

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

# Commodore's Letter

t has been a great summer, so far with no typhoons! The fair southwest winds added to a very well-attended cruiser Summer Series. The new Division B fleet (shorter course) held its own and will strengthen over coming series. The dinghy Summer Series had conditions like the "curate's egg," finishing well. All will be capped by 2013-14's last event, the Dinghy-Cruiser Challenge on 14 September in Deepwater Bay/Repulse Bay.

In August, our youth squad sailors performed superbly: with one team representing the Hong Kong Sailing Federation in 29ers at the International Sailing Federation Worlds in Portugal, and then two teams in the 29er World

Championships held in Canada. Well done ABC sailors and coach Rory Godman.

Our Opening Regatta on 20-21
September again will run over three race areas: southeast Lamma, west of Po Toi, and Stanley Bay. Entrants include Sailability, some of whose sailors will form the Hong Kong team in October's Asian Para Games in South Korea. Via the Bart's Bash Foundation the regatta will honour the memory of Bart Simpson, tragically lost in May 2013 during America's Cup training.

We've agreed the joint ABC-RHKYC Dinghy Series 2014-2015. Racing is split into two groups, "Open Dinghies and Optimists" and "Double-handed and Moth." This recognises the greater speed



of skiffs and foils and will lead to closer racing in each group. More in this issue.

Best wishes to all at the start of a new sailing season in the best time of year for all boating.

# Flag Officer's Report

t's that time of year when ABC sailors look forward to the change of monsoon and the start of the autumn season. It's not to say that the summer season has not been active; far from it, even if what keeps the staff so busy may not have been apparent.

The summer opened with a look back at the 2013-2014 sailing year at the well-attended prize-giving on 24 May. A host of prizes were well-spread between classes with much celebration amongst several multiple-winning tables.

Then it was on to a well-supported "intro" cruiser race for the Summer ("Restaurant") Series. We intend to build this event into the series itself next year so as to provide for seven races with two discards, giving more boats the opportunity to compete for the series.

The 2014 Opening Regatta is a little later than usual (20-21 September), in hopes the North-easterly will have begun to blow. The RO again will be Greg Sinclair, who will give a race management seminar (certificated) on Thursday evening 18 September. We have a shortage of capable ROs so we ask for volunteers to attend the seminar and raise their hands for spells on the race committee boat and with race administration.

Then, it's our main racing event, the Waglan Series. Dates are in the annual calendar in this issue of *Horizons*.

Again we call for volunteers to participate in the Coastal Watch campaign. ABC has been granted the beach on Beaufort Island to clean up and cherish. We plan two visits a year; the first by junk on 28 September. For details, see this issue's article or contact leader Wayne Robinson.

Our dinghy sailors were busy this summer. Over 300 participated at Middle Island on various dinghy courses and activities, and our High Performance 29er sailors were in Europe and Canada competing at the ISAF Youth Worlds, World Championships and other events. Dinghy sailors look forward to the Opening Regatta in September and the HKSF International Regatta in October, and a busy programme of activities during the October school holidays.

Behind the scenes our staff have been busy having new engines installed on both our support boats; this after limping along for many years with band-aid repairs and



much downtime. Thank you, Treasurer; the investment will be repaid in much lower repair and maintenance costs and reliable support for our marine activities. We are looking to purchase a new committee/ ferry boat after the resale market yielded nothing suitable. We are in the final design stages and are likely to commit in early September. If all goes to plan the newly trained batch of ROs will be able to start the 2015 Summer Series on board. More on this as developments evolve, or see the undersigned in the bar!

Wishing all our sailors brisk breezes and champagne sailing this autumn.

# General Manager's Letter

### Marine and moorings

Over the summer, *Invicta*, the trusty old ABC race and ferry boat, was totally refurbished and fitted with a brand-new engine. Now our Cheoy Lee has been sent to Hongkong United Dockyards for the same rejuvenating treatment, to be back with us just before the Opening Regatta. The refurbishing will halt – for at least the next 10 years – recurrent and costly repairs to our ferries.

After many years of unsuccessful searches for a proper committee, racing and alternative ferry boat, the Club has taken a new direction by commissioning a Cheoy Lee hull and building it to our needs. The drawings are done, and a few more details on engine power and seat layout need to be fine-tuned, but we hope that within eight or nine months we can present our new Club boat. It will need a name, so please pass any suggestions on to me and I will share your ideas with the Sailing and Marine Committee.

