

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# Commodore's Letter

am pleased to note that another successful Southside Regatta was held in early December, with 120 entries. We were pleased to welcome again substantial contingents from the Hong Kong Optimist Dinghy Association, the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club and Sailability.

The Club's AGM was held on 25 November and was well attended. The General Committee welcomed new members of the Committee - Tristan Stewart and James Smith, as well as the reelection of Richard Walker, Jon Zinke, Matthew Johnson, Barry Hill and David Tait, and giving thanks to Hans Lange and Andres Sanchez for their valuable contributions to the Club through committees in recent years. Thanks also go to co-optees who diligently served in our committees over the the last year. The officers of Rear Commodore - Sailing Chris Pooley, Rear Commodore - House

Richard Walker, Treasurer Matthew Johnson and Honorary General Secretary Nick Bodnar-Horvath, as well as myself go forward for the year 2015. A lively forum of members' questions followed the AGM.

As decided in the 2014-15 budget, our monthly subscriptions will have to rise from January 2015, from \$1150/month to \$1225/month to cover the effects of inflation on salaries and other costs. This is the first rise in basic subscriptions since February 2008 and the long delay in this rise reflects strong cost management and increased membership numbers. There are no changes in other basic charges - carpark fees, mooring fees and the building levy - which remain the same as in 2014.

We have now effectively reached our membership limit of 1200 (apart from Honorary members, cadet members and the like), and new members are being



selected based on the priorities from the Club Memorandum of Association, which requires us to encourage boating and sailing.

I wish you and your families the very best for the festive season, the New Year and the Year of the Goat. See you around the Club.

# Flag Officer's Report

House and Building Committee (HouseCom) has made a number of improvements to the fabric of the Club and its operational systems.

Changes to the Clubhouse included the installation of video surveillance cameras in the playground in March due to damage to equipment. In April, the main entrance to the Club was brightened up with the new trophy cabinet and a long-overdue facelift for the staff changing rooms and canteen!

Communication with members became more electronic as we continue to seek to limit our environmental impact. In May, we introduced the weekly e-newsletter that covers all aspects of the activities of the Club and includes direct links to events booking. This has been further developed to include e-newsletters on Club and boating matters. The website was also

# **ABC Member Professor Anthony Hedley**

Professor Anthony Hedley died on 19 December 2014 after a long battle with illness. Dr. Hedley, born in 1941, joined HKU in 1988 as chair professor of community medicine, a post held until he retired in 2010. He lived in Hong Kong for over 22 years and was an active member of the ABC.

Professor Hedley published in 2009 his "Air Pollution and Public Health" paper, reflecting his lifelong battle against smoking and fight to reduce air pollution. He was the instigator in 2010 of Hong Kong's now-ubiquitous air pollution index.

Professor Hedley will be sorely missed by ABC members and staff.



# Relax and Renew with Gong Healing

n ABC member, Martha Collard, is at the forefront of introducing an ancient form of relaxation and healing to this part of the world. Gongs are unmatched in their ability to create balance and to shatter blockages. The sound of a master-quality gong induces a state of spontaneous meditation and relaxation, which facilitates the movement of chi or prana (positive life force) throughout the body. On a physical level, the movement eliminates tension, stimulates the circulation and glandular systems, and regenerates the parasympathetic nervous system.



# Large Turnout as ABC Hosts 2014 Southside Regatta

n 6 and 7 December, the Southside Dinghy regatta, the ABC's premier annual dinghy event, once again proved to be a successful and enjoyable weekend. This was the fifth running of the event since its relaunch in 2010, after its inception back in 1995.

This year saw our largest-ever number of entries, with 123 registered to take part (compared to 108 and 103 in the last two years). This highest-ever numbers came despite the Hong Kong Sea School being unable to send any sailors or support the event, as the dates clashed with an important school open day. Nor could Operation Breakthrough support the event as its volunteers, mostly police officers, were too busy with other commitments. In addition, this year we had no sailors from Macau. We also saw far fewer 29ers and Hobie 16s take part.

What did drive overall numbers up was a big increase in Optimist sailors, reflecting the efforts of all sailing clubs to get more youngsters sailing.

