, although we did make an effort to visit and chat to friends from other clubs and teams in order to fight off our tiredness.



The penny board dropped

As for our late-night adventures, we had fun trying to avoid cockroaches on the pontoon, climbing aboard Kevin Lewis' speedboat to check the course, searching for cheaters who needed to do penalty turns, and swimming late at night. We also managed to lose a penny board, like a smaller version of a skate board, when it fell off the guay. This was followed by a long discussion, whilst peering into the water, about whether it was sensible to swim down and get the penny board in the middle of the night. It wouldn't have been easy as it had sunk between two walls covered in barnacles and, furthermore, we were without a light! After a phone call to parents we abandoned the idea and said goodbye to the penny board, probably still lying in silt at the bottom of the marina.

Waiting and drifting

When it came to Russell Aylsworth's and my shift, from 2:30 am to 4 am, we spent nearly 1.5 hours waiting for the boat from the previous shift to arrive back at the pontoon - so we actually only got into our boat to start our shift at 4 am!

By this time, fellow ABC sailors Alexander Hahn and Scarlett Lorin, in the other ABC boat, had already swapped over and were moving towards the first mark. When I say moving, I mean they were drifting, in two knots of "wind."

Finally, when the Wayfarer rounded the bottom mark and arrived, Russell and I hopped in and bobbed slowly towards the first mark. At this point we realised

that Scarlett had taken her phone on her boat to listen to music. Since I had also had my phone, we decided to call her, which was fun and a nice distraction in the darkness with little sailing to do.

Progress, backwards

Sleeping sailors (by Alison Treasure) The one lap seemed to take a lifetime but as we finally approached the bottom mark we estimated that we were moving at a reasonably steady pace, given there were only two knots of wind. However when we took a transit on a nearby junk we realized that we had started moving backwards.

Horrified, we ran through all our training techniques and tried to work out just what we were doing that was so wrong. The options were many but the most likely ones were that either the boat was full of water or we were sitting too far back.

Eventually we concluded that the current was very strong and the boat was full of water. Sadly, we had lost all of the places previously gained on the upwind leg of the course, and were no longer moving at all, in any direction whatsoever. Finally after what seemed like hours of torture, bobbing around in the same spot, a "gust" of around five knots of wind hit us and we managed to slowly round the mark and swap with the next pair of sailors.

After our shift ended, at around 5:30 am, Russell and I went back to the junk to join the rest of the squad. It had taken us 1.5 hours to get just one lap done! Back at the junk, we all sat around talking, but remembered to

The ABC junk contributed enormously to our comfort and security. It's so nice having a comfortable, clean and well-kept base where we can leave our belongings and return after sailing. It was obviously one of the better bases as I noticed we had a lot of visitors from other teams! So many thanks to the Club for sponsoring the junk (and the entry fees) and to Mr and Mrs Lau Kam Cheung for helping us. Sailability Hong Kong Earns Bronze at the Asian Para Games 2014

hen originally asked by the Asian Para Games organisers back in March 2013 if Sailability Hong Kong would like to put a team together to represent Hong Kong in the 2014 Asian Para Games in Korea, we had few eligible sailors, no 2.4mRs and only three Access 303(w) – but we did have 18 months and a lot of enthusiasm!

By October 2014 – the time of the Asian Para Games – we had, thanks to the generosity of the Hong Kong sailing community and general public, six Access 303(w) and four 2.4mRs.

More essentially, during the period, we had gathered together 24 sailors, who like us had a competitive spirit, wanted to learn and were prepared to give their best.

The Hong Kong sailing community got behind us and we participated in all

of 2014's major regattas, using these as qualifying regattas. Our mission was established with a realistic goal and our target was "not to come last." As things turned out – we didn't.

Early adapters

Taking the decision to arrive a few days early in Korea, we quickly adapted to the local conditions. The most serious were the tidal strength and variable wind. This was a good decision on our part. When our four days of competitive racing commenced on 19 October, we knew the racing area.

What we didn't really experience was the cold and rain that set in on the second and third days of racing ...

By the end of the second day, Foo Wai Yuen, in a 2.4mR, was in fourth place overall. On the third race day, Wai led from the start and won a race. Then Wai secured two third places – moving up to third overall. All that was needed was to hang on to that place on the final day.

Contenders for metal

Whether an omen or not, the Hong Kong Paralympic Committee knew we were in medal contention and came to support us on the final two days – we hung on and secured that bronze!

Our Access 303(w)s finished sixth and seventh overall, another very creditable effort and result.