The mooring situation has changed little with only two movements over the last few months. Please be aware that we do a weekly check on the boat moorings. As per the mooring contract, we advise against inviting a friend to take on your space during boat repairs or other absences, as this could result in mooring contract non-renewal. Also, recall that Club policy forbids new live-aboard boats or live-aboard transfers. Last month I came across a few such issues; as said, cases for mooring contract termination.

# Sailing and cruising

Our 2014 Opening Regatta this year will be held on 20 and 21 September. For the 11th year the ABC Opening Regatta is

Even more so this year, as the ABC joins a worldwide fundraiser to celebrate the memory of Olympic medallist Andrew "Bart" Simpson who died last year in San Francisco while preparing for the America's Cup. Bart's Bash, as it is called, aims to set the Guinness World Record for the largest regatta in the world. Over 500 clubs around the world have joined the effort, and again thanks to Sunseeker's support for the Opening Regatta, the ABC will be part of the Bart's Bash world-record attempt.

# Race management volunteers

The ABC is always looking for volunteers to help on boats during the regatta, in mark-setting, timekeeping, and boatspotting. Please contact me if you wish to help.

The Club has organized a race management seminar to be conducted on 18 September by renowned race officer Greg Sinclair, captain of the Royal Geelong Yacht Club, one of our reciprocal clubs in Australia. The 6:30 pm – 9:30 pm seminar will be held in the Harbour room at a nominal price of \$150 to include refreshments during a midway break. Please book in advance.

### Junk trip 12 September

The club has reserved the junk for a social cruise on Friday, 12 September. The junk will leave the ABC pontoon at 6 pm for a cocktail cruise as the sun sets around south Lamma near Turtle Bay. Dinner is at one of the best Chinese seafood restaurants on Lamma. The cruise will be capped with coffee aboard before we arrive back at the Club @ 11 pm.

The \$470 per-person price includes the cruise, one cocktail and the seafood dinner with the rest on a consumption basis, and sunset for free. Please book quickly as each member may bring only two guests.





# Summer series growing

When you read this, the 2014 summer series will have ended and our focus will be on the Opening Regatta. As I write the last summer race has yet to be held; therefore you may find the series' final results in the next issue of Horizons. However, let me note the growing numbers of boats that have taken part in the summer series: we have never seen so many racers joining these "restaurant races" as in the last three consecutive years. From 2008 to 2011, total entries were about 18 yachts, averaging eight racers per race. In 2012, numbers started to rise to 31 entries, averaging 13 yachts per race. In 2013 we had 35 entries and an average 16 yachts per race, and finally - so far in 2014 - we have 33 entries but an average 23 participating yachts per race.

This relative tripling of numbers has triggered the desire of our Sailing committee to increase the number of races for next year and make a bit more of the great summer race down south.

Under an overarching ABC training and retraining programme, this summer many ABC staff have had training at the Vocational Training Council and other


venues. I am pleased to inform you that over the next five months the ABC, together with training professionals from the Commercial Development and Training Institute, have made numerous training courses available for our staff.



# **Davy Murrell, 1943-2014**



Sadly we record the passing of a staunch ABC sailor, Davy Murrell, in July, from a tropical disease contracted in the Philippines. Davy worked for Hong Kong Telephone and then PCCW, and, *inter alia*, maintained the transmission dishes we see over Bluff Head.

As well as being a sturdy hash athlete, Davy joined the ABC in May 1993. He was a popular sailor at ABC, sailing regularly on *Gipsy* in the 1980s and 1990s, occasionally on *Tamarisk* (including in the victorious 1996 Shan Wei race), and subsequently on *Kam Loong* in ABC races and on *The Judge* in Philippines events.

Davy retired on 2003 and returned to his native north England, with frequent trips back to Hong Kong and the Philippines.

his year, the ABC has registered to be a part of the global "Bart's Bash" initiative, which also takes place on the second day of our 2014 Opening Regatta, Sunday, 21 September.

Entrants to the ABC regatta may also sign up to join Bart's Bash as well by competing in our event, one of currently 570 events organised worldwide to support Bart's Bash.

