

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


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## FLAG OFFICER'S REPORT

On June 11th, Aberdeen Boat Club hosted its 3rd Annual St. Baldrick's Day Event. The St. Baldrick's Day Events in Hong Kong are volunteer-driven and the donations are committed to funding the most promising research to find cures for childhood cancers, and give survivors long and healthy lives.

The thirteen shavees volunteered to be shorn in public in solidarity with the children that lose their hair during cancer treatment. In exchange for this sacrifice, their family, friends and business colleagues made donations to help fund childhood cancer research in Hong Kong. Thanks to the many thoughtful and generous supporters over HK\$185,000 was raised at the event.

And who were these shavees? They included members that were kids, adults (including a woman), a father/son team and 'The ABC Staff made up of four shavees Team' (although with Andy it was hard to tell! Ed). This was a recipe for an entertaining event for all that attended. There were laughs, tears and overall happiness to be involved in this great time for a great cause!

The Guest of Honour was Saimon Rodriguez. Saimon is the son of Amie Rodriguez, a long time staffer at ABC. Saimon was fifteen years old when diagnosed with a brain tumour in November, 2010. He battled this dreadful disease for seven months and recently completed his last radiotherapy treatment. We are very pleased to report that the tumour is gone. One of the most moving moments of the event was when Saimon decided to be shorn and join in with the other heroes.

All the funds raised at the event will be distributed to the Children's Cancer Foundation in Hong Kong. This Foundation was formed 22 years ago and is instrumental in seeking childhood cancer research projects conducted in Hong Kong.

he sun was shining, but sitting on the coffee shop deck for breakfast there was little wind. What a surprise then to arrive in Repulse Bay and find a steady breeze blowing in from the east. Glad I didn't take up any course suggestions while in the coffee shop!

Po Toi is the usual destination of many Summer Series races due to the wind, but with an easterly breeze it was a good opportunity to go to Cheung Chau. Fingers crossed that the breeze behind Lamma was a go as well.

So the course was set. I decided to make it more interesting so I dispensed with the windward mark and set a reaching start to the first mark — Chesterman Buoy. For some of the boats it was a challenge, but the old faithfuls, *The Farr Side*, *Thea* and *Xiphias* revelled in it. *The Farr Side* got the better of it and set the pace.

For the committee boat the race was then on for us to get to Cheung Chau and set the finish line. I suggest it may be time to buy a faster committee boat! It was touch and go if we would get there in a timely manner. All the boats had managed to stick together, and the sight of seeing all the spinnakers barrelling down on Cheung Chau rock was amazing.

We arrived with only minutes to spare before *Xiphias* rounded the last point. It ended with a flurry as all 10 boats finished within 25mins of line honours winner *Xiphias*. *Ahyoka* crossed just two minutes later with *Intrigue* crossing two minutes after that.



## WHEN THE BOAT COMES IN

he First Fishing Tournament between the Aberdeen Boat Club and the Mandarin Sport Fishing Club to be held for a number of years took place on May 29th. With Typhoon Songda veering away from the South China Sea, the weather was ideal with sunny skies, light winds and a gentle easterly swell. Allowing boat owners to enter without being members of either club, organisers were able to offer places to almost all anglers who wanted to take part, making a record of five boats and over 25 anglers.

Fishing started at 08:15 and all lines were out of the water by 16:15. Most boats were 20-25 miles offshore, *Thai Lady* being the exception which set off on Friday night to the Riggs.

There were over 150 fish hooked, with the vast majority being released. The most common fish caught was Mahi Mahi, with Tuna (Bluefin and Kawa Kawa) also being landed. Chris Hirst secured the win for the Mandarins by landing and releasing a Black Marlin after a titanic 45 minute battle, on 30lb (15kg) line.

After the fishing all boats headed to the ABC's Middle Island clubhouse for the weigh-in, joining friends and family members for the after match BBQ. It was a very social and well-attended event. A rematch has already been tabled, dates and timing to be advised.



## 2011 MACAU INTERNATIONAL DINGHY REGATTA

or the second year ABC supported the Macau Sailing Academy by sending a team of sailors and dinghies over to compete in their annual regatta, this year held on 11 & 12 June off Hac Sa beach in Macau. Not only is this a great fun event, it's also billed as a 'family weekend away' with sailors and families from all three Hong Kong clubs getting together to sail and relax, as well as showing our support for the development of dinghy sailing in Macau.

