After so many years and endless perseverance by Devcom seeking to achieve the essential EIA Approval for MI development EPD changed the rules in Sept and declared that our project did *not* fall into the newly defined Designated category, obviating the need for

an EIA. And NO we can't get our money back! But we can now move straight on to ---indeed already have --- the next phase: Section 12A Approval leading into submission to the Town Planning Board. Which is by far the best news Devcom have had in years, albeit by a bureaucratic quirk.

On a similar positive note the Main building renovation work is now progressing rapidly [see the Housecom article for details] such that members will be able to use the new 1<sup>st</sup> floor toilets from 1<sup>st</sup> Nov and the second floor before Christmas. While the attractive new playground safety tile installation has just completed.

Seasonal dinghy and keel boat sailing events continue apace with the hugely popular Southside Dinghy Regatta set for the weekend of 2<sup>nd</sup>/3<sup>rd</sup> Dec. Meanwhile all dinghy sail training courses are full---again, early booking is encouraged to avoid disappointment.

So, the Club enters the final quarter in a buoyant state: aided by long-standing prudent cash and fund management and no borrowings, we have been able to take favourable advantage of the prevailing high interest rates. By the time you receive this, Halloween will be water under the bridge, with its scary décor, bad food and screaming children, notwithstanding complaints about the skeleton being too scary for some, the music too creepy and the mess all around the Club adding to emotional distress. In fact, I thank you all for these comments, they look to me like it was a job well done by my team: this was Halloween after all. Jokes aside, thank you again for patronising this now well-established event.

The Oktoberfest is getting bigger by the year; and next year we will make it even bigger – with dress, dance, live music to make it a real Teutonic party. We might even use the traditional, "O'Zapft Is!", which is that moment when the highest-ranking committee member present will tap the first keg and shout to officially begin the ABC Oktoberfest – so get your Bavarian attire, also known as Tracht, ready and don't miss it next year.

After the wonderful success of our ex-ARA team members at the Asian Games, I am glad to report to you that, at the Optimist National Championships in October, we have practically swept the board for top places.

In Optimist Main Fleet: 2nd placed Margaux Nguyen-Minh drew with the first boat; 3rd was Chloe Kong, Ethan Kiu placed 7th, Tara Maliah 8th, and Jessica Liu came in 9th. That gave us the Gold medal in the Under 12 Years Old, and Gold and Silver medals in Under 10 Years Old. Summarising the Main Fleet, we had two boats in the top 3, five boats in the top 10, 10 boats in the top 20; and no boats below 21st place out of 35 boats.

In the Intermediate Fleet: Karisse Hah placed 3rd and Keana Hah 4th, bringing the Club Silver in Under 12 Years Old and Silver in Under 10 Years Old. We can say that ABC ARA dominated racing out of 5 teams in Hong Kong.

Still in the recent past – the Beneteau Cup was another great event for our cruising community, with 180 participants, over 15 yachts, and a very premium and holistic party.

### What is in the top ten for the two months to come?

Well, we have the most important race to the top of the year: the Annual General Meeting, to be held on 28 November at the Club. All information will have been sent by Selina, my ever-loyal PA, through email; and posted on the website prior to this meeting, and we now hope that we can open on time with sufficient members showing up. At the time of writing this article, we have 10 positions to be re-elected or elected, and 11 applications. That will call for a vote at the AGM, but it does not look as though there will be many changes this year. The deadline for applications will have passed when you receive this letter; so hopefully, we will see more next year.

While on General Committee matters: you should have by now received the letter from the Commodore informing you of the continuity of the building levy, which is to be continued for another 2 years, and until further development.

Talking about development: I am sure you know that we are now running two development projects – the ongoing Middle Island and the "R-Fund", as it is known internally, but more generally should be known as the Main Clubhouse Development Fund.

While over the years, Middle Island has secured substantial capital, it will still be short of a few million dollars required for completion, yet the main idea of a bigger hard stand will prove feasible. As for the main building, much has to be done to render our beloved clubhouse fully operational under 21st century standards; and sourcing funding for the first phase of the work is ongoing. In this sense, the first way to fund the Main Clubhouse over many years is to take a portion of the entrance fees and accrue these into the R-Fund. As of January, a certain percentage of the entrance fees will be automatically put towards the Main Clubhouse, to fund further improvements planned by the House Committee.

