


une – possibly stretched by a week ahead and astern – will see two welcome arrivals at the Club: a new marine manager (see notes above) and the new committee boat.

Rear Commodore - Sailing



yphoon season in Hong Kong is from May to October, with most typhoons arriving between mid-July and late September. The Hong Kong Observatory (HKO) provides advance warning and tracking of typhoons over a wide-ranging area. It tracks storms that threaten to approach Hong Kong and those whose passage brings less wind but heavy bands of rain and swells.

As per the ABC bye-laws, members within Club premises will be kept informed of tropical storm signals either by the posting of notices or by announcement.

It is the owner's responsibility to secure a boat's mooring and look after its overall safety. ABC reminds all boat owners that ABC staff members are not supposed to board boats to clear decks, and despite ABC helping to check mooring components for safety, owners must secure their own mooring lines.

Therefore you must come to check your boat before the HKO hoists a typhoon signal 3, as the Club will cease sampan service then. Once signal 3 is hoisted, ABC staff will be very busy completing Club safety procedures to secure the entire Club, moorings and

pontoons, steps that begin when a typhoon 1 signal is hoisted.

Ground tackle

Check the condition of your mooring lines, shackles and swivels. In typhoon shelters, boats should put out breast lines and springs to adjacent boats. Remove the anchor and stow it below. Consider adding a second set of mooring lines and taking them aft to primary (the biggest) winches or a different set of cleats, not the mast or standing rigging (shrouds). Anti-chafe hose or other protective material where rope passes over bow rollers and through fairleads or chocks is also a good idea. In the event of a surge all these measures will reduce or prevent damage.

On deck

Look around for all ways to reduce windage on your boat. Lash the helm amidships. Yacht owners should drop booms and lash them on deck. Check that cockpit drains are clear and that any automatic bilge pump is working. Make sure that all hatches are fully closed. Remove biminis, sails, covers and any safety gear and put them below.

Some boats may need ABC staff to help secure them to one another to avoid them bashing against each other during high winds and seas. The trustworthy ABC team has an excellent record for safety under typhoon conditions, having safeguarded boats for 40 years.

At home

In the event of a typhoon forecast, knowing that you are ready, with a good, strong mooring rig and a well-prepared boat may help you rest more easily ... as does making sure that your pleasure vessel licence and your insurance are up-to-date.

Club operations during typhoons

When Typhoon Signal Number 8 is hoisted, Club operations will cease and all members, guests, and staff, with the exception of caretaker staff, will be required to vacate the Club premises.

In the event of members or guests being unable to leave Club premises due to lack of transport or other circumstances, the Club's public rooms will remain open for use but very limited food, drink or service of any kind will be available.



General Manager's Letter



Waglan Bar renovation: As promised, the Waglan bar finally will be renovated. We expect the bar to close towards the end of June, and reopen towards the end of July.

While the bar renovation takes place, to soften the blow, you may enjoy a French café experience with a special menu and summer décor at a new temporary bar in the Four Peaks restaurant. Drinks and food still will be served in Four Peaks, the balcony and the deck.

We hope the totally revamped menu and special promotions during the renovation period will make you forget the inconvenience of the short-term loss of your bar.

The end result will be better and more efficient service, a slightly bigger bar and brand-new equipment to better cool your drinks. The décor will change little, as the design brief stipulated "changing without changes". So, no flashing bar top at night, no art deco satin glasses or ultra-modern bar. Just a refreshed, newer version of the actual Waglan Bar.

Marine news: The Summer Race Series has started but as I write this, the first series has yet to happen. Simpson Marine, already the sponsor of the ABC Four Peaks Race, has kindly agreed to also sponsor the Summer Series. More to come in sailing reports over this summer. I also am pleased to announce that Peroni has signed another one-year product-sponsor agreement with the Club to support our 2016 Waglan Race Series. Peroni also will extend this same support to the 2016 Four Peaks race.

Mooring: This month, we start to renew all mooring agreements. Please reply swiftly to our letter and be kind enough to send us all documents required.

Towards a greener Club: In 2011, I began to write about management actions to become greener, to reduce our environmental impact and to limit our carbon footprint. Since then, while seeking to limit negative effects on members' experiences at the Club, we have begun to curb our impact on Hong Kong's overloaded landfills and polluted waters simply by taking small steps. For example, now all our plastic bags are recycled and biodegradable, and your takeaway paper bags and pizza boxes are made of recycled products.

I encourage you to recycle at the Club using the eco-friendly recycling containers we placed in the lower car park four years ago. Here, you can dispose of aluminum cans, heavy metal, papers, carton boxes, and plastic and glass bottles. More than 80 percent of what is collected is reused in pavement, new boxes or cookery equipment. Whatever does not go to the landfills is a blessing for your children's future.

Lastly, our two working boats, soon to be renamed once the new committee boat arrives, are operating with ZB5 biodiesel fuel that derives from waste oil from our deep fat fryers. As of the end

of April 2015, these two working boats' fuelling has directly benefitted from 76 kg of biodiesel derived from 88 kgs of oil collected from the Club's kitchens. This translates to a net CO₂ reduction of 200 kg, equivalent to the planting of nine trees.

