CLUB NEWS AND REMINDERS A Word or Two on Safety

Please be reminded that we now have CCTVs all around the car park, monitoring 24/7 what's happening there. Records are kept for 2 weeks, so if you have any issues or witness incidents please contact the office as early as possible, so we can extract the file to help with insurance claims or even police reports.

Nowadays, cyber-attacks are more serious and more frequent than ever, so we are now taking comprehensive (meaning: certainly expensive) measures to guard against the unfortunate event of being affected by a computer virus. To ensure that our IT system – including Point of Sales, Membership Data & Accounting figures – is protected, extra servers will be added to our already complex system to stop, confuse and re-route wannabe thieves to dead-end terminals. Let's hope this will be effective if ever we come under attack.

I'm sure you know that you can check your monthly statement online. This was first implemented years ago, but we still receive many calls about the state of members' accounts. Also, when logging onto your ABC account, please make sure your antivirus software is up-to-date.

Parking at the Club

Please be reminded that we have limited parking space, and most individual spaces are quite small. Sadly, I cannot do much about this, as they are on the Club drawing and registered with the authorities. What can be a huge improvement is that you park within the lines; far too many cars occupy two spaces, and this is not very nice for your fellow members. Also, a constant flow of cars without the appropriate label still come to park, and if you find parking is denied by the car park attendant, please be civil.

We hope that with such great and efficient public transport, members will make use of it, so there will be less pressure on spaces during weekends.

Club Access - Cards Needed

As you will have noticed the gate to access the pontoon is now closed during weekdays as well, so ensure that you have your membership card with you at all times. PVOL – or your licence to drive a boat in Hong Kong

We have been running very successfully and in cooperation with A & M Boating, the Hong Kong Pleasure Vessel Operator Certificate of Competence P.V.O.L. Grade II, (Part A Master and Part B Engineer).

This certification will allow you to drive any boat that is not more than 15m in length overall, in Hong Kong waters. If you have a boat or plan to have one with an engine of more than 4.5CC and within this size, you need a PVOL to operate it.

While if your boat is or will be over 15m long, you will need a grander licence: Grade I certification, which we only do if we have sufficient demand.

The certification course is in two parts. You can choose to sit for one part or both, but one would limit what you can do at sea, and to operate your vessel freely you will need both parts of grade II PVOL.

The first part of the course – or the master section, will teach you about rules at sea, lights signals, shapes to hoist and communicate, buoys and signals that you will see at sea and their meaning. Plus some seamanship, knowledge of local waterways and the laws of Hong Kong. While part B – or the engineering section of the grade II certification, will

look at engine construction, diesel & petrol fuel differences, fuel systems, electrical systems, ignition systems, lubrication, cooling & pumps, transmission systems, operation & maintenance, fire & gas precautions.

The cost per Part is HK\$1,700 for members and HK\$2,000 for non-members; if you take both parts the total cost is HK\$3,400 for members and HK\$4,000 for non-members.

All ABC-hosted courses include course notes, teaching materials and practice exam questions. However, we also sell, at our reception shop, the PVOL Handbook, which covers the syllabus for both Grade 2 and Grade 1 exams. www.abclubhk.com/upload/Courses/PVOCC/PVOCC-II-2017.pdf

The next classes are planned at the ABC on 1, 3 and 4 August for part A; and on 9, 10 and 11 August. The lectures last about 3 hours each, and start at 7:00pm, in the harbour room.

TYPHOON PRECAUTION

Typhoon season in Hong Kong is from May to October, with most tropical cyclones and typhoons arriving between mid-July and late September. The Hong Kong Observatory (HKO) provides advance warning and tracking of typhoons over a wide-ranging area. It tracks storms that threaten to approach Hong Kong and those whose passage brings less wind but heavy bands of rain. As per the ABC Bye-laws, members within the Club premises will be kept informed of tropical storm signals, either by the posting of notices or by announcements through the website and Facebook.

Boat Readiness

It is the owner's responsibility to secure a boat's mooring and look after its overall safety. ABC reminds all boat owners that ABC staff are not supposed to board boats to clear decks, and despite ABC helping to check mooring components for safety, owners must secure their own mooring lines.