# Bart's Bash is a global race

Our club is already registered on the Bart's Bash website (www.bartsbash.co.uk/club/aberdeen-boat-club), and you may register to race on the day. The Bart's Bash on-line sign-up is in addition to the formal entry for the ABC Opening Regatta, and is optional – sailors are not required to take part.

However, if you do sign up for Bart's Bash, you will be part of a global race! Bart's Bash organisers will collect information on entries, results, boats, courses and conditions from each club to be used with the "Bart Number" handicap system to provide overall – and worldwide – results. Ultimately this is a fun event and not precise science, but the aim is to give competitors a result set against every other sailor. Hence, sailors taking part via our regatta will be racing against Ben Ainslie in a Finn, lain Percy in a Star, Paul Goodison in a Moth, Jimmy Spithill in a Melges E-Scow and Loïck Peyron in his Trimaran!

# Bart's Bash is a world record attempt

Organisers hope that Bart's Bash will be the largest-ever sailing event held at multiple venues. Bart's Bash has been registered as a Guinness World Record attempt for a global regatta so the ABC and all other clubs taking part will follow obligations such

as start times, minimum race length, independent witnesses and number of competitors. If successful, everyone who enters will qualify as a world-record holder.

# Bart's Bash is a charity event

Bart's Bash is raising money to support the Andrew Simpson Sailing Foundation, set up in 2013 to honour the life and legacy of Andrew "Bart" Simpson, MBE, Olympic gold and silver medallist and America's Cup sailor. The Andrew Simpson Sailing Foundation focuses on young people between the ages of five and 24 and gives them opportunities to grow, achieve and to inspire the pursuit of excellence through sailing. Specifically, the Foundation centre at Weymouth and Portland offers subsidised sailing for young people; an ambassador programme to take the world's top sailors into schools and youth groups; and the formulation of an international sailing development programme, again focusing on young sailors. Those taking part have the option to help raise funds to support the Foundation's work.

## What you need to do

You need only enter to be a part of the event, a potential world-record holder and get a result in a global regatta! The normal ABC Opening Regatta entry form must be completed and submitted as usual, on or before Wednesday 17 September. To be a part of the Bart's Bash initiative you also need to register at www.bartsbash.co.uk. Read through their information to check out some of the other clubs taking part. Here in Hong Kong, the ABC are joined by the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club, Discovery Bay Yacht Club, Lantau Boat Club and the Hong Kong Schools Sailing Association, all of which will run Bart's Bash events.

# Race preview

# Hebe Haven to Host 24-Hour 2014 Charity Dinghy Race

ver the 1-2 November weekend, Hebe Haven Yacht Club will hold its annual 24-hour dinghy race for charity. The ABC has been closely involved with this event from the very start, and definitely will enter teams again this year.

In the 24-hour race, each boat is raced by a team of sailors on a roster over the 24 hours (from 2 pm Saturday to 2 pm on Sunday). The boats sail a course set in the harbour off Hebe Haven Yacht Club, which is continuously patrolled by safety boats. Team members and supporters can cheer on their team from the dockside where we have a terrific view of the whole race. In fact, it's a great family weekend and many of our members return year after year.

The race this year will support five very worthwhile charities, including the Children's Cancer Foundation, Enlighten

and Sailability Hong Kong (who will sail again this year). Last year's race raised a massive \$650,000, which the organisers hope to beat this year.

The ABC generously sponsors the entry fee for sailors, and there are no extra charges, but sailors are expected to seek sponsors or raise money for the charities as part of their commitment to the event.

The ABC plans to enter three teams that each will sail one of the following boats: a Wayfarer, a Laser 2000, and an RS Feva.

We therefore invite anyone with a Level 1/2 Certificate to sign up for this very worthwhile event, which is also a lot of fun. The Laser 2000 team is an adult-only team and the RS Feva is for our junior sailors. (Participation on the Wayfarer team is by invitation only – it is looking to keep first place again this year!!)



In the past, we have been very grateful to the Club and members for the loan of a junk as a team base over the weekend. If any member has a junk they would be willing to let us use, we'd be very pleased and grateful. It makes an enormous difference to the comfort and spirits of the sailors.

he ABC 2014 Summer Series 5 was forecast to have a 10-knot southwest wind and a two-metre tide, but as usual, very different conditions were found at the usual start area of our races in Deepwater Bay. What did hold true was the strong ebbing tide. The primary intent of the course choice, keeping in line with the series' tradition to visit every part of the southern Hong Kong seafood restaurant scene, was to go to Cheung Chau. Sadly the wind and tide precluded this route, and the only remaining option 30 minutes before the starting sequences was a shorter course to Po Toi's friendly neighborhood and well-appreciated restaurant.