If you want to know more about these Club developments, please do attend the DOUBLE communications day on 25 November:

- Middle Island Town hall Meeting at 11:00: meet our new senior consultant, URBIS, who will take us through the section 12A procedure in which we are currently engaged; and hear an update on the now unnecessary Environmental Impact Assessment.
- On the same day, but in the evening in the Main Clubhouse, the now regular committee meet members evening, where members of the House Committee are present to receive your views and ideas for a better Club.





Dear Members,

On 23 October 2022, I wrote to members advising of the continuation of a Building Development Levy for a further two years, in accordance with Article 16 (c) of the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Members will be aware from previous communications that the approval process for the development of Middle Island has been very protracted and not within the control of the Club.

In late 2018, we were requested to undertake an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) by the Environmental Protection Department (EPD). This was a major piece of work which required the assessment of many environmental issues, including anticipated visual impact, plus potential impacts on air quality, water quality, coral, fauna and ecology that may result from the development. Progress on the EIA report was significantly prolonged by 18 months following the discovery of the protected species, amphioxus, within the seabed area of the work site in late 2019. This resulted in major rework of the design, to replace the modest amount of reclamation for the enlarged storage deck with a piled deck arrangement.

In the second half of 2022, it became apparent that the Government was reconsidering the criteria used to classify those projects which are subject to the preparation of an EIA report for review and approval by EPD. This new legislation was significant and in January 2023 it was formally introduced. It had major implications on the approval process for our M.I. development because the requirement for an EIA was now unnecessary.

Notwithstanding the revised requirements, the EIA report, comprising over 600 pages and including a comprehensive analysis of all aspects of the scheme, was subsequently submitted to EPD for their review. Following proactive engagement with EPD to respond to the formal queries and clarifications which they had raised, the final copy of the report was made available for EPD review in July 2022.

The project will still be subject to a review of the design features and construction processes included to protect the environment, but they will be assessed at a lower level of scrutiny within the context of the overall scheme rather than a formal EIA. The work already done for the EIA will be used to prepare the new documentation for project approval.

It is disappointing and frustrating that the cost and time to prepare the EIA have been unnecessary, and we have considered the action available to the Club for compensation from Government but decided it would not be appropriate to pursue at this time.

We are now proceeding with the formal submission to the Town Planning Board and the statutory gazettal process.

In parallel with the overall development process, the power supply has been upgraded and the water supply upgrade is proceeding. This important enhancement of the utilities infrastructure will allow the Club to secure a Permanent Occupation Permit, support the future development proposal and provide improved services for members.

Funds for the development have been steadily accruing from the Building Development Levy and a portion of the new members' fees. The apportionment to the Development Fund from new members fees was reviewed and approved in the 2023-2024 Budget.

In reviewing current progress and the latest financial requirements, the General Committee resolved in the meeting held on 24 October 2023 to continue the Building Development Levy at the same amount of HK\$288 per month until October 2025, at which time it will be subject to further review and amendment as necessary.

I wish to thank you for your continued support for the Club's proposal to develop Middle Island.

# HOUSE COMMITTEE UPDATE:

I am really happy to report – and you will all have seen – that at last work has started on replacing the Central Services Spine and refurbishment of the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Floor toilets. This is the first visible sign of what will be a continuing programme of upgrading and renovation of our beloved clubhouse. Work should be complete by mid-December 2023, in time for Christmas!

Members cannot fail to have seen that the playground surface has been completely renewed, with a high grade surface which protects our youngest members whilst playing. I hope you like the custom design containing nautical references. I'm pleased to credit our Facilities Manager, Steve Ng, with a lot of the design work.

Behind the scenes, we have upgraded our Point of Sale (POS) accounting system, and are about to embark on a major project to integrate and update all the club management systems. We are also going to improve our website, and electronic communications with members. We have replaced the overhead projectors in the Harbour Rooms with fitted flat screen display units, which provide a much clearer and easier to use digital display platform.

## There are many exciting works "in the pipeline":

We are planning to smarten up The Bridge, one of our key multifunction rooms, so that it can be used as a boardroom, or as a "business centre for members", and as a function room for the many large events we hold during the year.