Steps to take for boats' safety and security

If a typhoon is approaching, boat owners should prepare to secure their mooring early – it is much harder to work in strong winds and heavy rain. In advance of typhoons, to protect boats and ensure safety, boating members should consider taking the following actions for boats on moorings (note that this is advice supplied by professional mariners):

- Check and ensure your licence and insurance are both upto-date. An expired licence will automatically invalidate your insurance. Your policy should name your mooring location and you should have checked with your insurance if the location is under their understanding of typhoon protected area;
- Check that your bilge pump and electrical system are in good working condition;
- Clear cockpit drains;
- Securely close all hatches and lockers;
- Lash the helm amidships;

- Ensure your decks are free from any potential flying objects including life rafts, emergency radio beacons, horseshoe rings, Dan buoys, boat covers and biminis. Canvas left on deck is unlikely to be covered by insurance for damage;
- Ensure your sails are either removed and stowed below deck or secured properly on the mast;
- If your boat is anchored with a bow roller, ensure that the mooring lines do not chafe against the anchor as they may be cut during heavy winds. If need be, remove the anchor;
- To connect to the buoy, do not use chains or low-stretch lines, as shock loads can be very high;
- Boats whose owners use chains (wrongly believing them stronger) sometimes have their deck cleats ripped out.
 Consider using purpose-made shock-absorbing lines or simply add shock absorbers to the mooring lines;
- Check mooring lines for damage from chafing and the sun, and replace if you feel they are weakened. Remember that over time nylon lines lose their strength and abrasion resistance;
- Fit chafe protection where lines cross over decks or through chocks;
- Fitting a second set of mooring lines as a back up is a good precaution, as long as it is fitted with a bit of slack compared to the working lines. Never secure a mooring line to the mast or to any standard rigging, but consider using the primary winches;


- Check the shackle from the mooring lines to the swivel.
 Check that the swivel is rotating freely and is in good condition. Replace the swivel if in doubt; and
- Check your loads for moorings, as winds can seriously affect loads.

Some boats may need ABC staff to help secure them to one another, to avoid them bashing against one another during high winds and seas.

Club Operations During Typhoons

Once tropical cyclone signal 3 is in effect, ABC staff will be very busy completing Club safety procedures to secure the entire Club, moorings and pontoons. These safety steps begin when a Number 1 signal is hoisted. You must therefore come to check your boat before the HKO hoists tropical cyclone signal 3, as the club will then cease sampan services.

If tropical cyclone signal 8 is hoisted, Club operations will cease and all members, guests, and staff, with the exception of caretaker staff, will be required to vacate the Club premises. In the event of members or guests being unable to leave the Club premises owing to lack of transport or other circumstances, the public rooms will remain open for use, but very limited food, drink or service of any kind will be available.





he race attracted 26 Boat entries, with 8 in IRC 14 HKPN division A (Including 6 J/80); and 4 in HKPN Division B.


The force 3 southerly wind generated by approaching tropical storm Merbok was quite a promising airstream, but an adverse strong ebb tide precluded racing a longer course to Cheung Chau - which was the first idea, so the Race committee decided on a shorter option to Lamma Island, racing course 45 of the new Sailing instruction booklet.

This course, with a start on Lamma side at approximately 22° 11'.4N & 114° 09'.3E, takes the fleet to Yuen Kok then starboard of P1 Buoy, port Weather Beacon, starboard of P1 Buoy, and starboard of P6 Buoy for a finish at Yung Shue Wan. This is a 10.9-nautical mile course for the fast boats, and 6.5 nautical miles for the smaller ones.

During the race, the effect of the wind becoming lighter and with the ebb tide fighting against the

Marine Team Enhancing Moorings and More

he ABC Marine Team is currently engaged in a complete mooring Repair & Maintenance program for all of the Club's moorings.

There is also an ongoing refurbishment of the Aberdeen Typhoon Mooring topside buoys.

In addition, the Marine Services Manager – Alex Johnston, a qualified Commercial Inspection Diver, has been conducting a full U/W diving inspection survey of the Club's buoys and pontoons at Middle Island over the last few months. This will conclude shortly – before moving to the Aberdeen Typhoon Shelter.

Some moorings have already been inspected in the Aberdeen Typhoon Shelter (TYS), and based on the results of these initial inspections, the Club will be progressively lifting and replacing all of the chain, swivels and shackles of all the 84 moorings (X168 fore/aft buoys). We are awaiting a quotation from the local marine contractor to perform this service.

Please be aware that many of you in Row A have already had your aft mooring buoy and the shackle replaced. As all of the moorings are fore & aft – e.g. two separate mooring systems, this means we have X168 moorings to lift and service: a huge undertaking on a regular scheduled basis.







The ABC MI moorings will be lifted and the chains/ shackles replaced next year. Moving forward, the Club's moorings will be lifted and inspected every two years, in line with current marine industry standards. This will mean – MI Moorings in 2018/19, half of Aberdeen TYS – X42 moorings in 2018/19, and the reminder of X42 in Aberdeen TYS during 2019/20. The cycle will then be repeated, to ensure sufficient budget/costing forecasts, and an effective Repair& Maintenance mooring programme by the Club in future.