The Race Officer aborted the first start at the last minute as the wind dropped so much that even his cigarette smoke rose straight up, copying the much bigger fume emitted by the Lamma power station chimneys. The race was delayed by 45 minutes but the starting area was repositioned and the race swiftly restarted after a hint came of patches of wind closer to Middle Island. As the fleet reached the windward mark, the wind indeed suddenly picked up, and a proper race finally could be seen between the fast racers *Red Eye*, *Intrigue* and *Andiamo*.

The first Division A boat to complete the 8.5 nautical-mile course to Po Toi was *Redeye*, but having one of the whole fleet's lowest handicaps, it finished fifth in HKPN and third in IRC. *Calamansi* continues to dominate the series in both

IRC and HKPN overall, but the last summer series race will determine – between *Calamansi*, *May 13th*, *Wonderwall*, *Intrigue* and *Andiamo* – which will win the HKPN and who between *Calamansi* (again), *Andiamo* and *Redeye* will get the IRC.

As for the Division B races, *Aquarius* and Josephine Cheng look in good position to get the cup this year but you never know; anything can happen on the last day. To be noted, our late-joiner this year, *Rona*, the beautiful Stowe & Son 78' who joined our Classic Yacht Rally in 2103, brought some welcome elegance to the Sunday restaurant series.

# Macau International Dinghy Regatta 2014

21 and 22 June

he fifth running of the annual Macau International Dinghy Regatta took place this year over the weekend of 21 and 22 June, with the 2014 race seeing the biggest-ever team from the ABC take part.

Some 20 ABC youth and three adult ABC sailors competed across six dinghy classes. Together with associated family members and relatives, there were around 40 Club members at this year's regatta. We occupied 20 out of the 53 rooms booked at the event hotel.

As usual, the ABC supported our friends at the Associação de Vela de Macau (AVM). Preparation started several weeks before the event, with the ABC sending five Feva and six Pico dinghies, and an ABC safety boat, down to Hebe Haven Yacht Club. There they were loaded into containers and shipped to Macau on the Tuesday prior to the event weekend.

It's a huge task as the shipper does not pack the containers, so ABC and Hebe Haven staff worked together to pack two containers, with a third container being packed and shipped from the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club in Causeway Bay. The other clubs sent Picos and Fevas too, as well as Optimists and Lasers. Unpacking in Macau and setting up some 52 boats was another huge task, but by Friday night all was ready and sailors were arriving at the Westin, now named the Grand Coloane Beach Resort.

During the regatta's first few years, sailing took place off the beach at the northeast end, near the hotel and next to the Miramar Restaurant. More recently the organisers have managed to establish themselves as part of the AVM, the "official" government-backed sailing centre at the southern end of Coloane's Hac Sa Beach.







This large sailing centre was formerly little-used, but partly due to the recent enthusiasm of a small band of keen volunteers, small-boat sailing is now well and truly on the agenda in Macau, with some credit due, it must be said, to the annual International Dinghy Regatta. This has helped spike interest, not only with the general public, but also with those involved in sports administration in Macau; so the future definitely looks bright!

This year, the first day of the regatta dawned with very light winds, and dull and grey skies, but luckily we avoided the overnight threat of thunderstorms. As the weekend progressed, things steadily improved, with the breeze increasing and even some sunshine on the Sunday.

Of all the ABC sailors, special mention must be made of Malo Kennish, who was competing in one of his first big regattas as the only ABC representative in the Optimist class. He opened the regatta with a third and fourth place, and managed to finish seventh overall; a great achievement out of 17 boats. Ralph Summers finished third in the Laser radial division, again one of his best-ever results, and other ABC sailors all managed good mid-fleet positions. The third place (out of three boats) in the adult Laser Stratos class certainly does not reflect the close racing and fantastic effort from the three ABC adult sailors, Stephanie Dechelette, Tomas Huml and Celine Verdez, all successful and enthusiastic products of the ABC adult sailing programme.

The best match of the singles was between Tong Yun Fat of ABC and Steve So of Hebe Haven, which was finally

decided on the black ball. We broke for dinner with ABC leading six wins to the three wins of RHKYC and Hebe Haven.