As a team, the Asian Para Games 2014 were a fantastic achievement and one of which we are all proud.

f any of you, when casting off from the ABC, happen to come across a small Chinese lady in a white floppy hat, holding a long-handled fishing net and plucking discarded plastic bottles, empty styrofoam fish boxes and (children, turn away) used "youknowwhatsits" from the typhoon shelter, please say hi.

She's a fellow ABC member and the founder of the very select and unfortunately way too small "Harbour Janitors" group.

For about six months now, my wife and I, along with our two daughters (when they can be bribed by the \$20 per hour fee on offer) and on occasion a few diligent neighbours, have been dedicating a couple of hours on weekends to collecting the unfortunately massive volume of rubbish that collects in the Aberdeen typhoon shelter.

Over this time, we've managed to extract upwards of 500 kgs of rubbish, but the sad fact is that we barely scratch the surface.

Particularly during the summer months, within a matter of hours, the lunch boxes, drink containers and plastic bags return.

The equally sad fact is that most people who live or work in the shelter regard it as someone else's problem. The Marine Department do next to nothing, whereas the Marine Police – despite being stationed in the middle of the mess and armed with a law that imposes a \$10,000 fine on anyone littering Hong Kong waters – seem oblivious to the shipyard and fishing boat workers, the boat boys and pleasure craft owners throwing their waste directly into the sea. We felt we needed to take matters into our own hands ... which is why I got my office involved.

On a very nice Thursday in October – the sort of day made for being on the water (but not resplendent in rubber gloves!)


a group of intrepid folk from the Hong Kong office of WME
 IMG spent a few hours clearing rubbish from the typhoon shelter. Every year, the company sets aside one day for its staff globally to perform community-based service. Excellent – a ready-made typhoon shelter cleaning unit! Break out the nets and rubbish bags!


The ABC showed us fantastic support by donating the use of their small power boats, and the Club's boat staff pitched in, driving the rubbish crews around the typhoon shelter and helping remove the rubbish bags from the Club jetty.

Despite the fact that some of my coworkers are petrified of the water and have never learned to swim, we managed to pull 20 large garbage bags of rubbish from the typhoon shelter. That's 20 bags of rubbish that won't poison our waters and kill thousands of fish; 20 bags of rubbish that tourists to Hong Kong won't go home and tell their friends about; 20 bags of rubbish that won't create an eyesore as ABC members motor out of the typhoon shelter on their way to another majestic day on the water.

However, it was only 20 bags, and it will be back tomorrow.

Until we all make greater efforts to stop the littering and to keep our rubbish out of the shelter, it will always be back tomorrow. Scientific folk tell us that it can take one million years for a piece of styrofoam to decompose in the environment. It is 1,000 years for a plastic bag. However, it takes only a few seconds to pluck these items out of the sea. Even better, why not put them in a proper rubbish bin on land instead of throwing them in the sea in the first place?









o what's the hardest way to get from Stanley to Deep Water Bay? Cycle? Mostly downhill; too easy. Walk ... well, maybe. Violet Hill is a challenge.

How about sailing? As a sailor you'd say that's easy; as Captain Capsize I'd say that's hard.

But how about swimming? It's only 15 kilometres. What could possibly go wrong?

Every year, people come from all over the world to take part in what is fast becoming recognised as one of the world's premier long-distance swim events. Hong Kong's Clean Half, as it is known, follows the southern coastline of the island, and as the name suggests, it is likely to be the cleanest part of the sea around Hong Kong island.

The annual Clean Half swim raises money for charity, with its funds going to the Ocean Recovery Alliance, a non-profit are some sublime views of the coastline organisation that focuses on improving the ocean environment (see more at http://www.oceanrecov.org).

In the November issue of *Horizons* vou will have seen an article about the ABC/WWF beach clean-up in September, at Beaufort Island, where a big part of the Club's effort was picking up plastic bottles. One aim of the Clean Half swim event is to raise awareness

about ocean conservation and the damaging part that discarded plastic can play in ruining the seas.

Solo or relay options

Some people choose to swim the event solo, but most are in teams of five, swimming in a relay. The ABC was represented by two members of the "Left Laners" team; Calum Watson

The Clean Half covers some of open water swimming's most challenging conditions; from the onshore headwind and chop at Stanley Main Beach (Calum, who volunteered to take the start and first section, called it a washing machine), across to the big swells between the Shek O Peninsula and Cape D'Aguilar.

And then suddenly it's calm, and there on the run towards Deep Water Bay.

Last year Calum and I finished the event in a fraction over four hours. This vear was different. The tides and currents were against us, so we finished in 5.5 hours, putting us halfway down the field of 63. A pretty good result, but we are going to have to do a bit to catch the winners next year, who finished this year in 3.5 hours. That's some going. H

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
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
