ello from Melbourne in autumn where it feels like middle of our winter in Hong Kong. I can't wait to get back to Hong Kong.

In late March, I was delighted to launch an Access 303W class double-handed dinghy sponsored by ABC for the Hebe Haven Sailability Trust, which provides the facilities and expertise for a water-based experience for people with disabilities who would not otherwise have the opportunity.



Sailability Hong Kong, off to the Asian Paralympics Games!

The Sailability Trust will send a team of six sailors to represent Hong Kong in the Asian Paralympic Games to be held in South Korea. So far, the ABC boat has won seven out of seven races at Hong Kong Race Week!

In mid-April, Hong Kong Sailing Federation National Coach Craig Cobbin announced members of the National Squad who were presented awards by Hong Kong's Olympic windsurfing gold medallist Lee Lai-shan.

ABC youth sailors were wellrepresented on the national squad, which will receive financial support from the Government.

HKSF is committed to develop youth sailing to international medal-winning levels, through squad training and exposure to international coaches at five annual high-performance camps.



The ABC will complement HKSF's training with our own championship-level coaching.

See you on the water or at the annual prize-giving on 24 May.

General Manager's Letter

Bye-laws and typhoons

Last month, I promised a review of the bye-laws on the waiting list for moorings, but another month is needed for review as they remain under consideration and a survey letter is yet to be sent. As for the also-promised review of the dress code, meant to coincide with rising humidity that brings blandishments for less clothing, that also must wait.

This month I will focus on summer's most worrying spin-off: typhoons.

Most of you have been in Hong Kong long enough to know that the typhoon season is from May to October. In this month's letter, therefore, it is more than appropriate to send a small reminder of what to expect and what needs doing if a typhoon comes close to our shores.

If and when a typhoon approaches, we shall keep you informed of its progression by posting notices on Club boards and on the front page of our soon-to-be-launched new website.

For safety's sake, I must remind all sailors and boaters that it is the owner's responsibility to secure a boat on a mooring and to look after its overall safety.

ABC staff, as always, will be on hand to check mooring components for safety but the owners must secure their own mooring lines, tie up all sails or store them and clear decks of all loose objects.

It is therefore necessary for you to come to the Club to check your boat before the Hong Kong Observatory hoists a typhoon signal 3.

Bye-laws on tropical cyclone warnings:

- (i) Members within the Club premises will be kept informed of tropical cyclone signals either by the posting of notices or by announcements.
- (ii) When tropical cyclone signal

 1 is raised, ABC staff will start
 implementing the Club safety
 procedures to secure the Club,
 including moorings and pontoons
 and additional safety steps that
 will be carried out in preparation
 for the raising of tropical cyclone
 signal 3.

- (iii) When tropical cyclone signal 3 is raised, ABC staff will start taking full precautionary actions, and whilst normal operations will continue as usual, if tropical cyclone signal 8 is expected to be raised, a gradual reduction of services will occur as staff are released to return home.
- (iv) When the tropical cyclone signal 8 is raised, Club operations will cease and all staff, members and guests, with the exception of caretaker staff, will be required to vacate the Club premises.
- (v) In the event of members or guests being unable to leave the Club premises, owing to the lack of transport or other circumstances, the function rooms will remain open for use but no food, drink or service of any kind will be available unless otherwise organized by the General Manager.
- (vi) If the tropical cyclone signal 8 is lowered after 1700, the Club will remain closed until next day's normal opening hour. If it is lowered before 1700, the Club operations will resume two hours after the signal has been lowered.

ABC support for Sailability Trust

Early last month, Hong Kong's three main sailing clubs joined up to support the Hebe Haven Sailability Trust (HHST), which allows people with disabilities to experience sailing by providing facilities and expertise.

ABC purchased one Access 303W dinghy, as did the Hebe Haven Yacht Club and the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club. The three clubs launched these boats together with the presence of commodores and past commodores. These three boats will serve to train the Hong Kong Asian Para Games team, who will participate in this big competition in Incheon, South Korea, between 18 and 24 October 2014.

New Club invoicing system

The full upgrade of the Club management system is progressing on schedule with the new website to be launched very soon. From August 2014 you will be able to go online to check your monthly consumption and invoice. This will lead to you receiving your monthly statement by email; ending "snail mail" delivery will reduce heavy administration tasks and paper-printing needs. The full upgrade also will include a new point-of-sales system as our current one can no longer be updated and therefore is out of date. The new point-of-sales will be "latest generation,"



allowing Club waiters to take orders on electronic tablets directly from your table. This should shorten the food delivery time and avoid some ordering mistakes that do happen from time to time.

As a result, it is imperative that you confirm with us the email address at which you wish to receive Club invoices. Should you lack an email address, please contact me for a special arrangement.

In memory of Walter Gerrard

"Uncle Walter," as all of us working at the ABC called him, passed away on 30 March. A great sadness has been felt all around at the loss of this larger-thanlife and always happy character but he would have preferred us to recall only the great moments we spent with him as a member, as a trainer and as a friend.