After dinner, combat resumed with the doubles matches. The final match between RHKYC and ABC could not be played as the time was already 10 minutes before midnight! The double matches were drawn between RHKYC and ABC at 2.5 wins each, with Hebe Haven achieving one doubles win.

# **ABC** claims third tourney

# 29er Sailors Shine in World Competitions

his summer, four sailors from the ABC High-Performance squad once again travelled to compete in four major global events; this year, in Europe and Canada.

Travelling overseas is essential once sailors reach the highest level; they get to compete in large fleets and against some of the best sailors in the world.

In fact, now we can say confidently that ABC youth sailors are already world-class; Yann D'Argenlieu and Nathan Bradley finished 19th in the 29er World Championships, the top annual event for the class, and 13th in the 29er Youth Worlds.

Read on for the story of the summer campaign in the words of the sailors themselves.

# EuroCup, Weymouth, U.K., 5 - 6 July

For Nathan and me, Portland, in southern England's Weymouth, was the first of our three summer destinations that included four regattas. The EuroCup event was hosted at the Olympic sailing centre, which meant that all of the facilities were in perfect shape. This included the RYA guesthouse (a 15-minute walk to the sailing centre) where we spent our nights.

Our goal for this event was to put our head back in the game and into sailing after a hard-working school year. The event also served as a pre-ISAF and pre-Worlds training event, in which we were able to race alongside 40 other boats;

something we do not get back home in Hong Kong. Moreover, Weymouth is known for its strong winds (something we also do not get very often in Hong Kong), as we quickly found out once we launched our boat.

Portland was truly a skiff sailor's paradise: even with its 25 knots of wind, the water inside the harbour continued to remain flat. This meant that virtually no waves would be able to slow the 29er down. Therefore, we practiced strong wind sailing alongside the South African team and the two best British boats. Trying to keep up with them was a great challenge, considering that we had chartered a 29er that was over 10-years old.

Anyway, once our brand-new sails arrived for racing, we were almost able to compete with the best GBR sailors; the Irish, on the other hand, were just too far ahead. I learnt that on a double-handed skiff like the 29er, communication between team members is key. There are some things that the helm can see and do, but that the crew can't (and vice-versa). It is the job of us both to talk to each other and to process the information we have both gathered with the use of simple questions (such as: Why are we here? Why are we going there? Where do we want to go? How do we get there?). This allows us to form a plan and a strategy to put us to the top of the fleet.

Once we were off the water and out of the sailing centre, Coach Rory Godman would drive us home for a quick shower and a short rest. We would then drive to Weymouth for dinner. It was a pleasant surprise when we met up for dinner with John Wood, a well-known instructor and coach at the ABC! I definitely enjoyed the company while we all dug into our fish and chips.

Weymouth definitely played an important role in our buildup to the Youth Worlds and 29er World Championships. I want to thank Rory for spending his summer working and coaching, driving on the water and on the road; taking care of us, but also making this whole trip a memorable and pleasant one.

### ISAF Youth Worlds, Portugal, 12 - 19 July

The ISAF Youth Sailing World Championships were first held in Sweden in 1971 and have taken place every year since. It is a key ISAF event to help promote top-level youth sailing, and is billed by many as the under 18's equivalent of the Olympic Games.

To qualify, sailors from each country need to achieve significant local and overseas success, and then be selected by their national authority (in our case the HKSF) to represent their country. Only one team (one boat) is allowed per country. It was an amazing – and very special – experience for both Yann and me to be representing Hong Kong!

The 2014 ISAF Youth Worlds were held in Tavira, Portugal, following our warm-up event in the U.K. The weather in Portugal was consistently hot and the wind averaged between 6-12 knots for racing. The first two days proved very exciting with our overall position starting at first and slipping to third. We later fell down to a respectable 13th overall, a result with which we were still very pleased. We came away knowing that we are capable of much better!

The starting times in Portugal were different every day but the routine was the same: we woke up, went for a 20-minute run to the yacht club to see what conditions were like on the water, then we ate breakfast, had a quick briefing and went out for the day's racing. After racing Coach Rory Godman debriefed us before we ate dinner and went to sleep; a simple schedule to avoid getting tired.