Division B also saw more sailors, again mainly due to increased numbers of Laser 4.7 competitors. We also welcomed back a larger-than-ever contingent from Hong Kong Sailability, with 10 entries in the Access 303 and 2.4mR classes. The latter proved particularly impressive, including Foo Yuen Wai who recently returned from the Asian Para Games in Korea, having won the bronze medal.

As the weekend approached, falling temperatures and a strong northeast monsoon wind hinted at a tough and windy regatta and this was certainly the case for Day 1.

As the fleets set out, winds picked up and Race Officer Greg Sinclair wisely brought the dinghy fleet back from Stanley





Bay to a sailing area just off Round Island. With winds gusting in excess of 25 knots, the safety team were kept busy as the regatta got underway. Three good races were completed for all dinghy classes, with the Hobie 16s managing four races. The multihulls and 29ers were sailing off Po Toi and were experiencing even more breeze!

The second day promised more of the same conditions, but saw a dramatic decrease of wind through the morning, eventually resulting in the race officer struggling to get the final start in with breeze hovering around four knots. In the end, five races were completed for all classes, with the 29ers managing eight and the Hobie 16s nine races.

Division A saw total dominance by Calum Gregor and Hugo Christensson in their 420, sailing superbly and winning with four out of five bullets. They were pursued by Gerald











Williams (Laser Standard) and Jackie Truhol (Laser Radial) in second and third.

Division B saw a clean sweep from J-Asia Laser 4.7 sailors, with Nick Bezy, Marion Williams and Stephanie Norton taking the top three places, despite all missing the final race to leave early and sail back to their base in Sai Kung.

It was very close at the top of the Optimist Division, with Nancy Highfield and Thorwen Uiterwaal finishing on equal points but Nancy winning on countback. The Sailability Access 303 division also had a close finish with Cho Ping eventually winning by one point. Over on the 29er course, Yann

D'Argenlieu and Nathan Bradley took top honours, while Lai Ka Fai and Bendy Lee were first Hobie 16.

As usual, huge thanks go to all the volunteers involved in supporting the regatta, and also to those ABC members who agreed to be part of our protest committee. Principal Race Officer Greg Sinclair was back once again and did a fine job, with great support from Bo Fussing on the 29er and multihull course, and Assistant Race Officer Sofia Mascia. Ocean Park and *Fragrant Harbour* contributed prizes, and free event shirts came from Gybe.






# VISTRA Hobie Asian Championships 2014 ABC Supports Hong Kong Hobie Club As World's Best Cat Sailors Race at Tai Tam

he ABC helped support the Hobie Asian Championships in Hong Kong on 18 –19 October, joining the local club's 20th anniversary celebration as many top international catamaran sailors competed in the strong winds that often exceeded 20 knots.

Winning all races on both days were Damrongsak Vongtim and Kitsada Vongtim from Thailand, who recently came second in this year's Asian Games. Damrongsak, the 2014 Hobie Asian Champion, is a two-time Asian Games winner as well as a multiple Thai national champion.

In hot pursuit, securing second place, were Hong Kong stalwarts Tong Shing and Kit Tong, who earned third place in the recent Asian Games.

Third place in the Championships went to 2007 Hobie 16 world champion and 2011 Australian champion Mick Butler. Local girl Kate Lai was his crew for the two days.

A total of 27 teams competed, including entrants from Thailand, Taiwan, Japan and the Philippines

together with Hong Kong's own Hobie 16 regulars.

The ABC provided a safety boat and staff support for the Hong Kong Hobie Club's event. Race Office Bo Fussing, an ABC member, officiated.

Running in tandem with Vistra HAC on both days was the IAE Open Catamaran Cup which – as the name suggests – was open to all other sports catamarans, mainly spinnaker-flying F18s and F17s. All races on both days were won by Michael Scantlebury and David Harris sailing a Hobie Wildcat.

Held near Tai Tam Bay, the championships featured a series of geometric courses. "It was a fantastic event," said Hong Kong Hobie Club Commodore Peter Frauchiger. "The wind and the weather played along real well, and sailors had to be constantly on guard with huge gusts that in an instant could capsize boats and dash dreams. All participants had a fantastic time on and off the water – greatly enjoying each other's company. The international crowd from all over Asia really spiced up the event."