Classic Yacht Rally Goes Back to its Roots

or the second time in its history, the Classic Yacht Rally actually has a rally part on the Saturday and not 2 days' racing. Some liked it, some did not – well, this is to be expected by organisers who try their best knowing they will fail to please all.

Following the 2 years' rotation between a raft up on Middle island and at Tai Tam Hobby Club, the 2017 Classic Yacht Rally reverted to the Tai Tam Bay raft-up format; with 25 entering but only 12 joining the rally to Tai Tam on the Saturday. Very light wind on the day did not help with arriving on time; nevertheless all got the horn.

Rally encourages slower yachts too

"On Saturday. we used a rally format rather than a race," said the Race Officer and Marine and Sailing manager Alex Johnston. "This was as much to do with the number of classic and slower cruisers as it was with the light wind. This year's Classic Rally has returned to the roots of the event – encouraging Classic yachts to participate in a rally rather than a race. I think future events should be focused on this aspect, so we can get the maximum number of Classic boats and slower older cruising boats out for the weekend."

Johnston said boats like Jadalinkir and Black Dolphin endorsed the rally approach, "and supported the idea of having racing within the rally context rather than the other way around."

A notable entry this year was Matthew Torlesse's *Koala*, a 30ft Malabar Junior Auxiliary Sailing Yacht that was owned and sailed by the club's first Commodore, Bill Nichol (Commodore in 1967) in the mid-1960s.

Beautiful weather, varied prizes

The race on Sunday started in beautiful sunshine, with a 9-10kt sea breeze. The wind got lighter as the day went on, with some boats taking more than three



Academy members competed in two events during May.

The first was the Tai Mei Tuk Regatta on 13th and 14 May, with 64 boats competing. Though rainy, the two days had rather little wind. Optimist Fleet ARA had 7 sailors competing, with 2 boats in the under 10, 4 in the under 12 and 1 in the open categories.

Some new team members did well, especially Sam Badenach, who finished 36th overall. There were strong performances by our more established members, with Casey Law finishing 7th overall and winning the 12 and under category; Juliette Clot finishing 16th overall and 2nd in the 12 and under category; and Carter Stewart coming 3rd in the 10 and under Category – in his first regatta.

Our ARA Optimist Squad was again in action during Hebe Haven's annual regatta, with 2 boats in the under 10, 4 in the under 12 and 1 in the open categories. Again, there was little wind, especially on the first day, when only two races were completed. Day 2 again saw very difficult sailing conditions, leading to mixed results. Casey Law was the Academy's most consistent performer in the regatta, with a 9th overall and 2nd in the Under 12 category.

California dreaming

Since the regattas, and with the advent of the summer holidays, our 29er team has been preparing for the 2017 Zhick Worlds, hosted by Alamitos Bay Yacht Club in Los Angeles, California. We have 5 teams travelling to Los Angeles. They will arrive on 19 July, with the pre-Worlds starting a week afterwards, and the main event beginning on 29 July.

By June, we had 7 confirmed members of the 2017 ARA 29er World Team. The most experienced are Yann D'argenlieu and Nathan Bradley, who have been away from Hong Kong this year but will rejoin the Academy in Los Angeles, and have already competed in 4 Worlds together. Three members - Malo Kennish, Anatole Martin and Dylan Richards - will be in their 2nd Worlds, and two are first-timers: Lewis Clark and Karrie Clark, who is our only female sailor this year, and our youngest (turning 13 just before the Worlds starts).

Notes:

- 1. Students who attend these two courses will be required to sit their examinations at the Hong Kong Marine Department after course completion. Successful candidates will be entitled to operate a vessel in Hong Kong waters up to 15 metres in length with engines of any power.
- 2. Courses are entirely theoretical for the relative exam. Practical boating is not required for the examination.
- 3. Examinations are normally held on selected Thursdays, you may register your exams. to the Marine Dept. by post or in person. Document required for the examination application:- a ready examination application form, one photo, a copy of your identity document, Eye-sight exam. Report from a registered doctor, examination fee HK\$1,255, cheque payable to "The "Government of the HKSAR" (Candidate must take both Part A (master) & Part B (engineer) exam together in the first attempt). There will be a minimum of 5 students and a maximum of 20 students/course. If there is insufficient support for a course, that course will be cancelled and those already enrolled will be informed accordingly. Members who responded to the initial inquiry and whose names are held on file will be given priority.