One of our boats now is also using the very new technology of hybridhydrogen combustion control.

As much as we are able, we now use eco-friendly products to clean our boats and slipways. Soon we will start to completely change over all of our water taps to the latest generation of water-saving systems, discovered at a recent F&B tradeshow.

All these efforts have reduced our carbon foot print by 30 percent. Trust that the Club will make even greater efforts to be even better in the coming years.

Rules and regulations: Recently, I have had reports that some members and guests have brought dogs to Middle Island. Let me remind you all of the ABC's no-animals policy on Middle Island. If Harry approaches you on this

matter, please be cooperative, and take appropriate action.

Also, please be reminded that the Club precludes outside food from being brought onto our premises. This policy will be strictly enforced on Middle Island. I must remind you that violation of this rule is subject to disciplinary action if repeated.

Bombast and squeal: No, I did not misspell bubble and squeak. I must ask members not to be irritated at ABC staff who remind members of Club rules. There is no need to get angry at anyone reminding of rules. We seek to approach members and guests with deference and we expect the same in return.

Separately, we see far fewer breaches of rules barring the use of phones, and members' domestic helpers are not to be seen. Many more members now sign in their guests. Thank you for your great support in these areas.

Saturday, 25 April

It was a great pleasure to act as race officer for the first day of the 2015 Classic Yacht Regatta on Saturday, 25 April, a beautiful sunny afternoon with about 12 knots of wind blowing from the southeast, forecast to continue.

It looked as though even the heavier classic yachts would enjoy the challenge of a reasonably long course with a short windward mark into Stanley Bay, followed by a broad reach to Chesterman Buoy and a long fetch or beat past Castle Rock and between Beaufort and Po Toi Islands out to the Fury Rocks, followed by a run under spinnaker back into Tai Tam Bay.

Indeed, all but *Xiao Rui* (no doubt due to excessive partying on board) made the cut-off despite the wind dying near Fury Rocks and having the finishing line set in a hole. Only one of the heavier classics retired, the enormous Turkish boat that had the loudest sound system and the largest contingent of dancing girls on board.


Despite starting late due to catching debris around its propeller on the way to the start, *Snowgoose II* managed to overtake many of the others in its division.

In retrospect, it would have been better to set the finish further out of Tai Tam Bay, but at least all the boats finished close to the Hobie beach, where an excellent post-race party was held.

I and my assistant race officer, Ian Dubin, would be happy to do the same next year if asked.

Sunday, 26 April

Sunday's race conditions were promising but also worrying.

With performance envelopes from *Red Eye*'s slippery sled to the stately classics at the back, race officers Stephen Davies and Elaine Morgan had a problem. The shortest course was too short. The longest too long. But there was no Goldilocks solution with the middle course. A galloping flood to the first, windward mark at Fury Rocks in a gentle force 3 with occasional bursts of 4 didn't look good. But middle course it had to be.

Fingers were crossed and everyone got away cleanly, though Diana and Patrick Bruce, sportingly, delayed getting *Pizzazz* round the windward mark by heading for Fury Rocks and then coming back, just to give the opposition a chance.

The finish was placed out in the wind clear south of Round Island ... but with even *Red Eye* taking nearly an hour to get 'round Fury after the start, would the back-enders manage the loop from Castle Rock around Chesterman and back by the cutoff at 1600 hrs?

Bucephalus, leading the classics by a long way, made a shorten-course call almost impossible. General Manager Philippe de Manny, long used to dealing with this problem, was sanguine. "No problem, there's three hours to go ..." And he was right. All but Xiao Rui made the cut-off after a day of steady, gentle breezes and glorious sunshine. Even the little Cheoy Lee 29' ketch, just 28 minutes off the pace, made it to Middle Island to join the party. Classic!



The ABC and WWF's Coastal Watch: ABC Members Revisit Beaufort Island

n Sunday, 19 April, Team ABC revisited our adopted beach on Beaufort Island for our second clean-up and marine survey. The ABC has committed two years to this project, just one of over two dozen territory-wide sites in the World Wide Fund for Nature's Coastal Watch programme in Hong Kong.

The WWF has selected 27 sites located all around Hong Kong. Each site, ranging from beaches and estuary environments to mangrove and rocky shorelines, was assigned to a particular group of volunteers responsible for cleaning up the area of rubbish and waste, conducting a brief ecological survey and monitoring their allocated site during both wet and dry seasons.

While ABC volunteers did their first survey and clean-up in October 2014, Hong Kong beaches do not stay clean for long and again there was a huge amount of accumulated flotsam and jetsam, pictured, for us to remove.







The ABC junk departed for Middle Island mid-morning on a lovely spring day. Patrick Yeung, WWF project manager for Coastal Watch, Maggie Kwok, WWF Coastal Watch project officer and WWF team scientist Peggy, first briefed volunteers who formed teams with assigned roles. The junk proceeded to Beaufort Island where the teams collected rubbish and conducted their marine-survey tasks.