We have engaged architects to propose a new look to our entrance and staircase. We want to improve the coffee shop, and will start with a modest redecoration, followed by a complete refurbishment.

At the same time, we need to re-lay the coffee shop

patio flooring after doing some drainage and sealing work. This is adjacent to our lovely swimming pool, which will be drained down in the winter cool period for annual maintenance and deep cleaning. Meanwhile, the swimming pool "carpet" surround will be replaced.

As we approach the New Year, we will be looking to move the existing marine lockers into the covered car park area, thus freeing up space for our new laundry reception and uniform storage. This will in turn allow us to construct an appropriately sized and serviceable changing room for our female staff. This is long overdue and is a high priority. Once complete. we will be able to reclaim the existing facilities and then provide proper ladies toilet facilities on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor.

Our gymnasium is very popular, and we plan to replace some of the gym equipment, at a pace that matches our ability to pay for it. We will additionally refurbish the gym, to make it a more attractive place to exercise.

After the qualifying series, we thought we had just made it into the Silver fleet, but unfortunately we were placed in the Bronze fleet. Although this result was not as good as we were hoping for, we never gave up hope, and still tried our best for the finals series. We started off the event with some disputes and arguments, but managed to pull it back near the end and sailed our best races of the event in the last few days.

As we reflect on our time in Kiel, we are filled with a sense of gratitude for ABC for sponsoring us with our charter boat and the entry fees. Kiel was also a great learning opportunity for us to understand the power of teamwork and determination and it was a memory that will stay with us for a lifetime.






# FISH SCIENCE CENTRAL

Nigh on fifty years ago, shortly after I'd arrived in Hong Kong for the third time, to take up a teaching post at HKU, I was on my way to the ABC – the old Nissen hut ABC, that is. As the taxi came round the final bend of the old, tree-lined, two-lane blacktop that was then Shek Pai Wan Road, just before we disappeared into the buildings of Tin Wan, I looked across the patch of empty ground of the still recent reclamation towards the new Aberdeen Fisheries and Marine Office... and did a double-take.

Good grief! What on earth was a pretty bog standard looking British North Sea trawler doing in Hong Kong? That's when my interest in Aberdeen as Hong Kong's – and indeed at the time China's – centre of fisheries science began, which I've since followed up in a very desultory fashion over a period of half a century. The piquing of my interest was helped by the fact that I'd only recently finished reading F.D. Ommanney's quirky *Fragrant Harbour: a private view of Hong Kong.* Ommanney, a man of some literary distinction and very widely travelled, had been Reader in Biology at HKU from 1957-1960.

As his book obliquely reveals, he had also been closely involved in fisheries research in Hong Kong. Which led me to his predecessors at HKU; two other people with equally fascinating biographies, G.A.C. Herklots and Lin Shuyan (林書顏).

As I have eventually found out, it is in the unravelling of the fascinating tale of how Aberdeen became fish science central, with signal debts to Herklots, Lin and Ommanney, that the British trawler's presence is explained.

It's actually hard to identify exactly when the story kicked off. The start will have been a British Colonial Office panic about the nutrition of its colonised subjects that stuttered into bureaucratic action, as it were, in 1936. By November 1939 in Hong Kong, Geoffrey Herklots, who'd been appointed Reader in Biology at HKU in 1928, was on the case. He argued forcefully that Hong Kong's nutritional answer was, of course – and as with Bertie Wooster's explanation for Jeeves' genius – fish. And not just fish, but fish backed by science led by him and his chaps at HKU, who should, forthwith, be given loadsamoney to create a fisheries research outfit and an aquarium.


Bureaucratic wheels ground. By 1940, and with war grumbling away, a small load of money was disgorged – stripped of any question of an aquarium – and in March that year the HKU Fisheries Research Station, with Lin Shuyan as its head, was officially born. The official launch had probably been anticipated by a year or so, the first volume of the Journal of the Hongkong Fisheries Research Station having appeared in February 1940, with a long piece by Lin describing Hong Kong's fishing industries, which

had pretty much been ignored and were in desperate need of reform.

... and then war came to Hong Kong.