"The Big Man," or "the Water Buffalo," as he was known during his football career in Hong Kong, scored 30 goals in his first season with the Hong Kong Rangers and played with the greatest. At his funeral I heard stories about him that typified his character. One story in particular was during a match against the Brazilian team visiting Hong Kong. During the match both Walter and the great Pelé were substituted and as they walked off the field, Walter, approaching the big star, said "Pelé, these coaches don't know a good footballer when they see one."

Walter was part of Hong Kong and Hong Kong was in his heart. He will be always remembered as the Water Buffalo with a strong Scottish accent and a smile on his face bringing joy and happiness to people around him. Our condolences go to his wife Barbara, his sons Andrew and Stuart, and the rest of his family.

Renderings shown here of how Middle Island will look once developed have been provided by MAP Architecture and Planning Ltd., the architects for the project. MAP has been working with land surveyors, quantity surveyors, town planners, civil and structural engineers and landscape consultants to show these images. Plans will shortly be submitted to a variety of Government departments.

These renderings give an impression of what the Club would like to see achieved; however, the final look and execution of the project will be subject to the aforementioned approvals, staying within budget and the timing of each phase of the project. 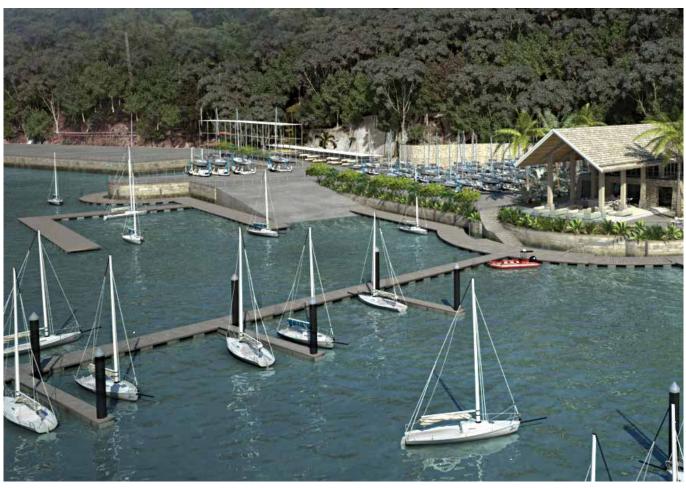

Third Annual Ocean Film Festival: Protecting Marine Life Across the World's Oceans



he Ocean and You" is the theme of the third annual Hong Film festival venues include Kong – San Francisco International Ocean Film Festival and the 2nd annual Ocean Art Walk in Stanley.

Hong Kong's main geographical asset, our ocean, is often forgotten despite amazing features including the reality that it has more coral species than the entire Caribbean.

The Ocean Recovery Alliance invites all ABC members to take part in the free annual Ocean Art Walk through 4 May at Stanley Plaza and Stanley Promenade. The Ocean Art Walk features sculptures and art installations and a photography collection, aiming to raise awareness of the impact of our everyday behaviour and the health of the world's oceans, and to encourage Hong Kongers to take action to save our waters.

The art installations and sculptures are created primarily from waste and recycled materials, including over 4,200 plastic bottles, 500 discarded CDs, 350 glass bottles collected from the glass recycling program at Stanley Plaza, bottle lids, key chains, toothbrushes and other found objects. They illustrate issues relevant to Hong Kong, such as the need to protect our marine life, to encourage sustainable fishing and to manage plastic consumption and waste.

Ocean Film Festival

The festival's films come from around the world, varying from short films to feature productions, including both the amazing scenery of Planet Ocean, and the controversial Blackfish on the keeping of orca killer whales in captivity. They represent a diverse cross section of topics related to the ocean: conservation, adventure, wildlife, sports, culture and humanity.

Is your child ready to hit the pool? *Laura Miller* chats to some of Hong Kong's top swimming coaches for the low-down on swimming lessons.

iving in Asia, where almost any body of water is an inviting playground for most of the year, parents spend a lot of energy planning swimming lessons for their children. This focus on learning to swim is completely understandable. According to the World Health Organization, children under five years of age have the highest drowning mortality rates worldwide. In China, drowning is the leading cause of death from injury in children aged one to 14 years, and even in Australia, one of the most swim-savvy nations in the world, drowning is the leading cause of death from injury in children aged one to three years.

Yet we don't want our children to learn to swim just for their own safety: Swimming is a fun, exhilarating and healthy pastime, and the more confident and competent a child is in the water, the more enjoyment they get out of it.

After a recent holiday in Sri Lanka however, I realised that confidence and competence do not always go hand in hand. With a swimming pool and lagoon to choose from, my almost-three-year-old gained confidence in the water at a rapid rate. By day five, she was throwing herself in from the top step shouting, "Cannonball!" This was extremely entertaining to watch. What wasn't so entertaining was on day eight when she didn't want to wear her inflatable armbands any more so she could "go underwater more easily" – and discovered she could remove them herself.

We arrived back in Hong Kong determined to capitalise on her confidence in the water, and to get her swimming unaided as soon as possible. Chatting to some of Hong Kong's swimming experts – Andrew Cox of Innate Fitness; Katie Heyring of Dragon Swim Centre; Sharon Wrobel of Platypus Aquatics; and Karen Robertson of FloatPlus Swimming – couldn't have been better timed.