The logistics to support the event by both ABC and Hebe Haven Yacht Club involved packing and sending over 17 Pico dinghies and two safety boats in two containers. It's a considerable job as the ABC boats first need to be transported to HHYC where the extra space and equipment is available to pack the containers. The containers are then shipped to Macau and unloaded for the event. The Hong Kong boats, together with the Topaz, Lasers and Stratos already owned by MSA, allowed a fleet of 33 dinghies to take part over the weekend.

Saturday saw light winds increasing to around 10 knots and a rather leisurely four races were held, complete with lunch break back on the beach! ABC sailors got away to a great start with our Topaz team of James Hodgson and JG Brasier ending the day with three first's and

a second, out of the nine boat fleet to hold first place, with Natalie Tsui and Faith Leung taking second place. In the Pico division ABC sailors had a poor start but showed steady improvement with Yann D'Argenlieu and Oliver Edmonds ending the first day 4th overall out of 15 Picos. For the first time there were adult sailors as part of an inter-club challenge, sailing in Stratos dinghies, and with crew changes allowed. Fred, Christine, Will, Matthew and Jack took turns in the ABC boat and finished in joint top-spot with the Macau team after day one.

An evening barbecue was arranged on Saturday for all competitors, family and friends, with great help from the Miramar Restaurant, located right on the beach, which supports the Macau Sailing Academy throughout the year and particularly this event. ABC, HHYC and RHKYC sailors and families also enjoyed staying at the luxury Westin Hotel, immediately next to the sailing area. The Westin supported the event by offering special rates and free breakfasts; 27 rooms were booked by visiting sailors and families.

Sunday dawned with rain, thunder and almost no wind, and the start was delayed until 11.30am, when a shifting breeze picked up that allowed two quick races to be completed. In the Topaz division ABC continued to dominate with James and JG getting a first and second, and easily winning overall, counting four bullets and a second. Natalie and Faith had a poor fifth race in their Topaz; after finishing joint second on points a count-back gave them 3rd overall behind Hebe Haven's Sam Cooke. HHYC's James Johnson convincingly won the Pico class, with Campbell and Florie Manzoni from RHKYC taking second and ABC Pico sailors Yann and Oli finally coming into their own and finishing 3rd overall in the division. The adult Stratos sailors also had a tie overall, ABC and Macau with equal points, the count-back narrowly giving victory to Macau. In the Laser class, Peyton Choeng from Macau dominated, with an impressive six first places – he discarded a first!

Overall, a great weekend. Simple, short races, lots of fun and lots of joint club co-operation and friendly competition. Thanks to the Westin Hotel, to Antonio at the Miramar Restaurant, to our water sponsors "Tibet 5100" and all the others who worked to make this welcome get-away from Hong Kong work! 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n the face of it, buying a boat is easy. You go to a boat dealership, write a cheque and wait for the happy day when your baby arrives fresh from the factory. In reality it is not that simple. A great deal of thought needs to go into the buying process and there are many factors to consider including: the intended use of the boat; budget available; and customising your boat to your needs. In this article some of Hong Kong's most successful yacht dealers give us their insights into how to choose the right boat for you.

Buying a boat is a major investment so it pays to have a broker who takes a personal interest in getting you the right boat. Olivier

Decamps of Jebsen Marine asks new clients "Is the boat for fast cruising or racing? Will it be used for inshore sailing, for offshore passage making or both? If cruising, then what kind of numbers will you have aboard, and what type of guests? Will they be family, VIP's, business colleagues etc. Will the boat be sailed locally, or to the Philippines or even further?" This, he states, will impact on the number of cabins required, for example. "Will the boat be sailed short or single handed? This will affect the optional extras the owner will add to his boat." According to Decamps the most commonly ordered option on Achambault's, for example, is the Racing Pack which is essentially top of the range running rigging, lighter and stronger for the racing set.



Buying a luxury brand yacht means buying into the lifestyle and joining a very exclusive club. Gordon Hui, Managing Director of Sunseeker Asia considers the relationship with the dealer paramount when buying a boat. "It is most important to be close to the dealer because the new yacht warranty and after sales service are vital. The dealer can monitor the maintenance and upkeep of the vessel and make sure she is well maintained, safe and in showroom condition." Hui's attraction to the Sunseeker brand goes beyond the technical merits of the ubiquitous deep V hull and the iconic design. "I am excited that the brand has been linked to the Bond films and to Aston Martin, it's a lot of fun."