Although the wartime stories of Geoffrey Herklots and Lin Shuyan are amazing, we haven't space here for details. Unlike all his colleagues, who had been told to escape into China, with Herklots' encouragement Lin Shuyan stayed in Hong Kong engaged in the fisheries so vital for food. He ended up part of the Japanese revolution in Hong Kong's fishing industry, doing away with the old system that had effectively kept fisherfolk poor. With liberation imminent, Lin produced a brilliant report, basically arguing that all the reforms that the Japanese had introduced should remain in place. Locked up in Stanley, Geoffrey Herklots had come to the same conclusions. In short order, what we know today as the Fish Marketing Organization became the new face of the occupation period arrangements.


Come the return of the British, the military administration put Geoffrey Herklots in charge as Director of Fisheries, with Lin Shuyan as his deputy and head of the revived research station. Both knew that despite the Japanese reforms, a fishing fleet down to 30% of its pre-war numbers and still locked in fishing practices that hadn't really changed in generations, cried out for investment, better training, and better knowledge of fisheries resources.

Once the immediate post-war dust had settled, it was clear that the colonial government hadn't learned much, and by 1948 Geoffrey Herklots, frustrated by an administration supinely under the thumbs of Hong Kong's ever-rapacious business community, left. Lin Shuyan hung in for a couple of years before he too left to begin over a decade of pioneering work with the new United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization.

And at that point, to cut a long story short, two things happened. First, running fisheries research seems to have been split into two operational bits - the full-on research biz, which was part of HKU. And the more mundane, how-to-upfishing-boat-productivity outfit, which one way or another was part of government. Both outfits realised that to run any sort of fisheries research biz, something that floated was needed. HKU kicked off in 1953, when the HK & Whampoa Dock Co was commissioned to build a pukka research vessel, which was called the Alister Hardy after the UK marine biology supremo. The vessel stayed in business until, finally, in 1978 she was auctioned off, and at that point she drops from sight.

The practical chaps in government's then Agriculture and Fisheries and Forestry Department's Fisheries Division, began more modestly three years later with Fisheries Research Vessels No.1 and No.2. The first was a modified, second hand 33-foot fishing junk called *Olenka*, though why it was chosen I haven't a clue. Very shortly afterwards – dating is a bit ropey – came the purpose designed, Aberdeen built, 33-foot *Yuen Ling*.

The Olenka was auctioned off in 1962, and I haven't a clue what happened to her. The Yuen Ling lasted until 1967, having spent her last year scraping the seabed in Plover Cove as part of the work to create the reservoir. She too was auctioned and disappears from the record. Who knows, both may have been converted to become members of the first generation of leisure junks!

All the early research vessels were effectively for working in local waters only. However, the Hong Kong fishery wasn't just in inshore waters. For generations there had been HK fishermen who ranged far out into the South China Sea. However, what was known about those waters was down to what great-grandfather told grandfather, not hard science. If fishing yields were going to be increased to the levels needed for Hong Kong's fast-growing population, more needed to be known. That meant having a research vessel that could venture out into the vasty deep.





Captain Markland and the Cape St Mary on arrival in Hong Kong (SCMP)



The Cape St Mary had been built as a purpose designed research vessel, albeit along the lines of a standard Scottish deep-sea trawler. She'd been launched in 1951 to work in the Gulf of Guinea in West Africa. By 1959, for one reason or another, she was up for grabs and the Colonial Office decided she should be sent to Hong Kong. She'd arrived at the beginning of October 1959, having steamed via South Africa, Sri Lanka and Singapore, under the command of Captain J.D. Markland and with a mainly Guianian crew.

So, that's what I was seeing in 1974. Pretty much as soon as she arrived, HKU declared it wasn't into the biz of operating ships, and handed everything back to government. The ship served on, a familiar on the Aberdeen waterfront and looked after by the Marine Department, until 1978. At that point she was loaned to the Marine Police, to help with patrolling against illegal immigration, until she was pensioned off in 1982.

Meanwhile, in around 1978 a decision had been made to replace the *Cape St Mary* with the latest and greatest in fisheries research vessels. What

followed is an amazing tale of a government cock-up. The new vessel, designed in Canada and built in Hong Kong, was the *Tai Shun*, which was launched in July 1980 and commissioned in October.