This was my second time at the ISAF Youth Worlds, representing the ABC and Hong Kong, following my participation sailing with Cosmas Grelon back in 2012 when we finished 18th. Both Yann and I will be working very hard in the next 12 months to qualify again and hopefully further improve our result.







# North American Championships, Ontario, Canada, 20 – 24 July

Russell Aylsworth and I joined teammates Yann D'Argenlieu and Nathan Bradley in Kingston, Canada, for the 29er North American Championships as a warm-up regatta for the World Championships that would take place a few days later at the same venue. Yann and Nathan had already competed in the UK and Portugal, but with chartered dinghies as Coach Rory Godman had worked out that it was cheaper for ABC to send two of our own 29ers and an ABC coach boat all the way to Canada (sharing costs with the Royal Hong Kong Yacht Club who also sent equipment for their sailors). So we arrived confident that our own boats were ready and in good condition.

On 19 July, Russell and I flew over to Toronto directly from Hong Kong on a 16-hour flight, coping with a 12-hour time zone difference. From there we met up with Coach Rory and teammates Yann and Nathan, and drove down to Kingston. Kingston is a popular tourist area in Canada and was the host of the 1976 Olympics' sailing in Portsmouth Olympic Harbour. The North American Championships were also held in the harbour on Lake Ontario, approximately a 2.5-hour drive from Toronto. On arrival, we rigged up and went for a quick warmup sail to get used to the conditions, then polished boats to be ready for the first day of racing!

The day greeted us with light winds of seven-10 knots that did not particularly suit the bigger crews. The regatta consisted of 70 boats split into two fleets of 35 each with each of our two boats in different fleets. With the larger crews stacking up outside the top 10s, Yann and Nathan took advantage of this and finished with a 6th, a 4th and a 10th. A less-impressive start to the regatta came from Russell and me, who finished 29th, 26th and another 29th.

Day 2 was more or less the same conditions once racing was underway; we were once again split up with different competition. Russell and I knew that good starts on the front row were crucial for a great result and so our starts were better, which indeed significantly improved our results. Yann and Nathan





also improved with a 7th and two 5ths from winning the pin on a number of occasions.

Day 3 had a lot more in store for us 29ers once the wind rapidly swung from southwest to north with a 10-knot increase in wind speed – these were conditions that sailors around the globe had come to compete in. The fleet was split into Gold and Silver with our more-experienced crew qualifying for Gold, with Russell and myself, less experienced and certainly much younger, qualifying for Silver. The Gold fleet included the 25 top boats in the world, with everyone else "dumped" in Silver. Yann and Nathan



took the best chance in the first race by finishing 7th, but dropped into the top 20s for the next three races. Russell and I took advantage of the 20-knot breeze with our boat speed by finishing 20th, then with significant improvement, 18th and a 15th.

The final day wasn't much of an adventure with the breeze dying down back to 10 knots. With the wind shifting and a big range in the lulls and gusts, the Gold fleet completed only one race that day. Yann and Nathan breezed through their race with a 3rd and a final position of 7th overall. This regatta positioned us well for the Worlds with a 7th for Yann and Nathan and a 44th for Russell and me. We both learnt a lot at this warm-up regatta about sailing in big fleets and looked forward to the Worlds a couple of days later.

# 29er World Championships, Ontario, Canada, 27 July – 2 August

After the 29er North American
Championships, Matt and I felt confident
about the World Championships. Since
Matthew and I did the North American
regatta we had already adjusted to the lake
conditions. This took us a while because the
lake is fresh water so we had less buoyancy
and our bow would dig into the water and fill
up our boat easier.

We arrived at the boat park for measurement day, but as we were preparing our boat we were asked to be guinea pigs for measuring. The team was very relieved because this meant we did not have to wait for the long line the next day as in every year of the Worlds. Once they measured and weighed our boat, we rigged up and went for a quick sail to check our boats were prepared. The wind condition was light and shifty. But we were ready for it.

So first we would have the qualifiers which lasted for three days; they determined which class we would be in for the rest of the regatta. They have three classes: Gold (best), Silver (second fleet)

and Bronze (third fleet). Rory Godman, our coach, said that we have to fight for every place because it makes a huge difference. Matt and I kept that thought close for the rest of the qualifiers. On our first race Matt and I did not have the best start, but we slowly started to move up the fleet. As we rounded the top mark we capsized, and when we got back up our gennaker was tangled, so we could not go downwind easily. We then rounded the bottom mark and our main halyard snapped so the rest of our day was wasted. Our second and third days were not the best since the wind was light and shifty, but we tried hard! The effort paid off, and in our final race we really wanted to end on a positive note and we did - finishing first in our fleet! A great way to end the regatta ... to see the whole fleet following us was a fantastic feeling!

