







Members have been made aware in broad terms of the extent of the damage on MI wrought to dinghies, the Clubhouse and its facilities by Typhoon Mangkhut. Not least by the GM's graphic description and photos in the October edition of *Horizons*. The damage, and repairs where possible, to dinghies is a relatively straightforward matter – no less distressing nonetheless; and the sailing training is back on the agenda with some limitations. The insurance claims are similarly fairly straightforward.

This is not the case with the Clubhouse and facilities, which is a much more complicated matter. A Working Group has been formed, compromising senior Committee members to formulate our Claim (actually several claims arising from several policies). This in itself will be a lengthy process starting with a detailed structural survey to establish whether the remaining structure is safe, needs modification or is fundamentally beyond repair. This process has begun, and while it is too

early to reach any conclusions it is already clear that howsoever the rebuild is constructed, MI is unlikely to be back in commission – fully, that is to say – before the middle of 2019.

Though the facilities are fully insured, the Club will of course face unavoidable deductible charges which could in the aggregate be material. Members will be kept informed periodically as the situation unfolds. In the meantime, the GM and team are looking at means to utilise available spaces within the main Clubhouse confines, to enhance F&B outlets to compensate partially for the loss of MI.

To end on two brighter notes:

- The Land Supply issue. Over 780 members responded to the two surveys; an extraordinarily good return which can but help the cause.
 Optimists may care to note that virtually no mention was made of PRL Clubs in the various
 Legco submissions, while the CE's address made no mention at all. The favoured remedies to date being
 N.T. brownfield sites, the River Trade Terminal and non-harbour reclamation.
- The Autumn/Winter keel boat racing season is well underway, the Monsoon has turned and the entries to date are encouraging. Life afloat, at least, is back to normal.

Let's make full use of all that we have in the season to come, which for Golfers includes the Commodores Cup at DWB on 16 November.

DINGHY SAILING GETTING BACK ON COURSE

September has been a very hectic and challenging month for dinghy sailing at the Club, with the departure of Rory Godman, the coach, followed by a re-organisation of the department, and an audit on what has been done, to understand the way forward for the Club; and then, a week after, Typhoon Mangkhut putting us on our knees.

The audit report is still being prepared and we should be in position next issue to tell you about our new aim and direction. Streamlining our ambitions is definitely the main point as we must understand that ABC is a seagoing and boating Club, so our limited resources must be shared and not focused only on high performance sailing, leaving behind club sailing and racing for all, fun social sailing, paddle boarding, kayaking and other sea activities we used to have in the past as a boat Club.

Following the typhoon disaster the school and academy sailing restarted 2 weeks later, but having lost some of our Lasers, Fevas and Optimists, the regular sailing is still on hold until new boats we have ordered are received. In this sense we are not in position to take on new cadet memberships until business is back to usual.

Now comes the issue of our South Side Regatta – the second biggest dinghy race in the calendar. With our facilities completely down and certainly not back to safe operations by 1 December, we are now working with the RHKYC to help us to host dinghies from all over Hong Kong, and all shore work and prize giving will be at the Main Clubhouse.

YOGA AT THE ABC

There is a true sense of joy and camaraderie that is created among the participants, which extends beyond the four walls of the class.

We all work at our own pace and having small classes means lots of individual attention. Jenny Low, another regular to the class, says, "Gaelle is a very knowledgeable yoga instructor who takes great care of her students and makes everyone feel welcome."

Props such as blankets, blocks and straps are regularly used to facilitate practice and allow access to the benefits of the poses regardless of your age, physical condition or how long you have been practising. Although many attendees bring their own props, there is also a communal pool of resources available to all who attend.

Classes are held every Monday & Thursday from 1000 -1115 hrs. All are welcome. Whatever your age, fitness, gender or experience, you will find the sessions enriching and stimulating. MIDDLE ISLAND RE-BIRTH

The other hot topic about Middle Island is the rebuilding, as you could read in my 4th update after the Typhoon Mangkhut disaster. After one month of recovery from the disastrous impact of Mangkhut on our facility, it is time to give you an update on the progress towards the re-birth of our little jewel in the south.

As you know, all training and courses have resumed normal operations but we are still at a standstill as regards to dinghy, kayak, windsurfer, and paddle board hiring, the reason being mostly due to the lack of showers, toilets and accessibility. We hope to resume all these within a month, with temporary outdoor showers, until the final decision and plans are drawn and accepted for the new clubhouse.

As much as I understand the urge to get back our facility as fast as possible, one must also appreciate that we have nothing left there. All piping and wiring – and probably the foundation and building – have to be re-built. This already involves an enormous amount of planning and approval to obtain and mobilise a contractor willing to work on an island. It is not as easy and fast as it may appear, and we should not have many expectations to see anything moving before Easter 2019. We are still in negotiations with the Insurance Loss Adjuster, and it will take some time to first provide him with the requisite surveys and assessment of the place, and to give him all accurate costings for re-instatement.