How young is it possible for children to swim unaided?

Sharon says: It depends on what you wish to classify as "swim". We have many children who, at two years, are able to independently swim using an underwater dog-paddle for about two metres to get to the side and climb out of the pool. Even some of the toddlers as young as 18 months can manage a small dog-paddle from the parent to the wall. If you mean formal swimming with strokes, then we have some three-year-olds who are able to swim breaststroke and crawl for short distances, some up to about five metres.

When should lessons start?

Andrew says: The earlier the better. Before six months, babies still have an innate affinity for water as a result of life in the womb. Build on this to generate enthusiasm for water: In the bath, pour (soap-free) water over your baby's head to get

him comfortable having his eyes and ears in water.

Katie says: Once a baby has had his first immunisations he can start lessons. If you have your own pool, I'd feel happy putting him in from six weeks. For public pools, I'd recommend three months.

Sharon says: Infant Aquatics recommends beginning formal lessons in a class situation from six months old. We teach "formal" strokes when children are developmentally able to complete the gross motor movements required around four to five years.

Karen says: Actual stroke work is introduced around four to five years when children have the necessary confidence and balance on the front and back. We work on front crawl and backstroke at the same time. Breaststroke is next, and finally, butterfly.

What do you think about buoyancy aids?

Andrew says: Use what works to create confidence in water. If children are unhappy without armbands, use them and slowly wean them off by progressing to a noodle under their arms, then to a kickboard held out front. Find the child's threshold of success and aim to expand that each time they enter the water.

Katie says: Armbands have their place, as they can give children independence and keep them upright in water. They do restrict arm movement however, and for lessons they are a no-no. Children must recognise that swimming unassisted is their goal.

Sharon says: Attached aids can hinder the natural development of aquatic skills and give parents a false sense of security. Around water, parents should always have the "Layers of Protection" recommended by Swim Australia (www. swimaustralia.org.au) in place. ("Layers of Protection" is a system of checks which may save a child's life – they include supervision, barriers, swimming and water safety skills and an emergency action plan.)

Karen says: If you're looking after more than one child, floatation devices are essential. I prefer buoyancy suits over armbands as the latter can restrict arm movement. However, any buoyancy aid should not take the place of adult supervision. In our swimming

programme, we work on buoyancy so children learn to float unassisted on their fronts and backs. These skills can save a child's life.

What should parents do when their children are nervous around water?

Andrew says: Create a "play state" for the child. Help them fish for floating toys from the top step with a foam roll. Eliciting playfulness changes a child's fearful experience to one of exploration and growth.

Katie says: Never force a child to do something in water. Children enjoy water more when they learn at their own pace, experience success, practise repeatedly and receive praise for their efforts.

Karen says: Be gentle and positive and practise as much as you can in the bath – swishing through the water and moving legs/arms in kicking/paddling actions, keeping it fun.

What should parents do if their child is too confident around water?

Andrew says: Let them experience a



small amount of fear in the water, with the parent/coach immediately on hand. Be calm and confident as the child will feed off your reaction.

Katie says: Lessons on water safety are vital (for example, never running around a pool, checking depth before diving, etc.). And kids should always be supervised by an adult who can swim.

Sharon says: Parents must establish rules with their children and constantly reinforce them. Basic rules such as asking to enter the water need to become routine.

Karen says: It is a balance between encouraging children's skills as they naturally challenge themselves (sometimes exploring beyond their capabilities), and making them aware of potential dangers. Setting boundaries is crucial.

What are your top three water-safety tips?

Andrew says: 1) Teach kids that the side of the pool is their saviour. Children need to reflexively look for the side,

rather than another swimmer. This is only achieved through repetition: Jump in the water, turn around and grab the side. Repeat. 2) Teach your child the respect that water deserves. 3) Teach them confidence in going underwater. If children can remain calm if they fall in, there is a higher likelihood they will save themselves by getting to the side.

Katie says: 1) Start young. 2)
Don't skimp on the safety measures:
swimming lessons; putting up barriers
(fencing, pool alarms, pool covers);
becoming CPR-certified; and practising

"touch" supervision – always staying within arm's reach. 3) Find a water-safety class for your child. He will be taught to hold his breath underwater, flip onto his back to float, and swim to the side in case he falls in.

For children: 1) Never go near water without an adult. 2) Always wear a life jacket on a boat. 3) Always listen to the life guards. For parents: 1) Know your own swimming limitations – if you cannot swim, then learn. 2) Always have your child in sight. 3) Be aware of potential dangers.

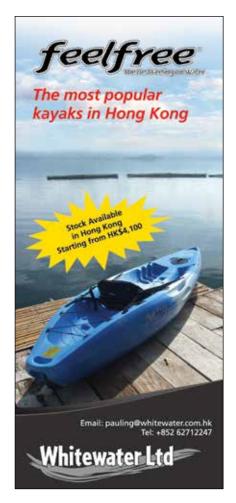