Meanwhile, Nathan and Yann had qualified for the Gold fleet, guaranteeing them at least a top-25 result. As they raced, their results kept improving, from a 24th to a 4th in race 5 and an 8th in race 6.

Nathan and Yann eventually finished 19th overall (out of 101 boats) and as 15th youth team! An incredible result, 19th in the world – and they were sailing against the adults too!

All four of us would like to give a special thanks to our sponsors (Peroni, Borrelli Walsh and ETA Logistics) whose assistance made the whole trip possible. The ABC covered the costs for Coach Rory and for the charter boats, transportation and shipping. Without such support it would have been even more expensive than it already was for our parents!

Finally, thanks are due to Coach Rory, whose determination, organisation, commitment and absolute dedication throughout the whole trip and to the whole team were amazing. We wouldn't be here without his vision – so a big thanks go to him for everything! We all are looking forward to continuing our sailing through the ABC and our thanks go to the members for their support too!

# Joint ABC-RHKYC Dinghy Series 2014-15

The arrangements for the Joint ABC-RHKYC Dinghy Series 2014-15 have been finalised and are reflected in the annual sailing calendar included in this issue of *Horizons*. The two clubs again will alternate on the joint series race management, and share sailing instructions and courses. Again there will be Autumn, Winter, Spring and Summer series.

Racing has been split into two groups, "Open Dinghies and Optimists" and "Double-handed and Moth." In the calendar these are identified in the race day name by "ODO" and DHM" respectively.

These groups will be defined in the Notice of Race. The former group will cover most boats that ABC sailors currently race,

while the latter will comprise high-performance 29ers and the International Moths – the latter is a development rule class which now race in foils.

This will improve the competition for these high performance classes, while making the Open Dinghies and Optimists most uniform, and hopefully attract more sailors. The Summer Series, which is ABC-run (although RHKYC and others are welcome), supports all classes of dinghies.

A further change is the bringing forward of starts of the Winter, Spring and Summer races, held on Sundays, to 1:30 pm, to enjoy the stronger winds of the middle of the day, while the Autumn Series remains on Saturdays starting at 2.30 pm.

Two stop to help. An ABC member with a blue McGregor 26. A power boat.

And the fisherman on the kayak standing by. Carmen Cerne on the phone to the marine police ...



Dragon boaters, 22 in all, some in party dresses, one with a dog, others clutching large bags of empty beer cans, all bobbing about surrounded by floating eskies, flipflops, paddles ... ¶¶

We're hauling swimmers inboard. Dog and its pink-clad lady owner come first. The dog was the only living creature wearing a lifejacket! Thank heaven everyone can swim. Thank heaven it's still daylight. Nine more people follow. *FG3* crew and stronger dragon boaters do the heavy lifting. Even a J/80's low freeboard is too much for most to get themselves aboard.

Not long after, the marine police arrive, blue light flashing. We wave frantically, pointing at the awash dragon boat, a classic hazard to navigation.

Aboard, all are safe. Eleven aboard *Javelin*. More on the McGregor, which

has a handy swim ladder. One of *Javelin's* suddenly dives back into the sea, yelling "There's my bag!" He scrambles onto the powerboat, plus bag. Watertight bags are almost a fashion item as we can see from the debris in the cockpit ... along with many paddles.

With nine bedraggled survivors in a gaggle in the cockpit and *Javelin* sitting lower and lower in the water, we head slowly towards the typhoon shelter. "Yes," we shout at the marine police, "all 22 accounted for."

Lewis slows *Javelin* and takes a wake on the bow as a stinkpot roars by closeto, oblivious of what's going on. What is it with stinkpotters and unseamanship?

We slide alongside the pontoon where three policemen are waiting. Before the first statements are taken there's the Aberdeen Fire Services Department fireboat alongside, siren hooting, red light flashing and chaps dressed ready for another major disaster. Ready for anything. Splendid in helmets and harnesses, and then the police are joined by divers, all trained and dressed for action.