The WWF-Hong Kong's Coastal Watch project seeks to develop a long-term solution to Hong Kong's marine litter problem and educate and inspire the public to take positive action to shape our marine environment. For more information, see http://coastalwatch.hk/about-coastal-watch/

Macau Regatta 2015

he Macau International Dinghy Regatta takes place every year off Macau's Hac Sa beach. The ABC has been involved in organising and supporting the Macau regatta since its inception in 2010. This regatta is not only an opportunity for our sailors to take part in a competitive event, it also serves as a positive way that our Club can help stimulate and support sailing in Macau.

The Macau regatta, this year 20 and 21 June, is a unique event, easy to reach and relatively inexpensive, providing a great opportunity to have a sailing-based weekend away.

Racing takes place directly off Hac Sa beach, with boats based out of the Associação de Vela de Macau Sailing Centre.

The Macau Regatta is a family-focused event, with each sailor and his or her family staying together at the nearby Grand Coloane Beach Resort Hotel (formerly the Westin). The hotel offers a special rate for the regatta and superb facilities within walking distance to the beach. Guest rooms

overlook the racing area, and the swimming pool is a key attraction for sailors and parents alike.

It's quite a different and more laid-back regatta to some that we are used to in Hong Kong – while races are short and competition is sharp, there is a great deal of camaraderie amongst sailors and families.

Over the past five years, the ABC team attending the event has grown. Last year, counting family and friends, there were around 40 Club members at the regatta – we occupied 20 out of the 53 rooms booked at the event hotel.

Expressions of interest and entries should be made to the ABC's Kevin Lewis, who will coordinate the team and attend as team leader and coach. 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Black Dolphin in Hong Kong

Black Dolphin is a diesel-auxiliary gaff-rigged sailing ketch built in the United States. She is 50 feet overall, including her bowsprit. She is white oak-framed and mahogany-planked with teak decks and gum interior trim.

While we cannot be certain of her exact age, we do know she was designed by southern California yachtsman and shipwright Hugh Angelman.

Black Dolphin has a nearly identical sister ship, Resolute, designed and built in 1936. Documents of the U.S. Coast Guard indicate that Black Dolphin was built and launched in 1944 in Inglewood, California, but the present owners have not been able to find any information at all about the Inglewood shipyard, or who owned the boat between its 1944 launch and 1950.


What is known is that *Black Dolphin* is iron-fastened, probably due to the lack of available bronze fastenings for private yachts during WWII. We also know that the entire production at the shipyard where she may have been built was taken over during the war, when Hugh Angelman designed and built ships for the U.S. Navy. We suspect that *Black Dolphin*'s construction began before the war, but was perhaps halted and moved to a smaller shipyard in 1942 to make room for the war effort.

After her launch, *Black Dolphin* disappears from records between 1944 and 1950, when she was purchased by Bill

and Marian Rumsey. After buying her, Bill and Marian lived aboard *Black Dolphin*, most of the time in the San Diego area. Among other things, Bill was a lifeguard, while Marian was a teacher and author of children's books. Among their many achievements, Bill and Marian, with five other couples, started the Seven Seas Cruising Association, now the oldest and largest worldwide organization supporting the liveaboard cruising lifestyle.

The Rumseys sold *Black Dolphin* around 1962 to an Oliver Peak, who moved her from San Diego to Oceanside, California. Charlie Black joined Oliver Peak in Costa Rica to help bring the boat back to San Diego. Charlie remembers that in about 1967 or 1968, Oliver sailed *Black Dolphin* to New Zealand, where she was dismasted in a storm. "After the dismasting off New Zealand a friend of mine visited him in Auckland," Charlie reported. *Black Dolphin* then was repaired and deck-freighted back to San Diego.

In the early 1970s, *Black Dolphin* was sold again, this time to a Tom Mason, an insurance salesman and member of San Diego's Silvergate Yacht Club. He in turn sold her on to David Easley, who renamed her *Island Girl*. She was then passed to a Larry Wave who, for a brief period of time, renamed the boat *Bettina* after his mother. In 2007, Larry sold the boat to a New Zealand sculptor, Brett Goldstone.







Black Dolphin was finally acquired by her present owners, Jadis and Craig Blurton, in 2013.

Black Dolphin has now found a new home and a new purpose: sailing in Hong Kong as the "tall ship" of The Harbour School. Aboard Black Dolphin, students learn awareness and respect for Hong Kong's seafaring history and marine environment and the importance of communication, cooperation, teamwork, and leadership to achieve personal and group goals. Students develop personal resilience in sometimes physically challenging environments as well as problem-solving and decision-making skills in planning for and conducting activities on board.

Craig Blurton, who contributed invaluable information to prepare this article, writes that he is "very proud to become part of *Black Dolphin*'s history and excited by the possibilities she offers for educational programs at The Harbour School".

Together, the ABC and Craig are working to give Club members the chance to see more of this beautiful boat, and perhaps even have a sail in her in the future.

Black Dolphin joined the ABC Classic Yacht Rally in 2015 and features on this month's cover of Horizons. No doubt we will see much more of her in the waters south of Hong Kong Island.