# South Island Line (East):

# Hong Kong's Southern District Moves Closer to Connecting with MTR Network

any new buildings have sprung up in recent years over Hong Kong's Southern District, especially in the Wong Chuk Hang area. One overhead structure stands out, winding its way from north to south, and crossing over the Aberdeen Channel towards Ap Lei Chau.

It is the viaduct of the South Island Line (East) (SIL(E)), a 7-kilometre, medium-capacity railway comprising tunnel and above-ground viaduct sections that extend from Admiralty to the Southern District, passing through Ocean Park, Wong Chuk Hang, Lei Tung and South Horizons.

Targeted to open at the end of 2016, SIL(E) will connect the Southern District with Hong Kong's existing railway network, providing fast and convenient railway service to the community across the busy Southern District.

Construction of SIL(E) began in 2011. At the end of October 2014, more than 79 percent of the works for the project had been completed.

# Revitalising the community

When the SIL(E) opens, it will greatly shorten the travelling time in and out of the Southern District. For example, the trip from Admiralty to Ocean Park will be reduced to just four minutes from the current 25 minutes by road. For the benefit of residents of Ap Lei Chau, the journey time from Admiralty to South Horizons will take only approximately 11 minutes.

In addition to the railway transport service, the SIL(E) project will also

provide a number of public facilities for the community's convenience and enjoyment. These include a public transport facility under Wong Chuk Hang Station, a footbridge connecting Wong Chuk Hang Station and the nearby industrial area, a new Kwun Hoi Path footbridge that has already been installed, and a footbridge to connect South Horizons with Ap Lei Chau Estate. There also will be improvements to the existing road network in the vicinity of Ocean Park and Wong Chuk Hang stations.

# A catalyst for regeneration

Beautification works will be conducted along Heung Yip Road to Ocean Park Road, introducing paved walkways and a greener, more natural ambience, and creating a promenade along the existing nullah where residents can enjoy relaxing walks or other leisure activities.

A property development has also been planned for the top of Wong Chuk Hang Station and the adjacent depot. In future, a 47,000 square-metre shopping mall will be built on the site. Some 4,700 residential units will be in 14 residential blocks planned for construction above. This development will serve as a catalyst for urban regeneration in the Wong Chuk Hang area.

## New stations and a depot

Of the four new MTR stations in the Southern District, structural works for both above-ground stations, Ocean Park Station and Wong Chuk Hang Station, are complete. The blue and yellowish-green facades that aim to blend into the surrounding environment can now be seen, whilst other fitting-out and electrical and mechanical works are in progress.

Similarly, the civil works of Wong Chuk Hang Depot were completed in mid-2014. Fitting out and electrical and mechanical works are now underway inside the depot.

On Ap Lei Chau, structural construction of Lei Tung Station and South Horizons Station and their respective station entrances are in progress, while all excavation works have been completed. Structural works of the Yuk Kwai Shan End Plant Building and Lee Wing Street Ventilation Building are also underway.

## **Tunnel and viaduct construction**


Starting from the underground Admiralty Station, SIL(E) enters the Southern District through the Nam Fung Tunnel. Trains will run on an elevated viaduct from the tunnel portal near the Aberdeen Tunnel toll plaza and will go underground again as they reach Ap Lei Chau. While the blasting works for the tunnel section on Ap Lei Chau were completed in early 2014, a new milestone was reached recently – the 3.2-kilometre Nam Fung Tunnel was broken through in October 2014.

Track-laying works from Ocean Park Station to South Horizons Station were completed in October 2014. Residents may have seen canary-yellow engineering vehicles moving along the viaduct section from time to time – they are the works trains that install overhead lines and trackside auxiliaries along the completed track sections.

# Admiralty: driving through challenges

While works in the Southern District are progressing well, the SIL(E) project continues to face challenges in the Admiralty Station extension works, which are being carried out close to high-rise buildings and the existing railway. In particular, the underpinning works for the Island Line tunnel are being conducted with great care, to maintain the safety of the railway tunnel structure and ensure no impact to train services.

The opening of SIL(E) is now targeted for the end of 2016. As safety is the top priority, the project team of MTR will continue to strive to overcome the challenges so as to deliver railway service to the Southern District community as soon as possible.