It may be also necessary to approach the Government for improvement of the seawall and try to limit the danger of losing everything again next year if another big typhoon hits us. As the Commodore noted in his article, we have now in place a very strong team of insurance experts to help us prepare a proper claim, as it is a very complex process. We also have a newly created sub-committee comprising engineers, lawyers, architects and a finance specialist to assist in the way forward. and finally an Authorised Person recognised by the government to prepare, certify and submit all claims and rebuilding documents requested by the insurance company and required by the government regulations.

Finally, in the coming weeks we will have some new pontoons and we will able to restore regular visits to Middle Island, but still with restricted areas and no showers or restaurant; but your fishing and private lunch on board will be possible.

It is also in the pipeline to open Middle Island 7 days a week in the near future, as we will relocate some sailing staff office there. This will boost the renewed life on Middle Island in two key ways. First, having a presence on the island will allow sailing, kayaking and other seagoing activities at your leisure, and not just only during weekends. Secondly, having someone seven days a week will enable overseeing the re-building process, and timely reporting on issues and progress in order to maximise the efficiency of the process. Once again, please bear with us as we are actively and aggressively working on getting back on our

feet on Middle Island, in the most effective way possible now and for the future.

MARINE

Pontoons on Middle Island rebuilt by our marine guys

Pontoons are being re-built as I write this letter, and this time we are building them in-house as our home-made wooden pontoons proved to be far more resistant to adverse weather than the modern plastic one.

We are also now considering a Mediterranean berthing arrangement for the eastern part, which will provide more space and less parts to be broken or lost when the next storm like Mangkhut hits.


Change of Policy Regarding Smoking in The Club

We would like to inform you of a change in the smoking policy within the Club, which was proposed and approved at the last General Committee meeting on Thursday 27 September 2018, and came into effect on 11 October.

Smoking on the upper terrace outside the Waglan Bar is now prohibited everywhere, with the exception of a designated corner.

Please comply with this new arrangement, and be courteous with our staff if they have to remind you of it. This has come as a result of many complaints received and the necessity for a stricter enforcement of the smoking ban in Hong Kong.

This change is accordance with the General Committee in the exercise of powers conferred upon it by Articles 66, 67 and 68 of the Articles of Association of the Aberdeen Boat Club Ltd, available via our membership webpage.

PANADOL FILES (CONT.)

WSD Middle Island water meter installation

This is another long story, now more than a year in the process. For those who missed the previous Panadol files on that topic, we are trying to obtain a 100m long by 50cm wide lease between the RHKYC hardstand and ABC hardstand, to connect a new Water Service

Department (WSD) proper pipe. This is to complete the installation of our own WSD water meter – and finally and officially become independent from the RHKYC for water supply and, more importantly for the Club's development, a recognised customer of WSD. Well at least on paper....



The first application was made on 27 September 2017. It was confirmed by the District Land Officer that he would start the review on 17 October 2017. Since then we have had no real progress, but were ordered to get a geotechnical land and foreshore survey of the proposed route for the WSD water supply between ABC and RHKYC premises on Middle Island: just in case we had in mind building something like a trans-Siberian underwater petroleum pipeline.

Then we were requested to engage a construction engineer to recommend and prepare all the specifications for the pipeline, and detail all construction methods and materials to be used. Then we were requested to engage an Authorised Person for a certified recommendation and quote for the work to be done.

All these DLO requirements were met by April this year. Only in July were we informed that a land surveyor would be appointed by the DLO to check our proposed pipe alignment, the information received from the land survey, the High Water Mark, and method of construction; and that if approved, the DLO would only then proceed to circulate the proposal for the next stage of his departmental heads' comments.

Well, at the end of last month we received a message from our Lease Consultant, saying that a new officer is now in charge of our file and has re-opened an old 2013 file about some unregistered structure dating from before the ABC took over Middle Island. We had thought such issues were dealt with in 2015 and resolved.

So next time a hamburger takes more than 5 minutes to be delivered to your table, just have in mind that in Hong Kong, to unfold a 100m garden hose takes more than a year to be approved.

Middle Island lease concerns: relax

I was recently asked by a Member, in light of the PRL's Lease controversy story in Hong Kong, "Why should we still consider Middle Island development if we were to lose it in 2021?"

I must remind you all, if you miss that

point in the previous issue of *Horizons*, that Middle Island is on a totally different lease condition. In fact it is under a TOP (Temporary Occupation Permit); the Government is only looking at PRLs (Private Recreation Leases).