In April 1984, three and a bit years after commissioning, government announced that the HK\$10,000,000 vessel was for sale and that deep sea fisheries research was to end. Almost the last thing the *Tai Shun* did was to find the wreck of the *Osprey*, the converted sailing vessel that had been blown out of her anchorage in Typhoon Ellen, in a completely different location to where the Court of Inquiry, under the ABC's long time Commodore Ashley Wagg, had concluded it had sunk.

Brilliantly, the *Tai Shun* was then sold back to Chung Wah Shipbuilding Co., the firm that had built it, for about a tenth of what the builder had been paid. The total loss to public coffers was HK\$12,000,000. "The Government's cashflow has benefitted by HK\$1 million" taxpayers were told – nice one!

The builder refitted it and sold it on as an oil industry exploration vessel in 1991. Since then it's been the Koshi III (1991-1995), John (1995-2002), Emma (2002-2014) and Nordic Emma (2014-) ... and yes, she's still afloat, in Indonesia, 43 years after she was launched – and when last traced, was for sale.

# SQUALL DELAYS START BUT RACING AND LEISURELY LUNCH PROCEED AS PLANNED

The prospects of a two-hour race followed by a leisurely, perhaps even longer seafood lunch, attracted 21 boats to enter Island Race 6 of the Aberdeen Boat Club's (ABC) Summer Series 2023, held on Sunday 13 August 2023.

The Observatory's forecast looked promising, with Force 4-5 winds; but the threat of showers was always going to be a dampener... and so it proved.

In the absence of Alex Johnston and Jennifer Li, the ABC's General Manager, Philippe de Manny, assumed the role of race officer, assisted by ABC's Head Racing Coach Daniel Dolega.

Having determined where the Lamma start line was, the committee boat's anchor was dropped in between Wong Chuk Kok and Yuen Kok. There, a 9- to 10-knot southwesterly looked promising, so a start line was set with no windward mark for the scheduled 10:30 start.

Ahead, however, the sky was darkening; and at 10:07 a squall hit with rain and gusts of 19-20 knots and minimal visibility. There was a thunderstorm warning in place, so the race officer had no choice but to hoist the AP postponement flag at 10:15, to sit out the storm and hope for more suitable conditions.

Meanwhile, the wind had swung to 270 degrees so, with conditions stabilising, a windward mark was set into the bay with a new start line.

With the AP lowered at 10:44, the first warning signal was given at 10:50 for the combined IRC start at 10:55. This saw four IRC 1 boats with *Jinn* leading off the line at the pin-end, and three IRC 2 boats led by *Zesst*. The Swan 56 *Parnassus* was the first to round the windward mark and head for Cheung Chau Rock (Sham Shui Pai), passing the ABC Club Mark, demarcating the South Lamma Restricted Anchorage Area, to port. The finish line for their race Course 44(L) was Yung Shue Wan, a distance of 13.6 nautical miles.





Unfortunately, *Jinn* headed straight toward Yuen Kwok Light, failing to round the windward mark before calling in to inquire whether a windward mark had been laid! The race officer had announced it at least three times, with *Jinn* subsequently being scored DSC for failing to sail the course.

At 11:00 it was a clear start for the combined HKPN fleet, numbering nine HKPN A and five HKPN B boats. The J/80 Jahoo! had a good start beside the committee boat and led around the windward mark.

Unfortunately, it was downhill from there with the breeze easing as the fleet approached Yuen Kok Light, the ABC Mark and south Lamma.

Having rounded the windward mark and passed the ABC Mark to port, the HKPN's 11.6-nautical mile Course 44(S) was to take them to round P1 Buoy to starboard, before proceeding to the finish line at Yung Shue Wan.

By 12:30, it was becoming obvious that the fleets would be struggling to complete the whole course. So the mark laying and media boat *ABC 14*, with Sai Fuk and FH on board, was told to shorten the HKPN fleet at the P1 Buoy. Meanwhile, the committee boat, *Shun Fung*, headed for Cheung Chau, where Philippe shortened the course for IRC.



There, *Next* took IRC 1 line honours in 2 hours 38 minutes and 28 seconds for 2<sup>nd</sup> place, beaten on handicap by *Manbude*. *Neo One* finished 3<sup>rd</sup>, while *Parnassus*, which sailed close to the P1 Buoy, suffered in the light airs and opted for lunch rather than continuing.

Zesst also retired, leaving 2 Easy to claim line and handicap honours in IRC 2.