Dial 999 and you get the full McCoy plus. All credit to the emergency services.

Finally it's all over. Hugs and thank yous exchanged. "You saved our lives ..." "Bye-bye ..." "Thank you ..."

ong Kong has a huge problem of marine pollution; any of us need only to look out on any stretch of water to see the ugly flotsam of Hong Kong's discarded litter and waste. The nature of some of the waste can be amusing – I have seen a floating settee, a fridge, and even a discarded TV! Once I had to navigate my boat through a large patch of about 50, old-style computer monitors!

But of course marine pollution is not funny; it is unhealthy, an eyesore, and extremely harmful to marine animals and birds. Some of you may remember the disastrous plastic pellet spill of 2012. Fortunately, that incident caught the attention of very many concerned Hong Kong residents who turned out in droves to help with the clean-up.

It was indeed astounding how many ordinary people did get involved in cleaning up the beaches. One man on Cheung Chau even brought down to the beach a vacuum cleaner and seemingly miles of electric cable to help remove the offending plastic.

# **Coastal Watch formed**

Building on this public concern and goodwill, Hong Kong Coastal Watch has been established to help tackle Hong Kong's massive marine pollution problem and clean up beaches territory-wide.

Coastal Watch is a coastal clean-up programme and large-scale ecological survey led by World Wildlife Fund in a campaign coordinated with a number of concerned green groups and marine-related organizations. It aims to develop a long-term solution to the marine litter problem and enhance and mobilize public awareness of our marine environment.

Coastal Watch has identified 27 key target sites in a variety of coastal and marine habitats across Hong Kong, including mangroves, mudflats, sandy shores, rocky shores, coral communities and coastal water areas.

Each site is matched to a team that will conduct ecological, marine litter and micro-debris surveys and perform clean-up activities. All information collected will be shared



with the authorities, which will help the government identify the point of sources of marine litter and develop a long-term marine conservation policy. Each team will have a scientific officer who will guide team volunteers. Site project activities will span two years with one team visit in the dry season and one in the rainy season, with other visits possible on an as-needed basis.

# Fun for all: a shore thing

I am very pleased to report that the ABC General Committee has chosen to support Coastal Watch as an organizational member, giving ABC members the worthy opportunity to help clean up Hong Kong's priceless beaches and coastlines; after all, we all use the seas around Hong Kong, and as such take more than a passing interest.

We have agreed to take the clearing of a 200-metre stretch of sandy shore interspersed with boulders at Beaufort Island. (Nearby on Po Toi, the South China Dive Club has already begun preparing for its assignment, cleaning the sea bed beneath the beach.)

The ABC is now calling for membervolunteers to help clean up and monitor the shore site at Beaufort Island. Although marine litter is serious, we plan a fun day – Sunday, 28 September – for ABC members to get together.

ABC volunteers will board an ABC junk at the Main Clubhouse to make an earlyish start for Beaufort. Other club boats may join in, and boat owners are very welcome to join.

Please check the ABC website and emails for developing details, but depending on group consensus, clean-up will be followed by either an on-board curry or dinner back at the Club or even an early dinner at Po Toi.

# A scientific edge

Led by the WWF, the combined forces of the two-year Coastal Watch project include a variety of interested parties, from the casual beach user to scientific researchers as well as Hong Kong government bodies and green groups. Coastal Watch's stated aims are to not just clean beaches and coastal areas but to do so with methodical strategies, as well as to collect and collate important scientific information that will help the government's interdepartmental working group address marine litter. Organisers hope the Coastal Watch project helps the government develop and carry out meaningful and long-term strategies to protect our marine environment.

# The basic aims of the clean-up are to:

- Remove marine litter from a number of sites in Hong Kong's various coastal environments,
- Survey marine litter to determine its composition and contribute to efforts to trace its sources.
- Fill in gaps in existing ecological information by constructing species checklists,
- Engage local fishing communities in locating and removing marine litter in Hong Kong waters, and
- 5. Train "citizen scientist" volunteers who will assist and promote the project.

The Coastal Watch project's strategic partners are wide and varied, including EcoMarine, EcoVision's Hong Kong Cleanup, Green Council, Living Lamma, Ocean Park Conservation Foundation Hong Kong, and Plastic-Free Seas. The project is also supported by Eco-Education and Resources Centre, Lamma Corner and Ocean Park Corporation.


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
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