Middle Island could actually be our place to be, if somehow the worst comes to the worst and we lose the Main Clubhouse. Furthermore, our site is not at all in immediate danger as we have been complying with and exceeding requirements as a PRL regarding our duties to the community, and it seems that the land usage is Hong Kong is going to be solved through reclamation. We will certainly have to pay a higher premium than today, but the land is not an issue.

Water in the pool

I had reports from members this past month that sometime the pool water quality is not as good as expected, and this time I am not talking about organic issues. The reports were about pH or chlorine levels.

We have taken these complaints on board, and had the water and pump system frequently inspected and re-inspected again during the month by an independent laboratory, to see if either we had a problem with our testing equipment or what could have happened, if any issues were discovered.

I am glad to report that the testing came back completely clear, with only a recommendation to upgrade the filtration system as it is getting slightly old, which in fact was already in the plan for this year's budget. The whole pool filtration system will be changed during the annual pool closure in February.

I was also told that some type of sunblock could react with the pool chemicals we have to use, and could create irritation on certain skin types or enhance the chlorine smell when in contact with the pool water. Plus, I was reassured that this is completely normal and not harmful. So be reassured we are safe, notwithstanding that on top of our extra testing the FEHD comes to sample our water every week, and if anything is wrong, they would inform us on the spot.







29er Youth Worlds -Corpus Christi

he 2018 29er Sailing Youth World Championships were held in Corpus Christi, Dallas USA. Anatole and I flew there from France, via Dallas. Shortly after we landed in Dallas, a huge rainstorm swept through the city. We were supposed to meet our coach Szymon and the rest of the team there, but their plane from Hong Kong was diverted to Houston; and our connecting flight to Corpus Christi was cancelled! The plane from HK was eventually able to fly from Houston to Dallas that evening, and we were able to

meet up with the rest of the HK team. However, as all the hotels in Dallas were fully booked, we had to sleep in the airport on the floor. Despite a very long and tiring journey, we finally got to Corpus Christi!

We received our boats on Saturday, and used the rest of the day to practice in some medium winds. We had been told that the wind would be very strong for the competition, so we tried to save energy for the racing. This turned out to be a good decision as it was blowing 24 knots on the first day!

This was a tough start to the regatta. We kicked off well but didn't have the best end to the

day. We were tired and capsized after a crash gybe at the end of the last race. Our bow caught the committee boat chain, and because the waves were so big, our boat was riding up and down on the chain, chipping pieces off every time. We were disappointed with this end to day 1, but thanks to the team from Ovington on site, we had it all fixed in time for the next day of racing!

During the rest of the week, there were continued high winds, but some days were a bit less windy than others, and this gave opportunities to the lighter crews such as Anatole and I to make better progress and move up the rankings. The leaderboard was therefore very tight.

We got up to 11th place on the penultimate day. On the last day, only one race was scheduled. A massive wind shift mid-race and a slight tactical error meant that we finished in a disappointing position. Our overall result was 13th out of 25.

After packing up our boat, we attended the huge prize giving, and a beautiful closing ceremony. It was a short night before we caught our plane back to France early the next morning.

I'd like to thank HKSF who have supported us for this trip, thanks to our coach Rory, and also to coach Szymon who was with us for this great regatta!

And we had a bit of bad luck: On the third race of the second day, while sailing the last downwind, I accidentally pushed Malo off balance down the back of the boat, shifting the balance point which led to our boat capsizing!

Although we had a terrible last race on the third day of Series,

which is always disappointing, we ended up being 17th overall and 2nd in the Juniors division.

We thought the event was well organized and the racing was fun. We still have much to learn (and key mistakes to avoid), but the lessons and experience made us stronger for our next regattas.

going too far left and lost our 1st place position, finishing 2nd.

Day 3:

On the last day of the qualifying series, Penelope and I had a challenging day with bad starts, although we managed in both of the races to catch up somewhat. In the two races we placed 31st and 24th. With all the past three days results we qualified into silver fleet.

Day 4:

The first day of the final series was a long one with only one race for silver fleet. Penelope and I had an average start off the committee

from senior sailors a lot more techniques for how to make my boat go faster. Despite this being my first time at this top event for my class of boat, I finished just above the middle, being 129th out of 264 sailors, which I am proud of, and surpassed my coach's expectation.

During this trip, I also got to learn much more about each of my teammates and bonded at a level beyond just friendship. It was an unforgettable experience which I might only have once in my life. I plan to train even harder this year, to further improve on my technique and become more adaptable to different wind and tide conditions. I believe this will ensure my spot in the Worlds again in 2019. I look forward to going to Antiqua next year; another location that I will certainly not get to visit if it is not for sailing. Sailing has brought me to places!



Hebe Haven's players seemed to settle quicker and were 1-0 up after some solid match play, but ABC hit back to level things at 1-1 before heading into the singles matches.




After another top quality curry buffet put on by the ABC staff, it was then back to business