First to arrive in HKPN A at the shortened course finish line at P1 Buoy was *Crystal*, in an elapsed time of 3 hours 10 minutes and 10 seconds for 2<sup>nd</sup> place on handicap behind *Daydream* with *Sea Eagle* 3<sup>rd</sup>. Meanwhile *Tipsy Easy, Jahoo!, JeNa PaBe* and *Five O One* all retired, the latter two opting for lunch at Yung Shue Wan rather fighting the ebbing tide.

Boss, flying its colourful pink kite, closed slowly on the P1 finish line to claim HKPN B line honours for 3<sup>rd</sup> on corrected. With the breeze slowly building the Japanese team on Water Rabbit claimed handicap honours with Easy Breezy II in 2<sup>nd</sup>.

With the IRC race finished the race officer on *Shun Fung* took over recording finishing times at the P1 Buoy, allowing Sai Fuk, on ABC 14, to help ferry sailors to the Sampan Restaurant at Yung Shue Wan.

















After an elapsed time of 4 hours 9 minutes and 33 seconds, *Voyages 88* finally finished for 4<sup>th</sup> on handicap in HKPN B.

During lunch at the Sampan Restaurant, there was a surprise visit by the Marine Police complaining about parked yachts blocking access for the ferries. Seemingly, documents were inspected before they eventually left.

Bottles of wine were presented to the winners, and if any were not present the wine went to the next in line who were.

# LIGHT WINDS BUT LIVELY PRIZE-GIVING IN SEASON FINALE

The Aberdeen Boat Club's Summer Series this year attracted 27 entries and, although not seen as one of the Club's most competitive events, it is nevertheless taken seriously by all those who cross the start line. On Sunday 27 August, 18 boats showed up off Middle Island for Race 7, the final in the series.

Not a lot of wind was forecast but, being the decider in the series, crews were ready to do battle and finish it off with a lively prize-giving at the club's Middle Island facility. The format has proven itself over the years and is now a fixture on the local sailing calendar.

The committee boat, *Shun Fung*, dropped anchor off Middle Island in 12 metres of water and, after some discussion with his assistant, Jennifer Li, race officer Alex Johnston decided on the shortened version of Course 41 for everyone, with a provision to shorten course at Castle Rock



if necessary. Club support staff, Sai Fuk, in his P4 sampan, set off to lay the outer distance mark and the Tai Tam mark off Beaufort Island.

Johnston welcomed all boats at 11:10, announced the courses and, as always, warned everyone to stay out of the East Lamma Channel's Traffic Separation Scheme. He also pointed out that the Chesterman Gate could be dropped on the way home and all crews would be welcome at the day and series prize-giving at Middle Island.

At 11:19, the AP flag was lowered, and the countdown for the IRC divisions began at 11:20.

Getting a good start was Eddy Lee's *Next*, a Neo Roma 430, with Sunny Leung's *Manbude* and Stefan Fillip's *Neo One* in hot pursuit. The two IRC 2 Division boats – *Zesst* and *2 Easy* (formerly *Arcturus*) brought up the rear.

At 11:30, HKPN A and B eased across the line, although in the light airs some of the slower boats took a while. But, a report from Tai Tam with a











wind reading of 7 knots from 70 degrees came as encouraging news for the race management team. The RO pointed out that a small typhoon in the area was causing the easterly winds.

Next was first to pass the Tai Tam mark and round Beaufort Island. Thanks to an incoming tide, the IRC boats had little difficulty transiting the channel between Beaufort and Po Toi and, at 13:00, Next was rounding Castle Rock and heading for home. The RO decided the committee boat, Shun Fung, should make haste and get into position near Round Island to finish the leaders. In the distance, off Bluff Head, the HKPN fleets were making steady progress in 5-6 knots of breeze.

Line and handicap honours for IRC 1 went to Next, with Manbude 2<sup>nd</sup> on handicap and Neo One 3<sup>rd</sup>. Zesst took 1<sup>st</sup> in IRC 2 with 2 Easy in 2<sup>nd</sup>. FIVEOONE Oceanis 43 John Berry helms Five O One ABERDEEN BOAT CLUB







In the HKPN A division, Sea Eagle crossed the finish at 14:28:15 and scored a deserved 1<sup>st</sup> on handicap. Helped by the tide, in 2<sup>nd</sup> came JeNa PaBe with Crystal in 3<sup>rd</sup>. HKPN B was won by Boss while The Farr Side placed 2<sup>nd</sup> and Water Rabbit 3<sup>rd</sup>.