Vic Locke is the owner of Jade Marine, the Hong Kong dealer for Bavaria Yachts and he has been sailing both here and around the globe for decades. He recommends, "If buying a new boat, research the dealer. Check out their after sales service record. Examine the Sales Agreement the dealer is offering and take it to a solicitor if necessary. Who are the service agents for the main engines? What is their reputation? When looking for a sail boat consider your eventual usage: will you race the boat a lot, never, some times? What options must you get built in at the factory and what can you retro—fit after delivery? For power boats the number one option is aircon with reverse cycle for the winters. For sailing yachts I advise my clients to add a Bimini for summer

sailing and an auto pilot. I would also recommend a folding or feathering propeller as a fixed blade prop takes half a knot off your sailing speed," before adding, "anything delivered with a new yacht should be included in the warranty."

Simpson Marine's stable of brands includes Azimut, Beneteau, Lagoon, Nautor's Swan and Sea Ray. Hong Kong based yacht broker Wilse Lo feels that, "...probably the most important thing is to listen to the customer as he or she explains their requirements, aspirations and budget." Lo believes that, "The buyer is definitely more likely to end up with a boat they enjoy if they have brought it through an experienced and professional broker, who uses his or her expertise to guide the buyer to the best boat for their individual tastes and requirements".

There are as many different types of yacht dealer as there are types of yacht, and to be sure there are some who are best avoided. However, by doing your homework and getting to know your dealer, you can be assured of the highest standards of professionalism and personal integrity. Knowing you've made the right choice, not just of boat, makes that special day just that much sweeter.

## ABC'S FIRST J/80 COMPETENT CREW COURSE words and photos by Kevin Lewis

Our new J/80 programme is now in full swing, and our first ever Competent Crew Course took place over three days in May and June. Following closely the RYA course content, our club's training differs mainly in that the course is run over only three days instead of five, and we require a basic knowledge of sailing as a pre-requisite. We also focus very heavily on practical sailing techniques, and in particular on specific sailing of the J/80 keelboat.

For this, our first course, we relied heavily on the expertise of our own Coach, Rory Godman, together with experienced Senior Instructor and Coach Andy Service and Keelboat Instructor Ben Lau. A wide ranging syllabus was covered, focusing on practical seamanship and sailing skills. The second day of the course provided challenging conditions for students and instructors alike, with winds exceeding 20 knots making it hard work but a superb learning experience. The third day touched on some basic navigation theory and involved a short trip to Po Toi for lunch.

Participant Michael Wan writes: "For me, the J/80 competent crew course was a natural progression from the Laser 2000 course. The 'giant dinghy' is much more comfortable and it doesn't capsize! The course generally brushes up the basic sailing

techniques learned in the HKSF dinghy Levels One and Two. It's also a great introduction to teamwork co-ordination too. After three days, I have become much more confident due to our great instructors Rory and Andy. I can't wait to sail in the J/80 again."

Our next J/80 Competent Crew Course takes place on 30 July, 6 & 13 August, and also includes one evening 'theory' session on Friday 12 August. Spaces are very limited so apply soon! Further details on the J/80 keelboat and our training programme are to be found on our website, www.abclubhk.com.

ith perfect Pearl River crossing conditions, southerly Force 4, predicted for the long Dragon Boat Festival weekend a total of 35 boats romped off to Macau under kites on the morning of June 4th.


Leg I Race Officer Philippe de Manny sent the boats, divided into IRC and HKPN A and B classes, on the southerly Course #2 to Macau. Conditions were steady for the reach across the Pearl River and the fleet enjoyed champagne sailing to the finish, despite bucking an ebbing tide the whole way. *Stella* was the first boat to finish followed by *Frangipani Girl*. Due to confusion amongst some competitors about the location of the finish line the Race Committee decided to calculate the results on the basis of the third cut off at Dalu Dao.

Most boats finished before the 18:30 cut-off and headed into Clube Nautico de Macau for a welcoming dock party and immigration. The wine and beer were free flowing, which helped take the sting off the delay experienced by having to clear immigration with a sole (albeit cheerful) immigration officer! Snacks were also provided from O Porto Restaurant, which was a welcome change from past dock parties.

The first leg prize-giving was held on the lawn of the Miramar Restaurant in Coloane on Sunday June 5th, where there was more free flowing wine and beer, as well as Portuguese snacks.

The Leg 2 and Overall prize giving party was held at the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club on Thursday June 9th. All in all, a memorable weekend with some of the best sailing conditions in a long time.

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


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