At 16:00, the prize-giving began at Middle Island, with series awards going to *Next* (IRC 1) and *Zesst* (IRC 2), and *Sea Eagle* (HKPN A) and *Boss* (HKPN B) bringing to a close another successful Summer Series hosted by the Aberdeen Boat Club.



# With Super Typhoon Inbound, Sailors Carry on Potting

On 31 August, the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club (RHKYC) invited the ABC for the return match from earlier in the year. This match was originally meant to happen on 17 July, but had to be rearranged due to Typhoon Talim. And, with Super Typhoon Saola bearing down on Hong Kong on 31 August, it was close to a second rescheduling.

Despite RHKYC already having a sailing series named 'typhoon', this match was now close to being nicknamed the 'typhoon' snooker match. Fortunately, with only typhoon signal 3 being in effect at the time, and signal 8 not estimated to be issued until after midnight, we pressed ahead with the match.

First up for ABC was Andy Chan, in just his second match for the Club, and again showing his importance to the team. He was playing Billy Chan from the RHKYC and the match started off at a frantic pace. Andy demonstrated a number

of excellent breaks and powered ahead on the scoreboard, then finished off the coloured balls to put ABC 1:0 up.

The next game pitted Adrian Lynch for ABC against RHKYC's snooker convener, Gordon Robinson; and it was now Adrian's turn to show his break building skills for ABC. Gordon did get a couple good shots off himself, but this was very much one-way traffic and snookers were quickly required to chase the game. Once the coloured balls had also been dispatched, it was now 2:0 to the ABC.

Normally, we would look to complete all the singles games before starting the doubles. However, due to extended work commitments and heavy typhoon-related traffic, a couple of the ABC team (including myself) were running a bit late. Therefore, to avoid holding up the evening, the schedule was changed to have the first of the doubles games next. Andy and Adrian were already warmed up and ready to go, so they went together for ABC and played against Ray Chui and David Fan for RHKYC. This was a much tighter game, with both sides showing solid potting skills along with their safety play ability. It was the ABC pairing, though, that demonstrated the greater ruthlessness, when following their red balls with various coloured balls to see us through to a third win of the evening.

After the doubles interlude, it was back to the singles games, with ABC captain Dave Hilling against David Fan for RHKYC. Right from the breakoff it was clear this was a very important game for RHKYC to win, as David produced a perfect snooker, leaving the white ball snug behind the green. He then went on to play some truly inspired snooker, combining long shots with break building. Dave valiantly battled on, but there was no way back, and RHKYC were up on the board now at 3:1.

The dinner followed, which was excellent and a good chance to catch up on how everyone's summer holidays had been. However, with club staff anxiously looking at their watches as Typhoon Saola was getting ever closer, it was back to snooker.

The final singles match was Tong Yun Fat for ABC vs Ray Chui for RHKYC, however it seemed more like Fat against Fat. Every time he managed a nice potting combination, he would

give equal points in fouls back to Ray. Therefore, it was actually neck and neck for the majority of the game, with Fat just ahead as they went to the colours. Ray suddenly kicked into gear and dispatched yellow, green, brown and blue, then rattled the almost game-winning pink in the far pocket. Immediately, Fat responded by potting that pink and then an audacious long black to win an amazing game of snooker. 4:1 to the ABC.

So just one doubles game remained, and despite the unassailable lead for the ABC, every game between the two sailing clubs is always hotly contested. Fat returned to the table alongside Dave for the ABC, and they went up against Gordon and Billy for RHKYC. This was certainly a cagier affair, with safety regularly deployed and neither team really hitting their stride, but it would have been difficult to match the intensity of the last match. In the end, the ABC pairing ground out the result to leave the final scores for the evening 5:1 to the ABC.

What a typhoon performance by the team, and an extremely enjoyable match with our RHKYC friends, who were great hosts throughout. The players and all the staff could now go home safely, and prepare for the wind and rain coming into Hong Kong in the next few hours.


